

The deal between EARACHE RECORDS and COMBAT is definitely concrete now, and the first five domestic releases, MORBID ANGEL, ENTOMBED, GODFLESH, CARCASS and MAPALM **DEATH** should be out now. NOCTURNUS* debut will be released in the Spring. I've reviewed everything but the **CODFLESH** in previous issues, so look for the review in this issue's record reviews. INCUBUS should be hitting the road to play some dates in Europe in February. They're back in Tampa and have a new address: P.O. Box 82494, Tampa, Fl. 33682 **USA. FUNERAL NATION** has been signed to a German label called Turbo Music, and a five song EP called "Reign Of Death" is out now, but there are no new songs on it, it's the band's first demo pressed onto vinyl. There are also plans about a full LP being discussed. PRIME EUIL has a new demo out, but it's only for record company promo only. **DEAD HORSE** has been signed to Big Chief Records. DEICIDE ran into a few problems during their UK tour in December. Someone stole Glen Benton's bass, and some wacko took a swing at him during the

The 12" EP should have "Heilspawn", "Covenant Of Death" and two others. 

A while back, far, far away in another galaxy, I did an interview with this band. It appeared in RH #3 and it was when the band was just starting up and had released the first demo. A lot has changed since then, so I decided to do an updated interview with the band. Their 7" is out now and it's limited to 1000 copies, so act fast. This interview was done with Jeff Acres, the bass player.

RH; How have the sales of the EP been so far?

Jeff; "The 7"'s have been doing well, but only 1888 copies were made. For info write Nuclear Blast Records."



RH: Was the original plan to press the whole demo or just a certain number of songs?

Jeff: "Our agreement was to do three songs, taken from the "Dimension Demented" 1990 demo tape."

RH: Has Muclear Blast offered anything close to an LP deal or for that matter, any other label?

Jeff; "No, Nuclear Blast hasn't offered us any deal yet, but we are negotiating with other companies."

<u>RH</u>: How did the shows in S. Florida go and are you getting ready to tour Florida again?

Jeff: "The South Florida shows were kill. The crowd reaction was excellent and we're playing four more dates in December throughout Florida." RH: How would you compare the S. Florida shows to the ones you've played in Tampa? Jeff: "The Tampa shows have been real good, but the out of town shows have drawn bigger and heavier crowds."

RH; How many zines have you been in since the release of the "Dimension Demented" demo?

Jeff; "We have been in numerous amounts of zines since the release of the "Dimension Demented" demo. Some of which we don't even know about. We have recieved mail from zines all over the world to review or interview us."



RH: Whose idea was it to have blacklighted bass drum heads?

Leff: "The blacklite concept was Larry's creation and the bass drum head idea was our second quitarist Don's."

RH: Are there any new songs being worked on? If so, please give details as to style, lyrics, etc. Jeff: "Yes, we have some new material that is much heavier then the "Dimension" demo. Musically and lyrically, it's more on the deathier side of things."

RH: You guys used to have a few songs you did live, like "Abomination" that you don't play anymore. What happened to those songs?

Jeff: "We just felt some of

those songs weren't heavy enough to play live anymore. As the new stuff is much more techno."

RH: What does the band plan to release next in terms of music?

Jeff: "A three song 24 track demo to be recorded at Morrisound Studios. This will be our heaviest release to date. We will be going more into the two lead vocalist, we've got a lot of good response from people about it. It's heavy and there's things two vocalists can do one can't."

RH: Why do some bands in this area like to use smoke machines which pump out smoke which doesn't dissolve and asphyxiates anyone standing too close?

Jeff: "Some bands feel it goes along with their concept. We admit it does get out of hand

sometimes."

RH: Which song do you think is the best one Brutality has written so far?

Jeff: "Our newest song, "Masoleum Of Infringing Evil". It will be on the

RH; What qualities are important in a record company for you?

Jeff: "Quality packaging, distributing and the offers of a tour."

PH: If the interest is there, would you consider playing other states?

Jeff: "Hell yes! We want to play across the U.S. and abroad."

RH: What's the largest number of people you've played for?

Leff: "We played with Nasty Savage at the Sunset club and approximately 200 people showed up. The pit was raging. We've also played with other big name acts such as: Atheist, Nocturnus and Obituary. We got a great response."

RH: Does having a manager help simplify being in the band?

Jeff: "Most definitely.

Managers help out a lot.

When our manager Dustin Hardman entered the picture things started happening."

RH: What do you think would improve the Florida scene?

Jeff: "More clubs for death acts that are willing to help support

I've been pretty much out of the Houston music scene since I started college a year ago but now that summer is here, I'm slowly getting back into it. I celebrated the last day of school by attending the most brutal show of the year (well, I can't actually say it was the most brutal show of the year, since it was my first show of the year) which featured Houston's own Fortress, Forced Entry, Atrophy and Coroner at the After Dark club on May 11th. I only caught a third of Fortress's set, but they certainly have improved since I last saw them live a few years back. Next up was Forced Entry. This three piece band impressed me a lot, but they didn't seem to impress anybody else. There wasn't any movement in the pit during their entire set. Then it was Atrophy. I had never heard their music before (yeah, I know, where in the hell have I been?), but a lot of

The place wasn't even half full. Maybe it was due to the lack of publication or maube because it was a school night? The Axiom finally opened back its doors this month. It was forced to close its doors a few months ago for painting the restroom the wrong color (?) along with other violations. Next month, Morbid Angel will be playing with Houston's own, Dark Reign. This show was made possible by Bill "The Master" Bates (great name, huh?) Speaking of Dark Reign, they have recently released a new demo. I have yet to hear it. I don't have any information about the demo, nor an address but if you write me, I should have a copy of it by then. Dead Horse, one of the bigger bands in Houston, has released another demo. The big news is that representatives of Metal Blade Records were so impressed by their performance in Austin back in April that they sent our four legged friends a contract to

They played for about 20 minutes until the PA was turned off on them. What a bunch of weenles! Academy Black will be going into the studio in June to record a 7" to contain the cuts "Blow Away The Earth", "Dark Horse" and "I Don't Care About You". 



Impetigo, what the fuck kind of name is that?!? A skin disease like Anthrax maybe, ha ha!! Well regardless of the name this band dishes out a sick assault of death/ grind/ thrash. As you know Mark Sawiekis, guitarist, also is the editor of the great Uniforce zine (buy it or die pussy!) and he's happily married to a girl with huge tits!!! Anyways Impetigo has included me on their thanks list so you know they're cool. The new album on Willd Rag Records, is perhaps their best release yet. If you want manical barbaric speed-crazed music with some rather interesting, not to mention long intro's, then pick up a copy of "Ultimo Mondo Cannibale". Here's the interview I did with Mark.

RH: What do you think of the "Giallo" demo now? Mark: "Well, I still think it's pretty cool but obviously it's got some problems though such as weak but not necessarily bad production and it's basically all older tunes and I prefer our newer tunes now as they are a little more complex and better lyrically and structurally. Still I don't have any regrets about it and it served it's purpose by getting us some new listeners and an LP deal."

RH: What was it like recording that demo? Mark: "Much more fun than recording the LP. We recorded all of it in about 4 to 5 hours in an eight track studio here in town, the guy engineering it got a kick out of our song titles and style, he actually thought it was great. We did all of the instruments once and overdubbed the vocals. You should hear Stevo when he's got the music in his head phones and you take off yours and listen to him sing without any music, it's pretty genius. It was generally a fun time, not nearly as much pressure as there was when we recorded the LP."

RH: Who really is the Scabby Man? Mark: "The Scabbyman is an ancient creature, to some it's only folklore but I know better. He walks in the ruins of Stevo's brain and his likeness was summoned onto paper to become lyrics for the song. I don't know, he could be anyone anywhere, he's not a real person which I'm sure you knew that but I'm sure there are quite a few people who fit the bill!"

RH: Why does your vocalist sound like he's walking on hot coals? Mark: "Good guess, but you missed the mark there, actually he has had his foreskin stapled to his stomach, that's what makes him sing that way. I don't know really, it's just what he does. I think his best vocals are on the LP though, he gets better and sicker as time passes."

RH: What do you think of the movie "Bloodsucking Freaks"?

Mark: "I don't like gore or horror movies... ah qot ya, just foolin'. It was one of the first extreme gore movies I ever saw and it has scarred me for life, it's totally genius, one of the most brutal and degrading films ever made, but it's also funny. I usd to be called "Ralphus" ya know! (Poor man-Ed.) Classic flick for any sieko, you ain't shit until you've seen it. There was enough brutal gore and nudity to keep me happy, those are two very key ingredients I look for in a film."

RH: Who would you most like to squirt the sherbet on?

Mark: "I'm pretty happy covering my girlfriend's face and tits with it but I would like to give a squirt to Traci Lords that sex goddess and porn legend (Cardboard bimbo-Ed.) or on Melissa Mounds (Her mams are incredible!-Ed.) or Bunny jo Tyler, both covergirls of Hustler's Busty Beauties, you have not passed the rites of manhood until you subscribe to Busty Beauties!"

RH: What do you think of auto erotic asphyxiation?

Mark: "Isn't that where you hang yourself while you jack off or something, since I'm below average intelligence I'm not exactly sure what it is. But hey, if it's got a healthy mix of self satisfaction and death it can't be all bad, now can it?"

RH: Is anyone in the band into pornos? (Is anyone not into them? Ha ha!-Bryan) Who are your faves? Mark: "All of us but Dannu. his Sunday school teacher won't permit him to watch them. I know Stevo loves Nina Hartley and Scotty likes females! As for me, my faves are: Tracy Lords, Tajia, Patti Plenty, Candy Samples, Seka, Busty Belle, Lotta Topp, Kascha and there are tons more but I get the names and pussies mixed up a lot. I am a big tit freak and collect all kinds of shit on women with big tits that aren't fat! My fave porno though is the 1001 cumshots tape 1 got, it's a two hour tape of all eumshots and it kills!"

RH: Do you think Danzig looks like Elvis?

Mark: "Sure do, he even sounds like him when he's croonin' too. I think it is the bushy side burns which make him resemble the King in his later years. You ain't nothing but a hound dog."

RH: Why is Paul Ramirez such a peckerhead?

Mark: "Why? I think it's because he caught a nasty case of mange from fucking the stray dogs in his neighborhood. Also the bag ladies that pick through his trash have been witholding sex from him and there is nothing worse than a sex starved Mr. Grindcore rocker!"

RH: What would be the ultimate show to play?

Mark: "Any show with GG Allin as he is the ultimate live performer that no one can (or would want to) duplicate. He totally rules (from jail!-Ed). I would also like to play with either Carcass or Xysma (what's the difference?-Ed.) but that



probably won't happen so I'll just play with myself."

RH: Do you have any fave TV shows? Mark: "Fuck yes, I'm a TU and video junkie. My favorite shows are: ALF Wonder Years, Tour Of Duty, Andy Griffith, Hogan Family, Sanford and Son, Beverly Hillbillies, Simpsons, Married With Children (Kelly Bundy needs the sherbet shot on her face!-Bryan), Lost In Space, Leave It To Beaver, America's Most Wanted, Totally Hidden Video, Addams Family, The Munsters, Twilight Zone, Monsters, Alien Nation and loads of others too."

RH: Tell us about the LP, what songs will be on it, etc.?

Mark: "It's called "Ultimo Mondo Cannibale" and it should be out on Wild Rags Records. There will be 16 songs on the cassette and LP but 14 are the same and two different on each so you have to buy both of them so we can become rich and quit our jobs. They were going to have different covers on them too but now both of them have been banned because people that press the record sleeves won't press it. They were too sexually violent to put out without possiblu getting in trouble. It sucks cause some really sick and cool art was lost due to wimps. We are working on a new cover. The LP will have all of the songs off the "Giallo" demo as well as 6 or 7 new ones and some ôlder ones totally redone. Some of the new ones are "Maggots" "Dis-organ-ized", "Bloody Pit of Horror" and quite a few more."

RH: How did you get the deal with Wild Rags
Records?
Mark: "Just been talking and working with Rich for awhile since I have the zine and the band and he was looking for a weird band to do something

zine and the band and he was looking for a weird band to do something different with and that weren't rockstars with attitudes out to only make money so he picked us. No big story about us paying our dues out on the road and starving or anything."

RH; What will the cover art look like? Mark: "Well, I kinda covered that and it sadly will not be as planned. The old covers both dealt with cannibals and had them cooking or eating a penis but that got us in trouble with the town council here, they actually wrote to stores telling them not to sell our LP when it comes out because it violates a pornographu ordinance. Gimme a break! (Yeah, ever heard of mail order?-Ed.) It'll now be along the cannibal lines but it cannot have any nudity like the last one. (Why not, how else do you cook a human body!?-Ed.) Bummer cause the old LP cover was totally over the top and brutal, one of the sickest ever in my opinion, I guess you could say they are the lost covers!"

RH: What bands have you played with?

Mark: "We've played with a variety of bands such as Macabre, Aftermath, Mortar, Dead Silence, Affirmitive Action, The Vandals, Bhopal Stiffs, Bloody Mess and The Scabs and several more. Muscially our best show was probably the one we did a few weeks back with Life Sentence and The


Plague, it was our tightest set most likely. But the funnest was probably the one with Mortar in December, Stevo puked up blue blood!"

RH; So when are you getting married Mark?

Mark; "July 7th and no one is invited. It'll be great! Scotty will have been married for over a year then. He's already been hitched. Of course it will be a nude wedding and GG Allin as my best man! I am marrying Gale Gozongas too!"

RH: What are your fave bands at the moment? Mark: "New Kids On The Block and Motley Crue! Only Crue is real! Well actually I've been listening to Splatterreah (same thing as Motleu Crue!-Bryan), Funebre, Deceased, Macabre, Deathstrike, Abomination, Master (aren't those three the same band?-Ed.), Repulsion, Cadaver, Bolt Thrower, Bloody Mess and The Scabs, Carnivore, Doom, Anal Cunt, Berketa, Carcass, Entombed, Morbid Angel and stuff like that." (What about that new Judas Priest?-Ed.)

RH; What's your view on zines? Mark: "Definitely a rear view! What can I say, it's great fun for me, I enjoy helping out bands and the response gets better with each issue now. It takes a lot of time and money (no kidding?-Bryan) but I think it pays off. Fanzines keep the underground going. Look for my #7 out in April of '90. It will be my heaviest issue yet with over 100 demo reviews." (Hey, you didn't

Here is an interview I got with Barney while Mapalm Death was recording their latest album "Harmony Corruption". Of course this is a Benediction interview and as you may already know Barney the much hailed vocalist is no longer with this band. He was however with the band long enough to be on Benediction's bone-crunching first album "Subconscious Terror". The album is much in the same vein as Massacre, but that's what you really want any way you death metal dork! Here's the int. with this unique glamcore goon.

RH: When was Benediction formed? Barney: "The band was formed back in February

RH: Why did you name the band Benediction?

Barney: "Well, actually the first reason was because of a song of the same title "Benediction" on the first Terrorizer demo. I thought it was a cool name so I snapped it up. Also the literal meaning of the word is a good blessing and Catholic celebration which is a complete opposite to our music so the name was ideal."

RH: How did the deal with

Nuclear Blast Records
come about?
Barney: "Mick (Napalm
Death) sent our demo to
Marcus of Nuclear Blast
and straight away he said
he wanted to do an LP
with us."

RH: Many people compare Benediction to Massacre, do you agree with this? Barney: "Everybody who has heard us comments on this and I would be a fool to deny it (not that I'd want to anyway!) We are influenced by them in a very big way. Kam is god and they are one of my all time fave bands."

RH: How has your response been as far as live shows go?

Barney: "We get great audience feedback because we try to put a bit of entertainment and humour into our show instead of just going on stage and banging out number after number. I like to think perhaps that we capture the feel of old Massacre live shows."

RH; How do you manage to have the vocals that you have without any effects on them? Barney: "It takes a lot of effort and powerful lungs

pay for that plug!-Ed.)

RH: Any last comments?
Mark: "Thanks for the cool interview Bry and keep up the excellent work with Invincible Force, a lot of people have been writing me with kind words about your zine so I give you a pat on the back fella! Everyone check out our LP when it comes out, hopefully it'll be to your

fancy! Until then take it sleazy, corpse sodomizers! Is Charlie Daniels your dad? (yes, only country music is real! Yahoo!-Bryan)



(or alternately 68 cigarettes a day! Ha!) and it helps if you have a deep voice but what a lot of extreme vocalists don't realize is to get full power you should sing straight from the lungs and not from the back of the throat."

RH: When will the first LP be out? Barney: "Hopefully, the middle of May."

RH; Could you describe for us the Benediction album cover? Barney: "It's sort of like an abstract painting. At the bottom of the cover there's the sea with a face coming out of it and at the top is the moon. Within the moon there is a skull. Arms come out of either side of the moon and are plunging a knife into the face in the sea. I guess it's sort of a nightmare, hence the LP title "Subconscious Terror"."

RH: How would you say the response has been to Benediction as a whole?
Barney: "We've had a killer response from the underground (support it!) and thanks to all those people."

RH: What are your fave bands at the moment?

Barney: "Massacre, Beath, Entombed, Hellwitch, Deathstrike, Master, Executioner, Obituary, Morbid Angel, Vader, Nasty Savage (oh yeah, isn't that a side band for the drummer of Assuck?-Bryan), Motorhead, Immolation, Manowar, Savatage, King Diamond,

Nocturnus, Paradise Lost, Bolt Thrower, Carcass (killer! total gore gods!-Bryan), Explicit Hate, Autopsy, Pestilence, Terrorizer plus tons more that I can't think of right now."

RH; On your first LP I noticed some intros. Why did you decide to use intros?

Barney; "I just love intros!"

RH: Is Laurent Merle of Peardrop zine really a wimp? Barney: "Laurent is a glamcore bro! Nah, he's a great friend. Keep shredding pal!"

RH: What do you think of people who think Napalm Death are rockstars?

Barney: "This is something

that really makes us fucking angry. Just because we sell a lot of records, does this make us fuckin' rockstars? We have no desire to be treated differently to anyone else and we are not the big fuckin' rich band that everyone thinks. We earn just enough to get by. Also, we still answer our letters and always let anubodu backstage at gigs. We wish to make more friends as it is possible around the world, it matters a lot to us. So to all those people who say these things, why don't you just fuck off and go and slay the real rockstars like all those fuckin' glam bands and leave us alone. We don't need to justify



ourselves to you."

RH: What new songs do you have?
Barney: "We have two new songs. One with lyrics, "Secondlife Jeopardy" and one without."

RH: What is the current scene like in regards to death metal?

Barney: "There's still only a few bands besides
Benediction, i.e. Paradise
Lost, Bolt Thrower, Carcass: We need more."

RH; Do you think you will be able to continue with Benediction even though you are also in Napalm Death?

Barney: "Yes, I can't see any problems. I do music fulltime. Also the rest of the lads in Benediction work hard on the music so I would never want to let them down."

RH: Who in the band writes the lyrics? What are they primarily about? What inspires the lyrics?

Barney: "I write all the lyrics and mainly they revolve around reverse realities, unrealities, nightmares, ect. Sort of a Twilight Zone approach."

RH; Will Benediction ever tour?
Barney: "Yes, very soon to back up the new LP I hope."


RH: Any last comments or future plans?

DEATH METAL: UNDERGROUND MUSIC OR MONEYMAKER?

Many of you are no doubt aware of the reformation of a number of death metal bands that were popular years back, but broke up for one reason or another. Along with the increasing number of death metal bands getting signed, this signals the growing trendiness of death metal. Some of the older bands

that are getting back together are doing so for good reasons, but others, such as Master, are probably in it only for the money. Everywhere you look nowadays, labels are snapping up death bands left and right. Some of these bands certainly deserve a shot at vinyl, while others clearly have no business in a studio. And then there are the inevitable clones who latch onto another band's sound because it's popular at the time and they think metal fans can't tell the difference. And many bands are just plain generic, suffering from lack of imagination in songwriting or the over use of vocal effects. Death metal was a hip thing to be into in 1990 and do doubt it will continue to be trendu this year. Fans of the underground should think more about new bands starting up and also some bands already signed on smaller labels. Don't buy something just because theu sound like Carcass or your friends are into it. Being influenced by another band is not a crime, but a good band shouldn't sound so much like that band that there's no difference. Instead, they should pursue their own direction and practice getting better, because with all the bands who have records out there, only the really good or original bands will be able to make much impact on the market. On another aspect of this topic, the Earache / Combat deal will certainly help all of the bands on the label, maybe even getting a Grindcrusher tour started in the States. but it has also had a

negative effect by exposing these bands to people who don't know shit about death metal. Take for example the US tour of Careass, That was a great show and I would have gone to see them if I could have, but now a lot of people who've never heard that kind of music say they're into Carcass. They used to be a real underground band and numerous fanzines referred to them as grindcore, but now they could be labeled simply as death metal. Even though the band doesn't want to be labeled, the fans have done it for them. Also, the radical change in Mapalm Death's sound has helped death metal become popular to a great extent, and it has people divided as to whether or not they like the new direction. To all the good death metal bands out there who are making a contribution and being original, I say keep kicking ass. To all the clones and generic bands, give it up and get a life.

As you all know the Slayer story, no need to waste lines here, but I can tell you that we got this interview with Kerry King in Paris when they played along with Megadeth/ Testament and Suicidal Tendencies. (intro by Chris Aubert).

RH: How do you percieve in advance tonight's show?
Kerry: "It's gonna be pretty wild, a couple of

nights ago we played in Holland about 10,000, the shows are getting better every night, this is going to be the eighth show on this Clash Of The Titans thing and everybody's getting better, so it should be pretty wild."

RH: And there's going to be about six or seven thousand people in France just for that and you are more than a cult band, but I'm sure that at least 78% of the people will be at the gig tonight for you, so it'll be kind of an event.

Kerry: "Yeah, it'll be pretty wild. First time anybody in France gets to see us, I don't know if the other bands have played here or not."

RH: How is the tour going so far?
Kerry: "It's going over pretty well, we played Spain for the first time, none of the bands have been to Spain, everybody went over real well, the problem we thought might occur would be fans getting tired before we get on, but it seems like they're saving up in most places so

RH: How did the idea of a double headliner bill come at first?

Kerry: "Tom says he came up with the idea for it and our management tried to make it happen and the idea is for kids to spend the amount of money they would for any show and get more for their money, it seems to be working, it's a big show and you get to see a number of bands





instead of just one and I think that's kind of important."

RH: When "South Of Heaven" was released, a number of true hardcore Slayer fans were more or less disappointed because they thought it was too slow or whatever, how do you see that afterwards, because it seemed that you didn't gain any new audience because "South Of Heaven" didn't sell as many as "Reign In Blood".

Kerry; "Well as long as you sell more anyway. you've done better. After we did "Reign In Blood" we didn't want to do another one, because it was pretty much as far as we felt we wanted to go that way, so we did "South Of Heaven" and we didn't try to write it slow, that's just the way it came out, we were into doing something different, it was a first try, it wasn't the best versions of everything so on this new record, we've kind of gone in between the two and

worked out all the bad points and I think this about the most complete record that we've done for quite awhile."

Rti. Where do you get your inspiration when writing the lyrics on the new LP, there are still a lot of songs which are death inspired, but there are also different ground.

Kerry: "Tom writes about 50% of the lurics now and when he writes, he writes about things he's read, reality type of things like serial killers and stuff, and when I write songs I just make things up completely, like you reading a horror story, like fiction and I think that's a good offset for us because you get somebody that's saying something and you get something that's just for enjoyment like a movie or a novel, that's the way I like to do it because I'm the kind of guy that if I give an opinion in a song, some people are gonna like it, some aren't, to where if you're just making something up, you don't have that problem, so I've always taken that route more or less."

EH: It was funny because the other day I was listening to "Chemical Marfare" and at the time journalists said it was completely fiction, but when I listened to the news I heard that China was selling 7888 tons of chemicals to Saddarn Hussein in the Gulf just in case of a war, so don't you think sometimes reality overtakes fiction? Kerry: "When you make up something fictional, there's always a chance that some day's gonna come and it's not going to be fiction anymore, but there's a couple more examples, since we wrote "Chemical Marfare" and what you just mentioned came into being and now we've got "War Ensemble" on the new record and you've got the Middle East problem, when we wrote it there was nothing going on in the Middle East, so you always get that coincidence tupe of thing, and you wonder, did they write that because this is going on, that song was probably made up six months ago. Something that you write as fiction but it could be reality. like a lot of the stuff I write couldn't be reality, there's a

difference in there, but some of that stuff, especially the war songs we write, they may turn out to be someday."

RH: Such as "Blood Red", it's talking about the lack of freedom in countries such as China, communist countries.

Kerry: "Yeah, that's what Tom wrote that about, about the uprising in China a while back."

RH; What are your plans after the tour is over? Do you plan to tour in



Being one of the premier death metal outfits in Europe (if not #1), Entombed recently unleashed a brutal masterpiece on Earache Records called "Left Hand Path". This LP really shreds and Combat chose them with Morbid Angel for the first two Earache products to be released domestically in the US. So I figured I had to investigate this combo formed by ex-Nihilist members. This is an interview with guitarist Uffe Cederlund done when I was in Stockholm, Sweden recently to bring you the most recent news on the death metal country of old Europe and it's hottest sensation: Entombed. (And unlike a certain zine from New York, this is a long interview with them!-Ed.)

RH: Well, before going into the real Entombed stuff, here is some background questions about your previous experiences. I think that before forming Nihilist

Nicke Andersson (drums) formed a hardcore band, right? Could you tell us what he did with this band any demo tapes, live gigs... Uffe: "That band was called Brain Marp. Hihilist has nothing to do with BIA! I was a big fan of BW! It was not really a hardcore band, they had some Voi Vod inspired tracks! Really godly stuff! Well, Nicke wants to forget everything about it. They did just a couple of rehearsal tapes."

RH: So then he formed Nihilist in 1987, what was the first lineup?

Uffe: "It was Nicke, Alex and Leffe who formed Nihilist! They were the lineup for a year or so. I was helping them with the vocals and later the rhythm guitar! I really enjoyed it cuz Nicke was a really good friend of me and I met Alex and Leffe which are also cool guys!"

RH; Before joining Nilhilst. you, Uffe Cederland (quitars) played in Morbid, could you give us a basic story of this band including your two demo topes, different lineups, live gigs, etc... Uffe: "I joined Morbid August '87! There's not really a story behind this band. I would like to forget about this! Ha ha! Well, we did a demo called "December Moon" under the line up: Dead-vocals, L.G.-drums, Jensa-bass, me and John

Lennart on the guitars! We split up after the demo then to rejoin under a new line up. Me and Zoran on guitars, Jensa on bass, L.G. on drums and John Coltman on voice. We did a demo couple of months later which is shit! I really hate this demo! We did not many gigs! Everyone hated us cuz our evil image! That was coo!! Well, we ended up everything cuz we were shit!"

RH: Then you formed Infuriation, it's basically the same kind of question as for Morbid...

Uffe: "Infuriation was me on guitar and L.G. on drums. We rehearsed two times, did two songs and two rehearsal tapes. Nothing more. We split up cuz L.G. joined Nihilist full time as a singer."

RH: In March 1988, Nihilist released their first demo tape, "Premature Autopsy"; could you tell us more about it, tracks on it, sales, reaction and interest... L.G. Petrov (vocals) sang on this tape as a session vocalist, right?

Uffe: "It got very good response in the underground scene. But we were not satisfied with it. I guess it sold about 300–400 copies. "Sentenced To Death", "Supposed To Rot" and "Carnal Leftovers" were the tracks. Yes, L.G. was a session singer. I was also playing on this demo as a

session guitarist!"

RH: In Nov. 1988, Nihilist

played several gigs and at that time it was really the explosion of the Swedish scene, could you tell us more about that? Uffe: "It was not good to be a death metal band at that time. It was a hardcore trend in Sweden. I was just 30-50 people on the gigs! It was when Nihilist played with Napalm Death at the same time things started to happen. Lots of people thought Mihilist were better than N.D.! That was also the first time Dia heard about Nihilist." (Who ignores Dig is Earache loss?-Chris)

RH: In 1989, Nihilist released two demo tapes "Only Shreds Remain" and "Drowned" and then LG joined permanently and you did the "OSR" as a session guitarist and joined Nihilist for "D."? Could you describe these two tapes as you did for the first one? Uffe: "Only Shreds Remain" was released early '89 but was recorded '88 in Sunlight Studio. I didn't play on this demo but LG was a permanent member at that time. This demo had a godly response everywhere! People are still writing and asking for it! This demo was the demo Mihilist needed! It was also No. 1 for two or three months in a very big metal magazine from England (I've forgot the name). I joined Mihilist March '89! Leffe moved to Canada, so I

Joined Instead of him! We did a gig in April '89, it was the first time that we saw that a death metal scene existed in Stockholm Sweden. It was 350 persons there. Well, we recorded the third demo "Drowned". We were not satisfied with this demo! The studio was absolutely shit!"

RH: On several copies of "Drowned" there are two extra tracks "Face Of Evil" and "Radiation Sickness" of Repulsion. Is it true that you plan to release "FOE" on your second album? And you plan to record a cover tune too; which one? "Under The Sun" (Black Sabbath) or "Crupt Of Terror" of Genocide (MI) are possibilities right now? Uffe: "Yes, we recorded those two tracks cuz we had some time leftover, we hate it! I don't think we'll record "FOE" on the next album, it'll be "Severe Burns" instead! There won't be any cover either. We had plans to do "Apocaluptic Marrior" of the gods Devastation (IL) but we discovered after all that we just want to do our own tracks on albums!"

RH; During summer 1989, Nicke and you split up Mihilist coz rehearsal time was a real pain between you and your former bass player Johnny; and a few days later you asked LG and Alex Hellid (quitars) to join and so they did and then Entombed was born. Don't you think it's a little bit sad to split up Nihilist only to get rid of him? It should have been easier to tell him the situation, no? Uffe: "It was not really just because of Johnny we split

up. Everything was Just so fucked up, y'know. Me and Nicke split up Nihilist, yes, and then to form Entombed. After some days we realized that we just couldn't give up everything. We just changed the name. We've realized now that the best thing was to kick out Johnny. Really sad! Well, Johnny is a really cool guy! Everything is fine these days! I think it feels better to call us Entombed."

RH: Certainly the most cliche' type of question on your band: why this change from Nihilist to Entombed? I guess a part of the answer is in we needed a refreshment. We had to do this otherwise we could not have done any songs, etc. We had to get back the emotion to create again. I think Entombed sounds more death than Nihilist!"

RH: In Sept. '89, you released the first and last Entombed demo tape "But Life Goes On". Could you please describe each song and give us background on the sales, response worldwide? Uffe; "We (me and Nicke) did the music/ songs on six rehearsal times. We asked LG if he were interested in singing with us. Well, we just recorded the demo and released it. We've sold about 1000 copies now. The response has been ultimate godlu! This demo was also a part of what made Earache offer us a deal."

RH: Earache (now established as the best death metal label, not only for the releases but also for the way they treat the bands) really liked the "Drowned" tape, but they heard you split up Nihilist so they

forgot the idea to sign you and then you released "But Life Goes On" so they naturally came to you this time? Could you give us some information about the deal? Uffe: "Well, Dig heard about the split but he phoned us anyway. We told him about Entombed and sent him the demo. This was it, they told us to record an album. The deal is four albums, we can record stuff when we feel for it! We get

good money, cool offers

from gigs, etc. I'm

satisfied with them."

RH: In Dec. 1989 you recorded your first album (out on June 4th, any details about the release date in USA?) (Yeah, Chris, it's out now!-Ed.), wasn't it a bit of a problem to record with no bass player and having you and Nicke playing bass? Utie: "We recorded the album on 100 hours and it cost 1000 pounds. Quite cheap? It was not a problem to do the bass. it's just to play as the guitars! That's perhaps boring but what should've we done?"

RH: I think that sometimes on the album the sound is not that great. I mean it's difficult to hear what's happening here and there. I think d as the best death metallabel, not only for the releases but also for the way they treat the bands) really liked the "Drowned" tape, but they heard you split up Mihilist so they forgot the idea.

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RH: I think that sometimes on the album the sound is not that great, I mean it's difficult to hear what's happening here and there. I think that the "BLGO" demo has the ultimate (or so) sound for Entombed with guitars up front, hasn't it? Lifte: "I know what you mean! What I miss on the album sound is the heaviness from the demo and the vocals!"

RH: And on the last track on the CD version, LG has lost his voice. Is it for this reason that the singing sounds different or was it recorded in a different session? I mean, is it LG's voice problems that explain such a difference between that particular song and the rest of the album?

LIFFE: "We were tired, it was the last song we mixed. We should used this effect sometimes. But we didn't care, We had it in the whole song!"

RH; One month after the release date you've already sold 12000 copies of your album: you're number one of the independent releases in Holland and number five in UK; you have great reviews everywhere (if you see a bad one, send a copy!). Isn't it difficult to stay down to earth people with such an amazing success for a death metal band? Uffe: "We are all rock stars! Ha ho! Well, it's really funny to see that everyone seems to like the album. I'm not this kind of person being a star. He've sold 2000 copies now." (End of October-Chris)

R出: You've been recently offered by Combat Records to be part of the Death/Pestilence US tour but you refused. Is it caz you're waiting for the next album to be more mature to "attack" the States and that you prefer to headline after your second album? And two of you guys (Alex and Lars) couldn't afford to go out for awhile due to full time occupations, right? Uffe: "Yes, it's better to have two records behind the set! We're not really ready to do US yet, we left it to Carcass. I don't like Chuck's attitude as well, he seems to be an asshole!"

RH: Anyway, you have some tours planned. could you please tell us more about these projects with Disharmonic Orchestra, Xysma...? Uffe; "We'll first do a German tour with Mapalm Death and Protector in October, It'll be very big. It's also very important for us, we've to promote this first album. Right after the German tour we are going to do another tour with Disharmonic Orchestra and Sinister, We'll visit countries like: Sweden. Finland, Denmark. Belgium, Holland, Germany (W+E), Poland, Spain and more. Everything is not booked yet. This will be killer shows!"

RH: Could you give our readers (all five of them-Ed.) some main line ideas for new songs like "Forsaken", "Evilynn", "Nothing Dies"? **Liffe:** ""Forsaken" is about a guy who looking into the sun and wonder whu! He discovers that he's forsaken! Really weird! "Evilynn" is about a girl who died but she's not leaving you alone, she's wanting you forever, It's an evil love storu! Uffe: "Yes, it'll be released quite soon on CBR Records. We are not that happy with the sound on it. What the hell! It's just a bloody sample LP!"

RH: On one of your latest songs you're using a riff from "Sentenced To Death" from your first demo (Hihilist). Will you intend to do that for other songs and./or will you use any old songs for your second LP like "Severe Burns" the "Drowned" tape? Uffe: "Me're not playing that riff in "Dead Sea" any longer. We are playing "Sentenced To Death" again! We'll record "Sentenced To Death" and "God Of Thunder" (of Kiss) soon for an EP (That EP quahta fuckin' rule!-Ed). Ide'll use

"Severe Burns" on the next album!"

RH: In six months in 1990 you've already done four tours with label mates Careass. What kind of experience have you taken from all these gigs? Any gig worth mentioning for any special reason? Uffe: "We've seen Caronss live lots of times! We think that every gig we're doing is an experience. We're much better live now. We know how to do a very fast soundcheck, etc. We did our best gig in Bradford, England. The sound, lights, crowd and stage crews were just amazing! A really cool gia! Our best gig ever!"

RH: On the first song of your album you're using the theme of the movie "Phantasm" written by Fred Mirrow but I don't see his name mentioned on the inner sleeve, don't you think that may cause you certain problems to use his stuff abusing the copyright, if you are? Uffe: "I hope not! I don't think it's any problems! It's harder if you're playing a cover with luries, no one cares about the music, it's just the lyrics! You can't change the lyrics except of





Dave: "Mike's new image is that of a surf punk."

Mike: "No, I'll be wearing a pink tutu with a nice ribbon in my hair."

RH: You've already been getting mountains of mail since the news of the reformation has spread, how do you plan on dealing with the even greater amounts in the future due to the demo? Bob: "Carefully, If it gets out of hand I'll have

someone close to me that I can trust, help out. It won't be like the last line up when people didn't hear from the band for six months. Yes, I did help out on catching up with their mail before."

RH: Will the demo be packaged professionally?

Bob: "No, it'll look like it came from K-mart. I think that's where we'll buy the tapes. Only if it's during a blue light sale. No, really we haven't talked about it at all."

RH: Europe has a lot of Possessed fans, who are probably dying to hear the new songs. Would you consider signing to an overseas label that had great distribution over there, but limited distribution here? Mike: "I have no comment." Bob: "Actually, we haven't thought about that at all."

EH: Do you have an artist working on some art for the band already?

Mike: "We have plenty of artists working with us right now, so I'm sorry but we can't use you." (Psychotic laughter in the background)—Ed.)

RH: How would you describe Mike's voice?

Bob: "Lady like."
Mike: "Fuck you, slink."

Bob: "We haven't really worked on it yet but if ! could scream anyone can."

RH: What are some of your fave bands? Bob: "Iron Maiden, GBH, Agnostic Front, Violence, Neurosis, Megadeth, Slayer, etc, etc." Dave: "Watchtower, Fates Warning, Dead Horse, Rigor Mortis, etc., etc."

PH: Is Mike writing most of the music or is the band contributing parts here and there? Mike: "I'm doing most of it right now."

RH: Lyrically the band has changed, do you plan to do one or two new songs like the old ones?

Mike: "Yeah!"

Bob: "Lyrically, we're not much different, just the Satanic references are gone."

RH: Would the band like to stay where it is, or would they consider moving somewhere else?
Mike: "We'll stay here."
Bob: "Yeah, there is so much fun things to do in Pinole, like hanging out at the bowling alley."

RH: Do you think fanzines are more honest than magazines like Kerrap!, Metal Farces, etc?

Dave: "It depends on the magazine."

Mike: "It depends also on the person doing it."

RH: With a few other legendary bands forming, do you think some of them are in it for the bucks?
Dave: "The Who did."
Bob: "I'm sure there are. I feel honored to be in this band, Possessed was a huge influence upon my first band. Desecration."
Mike: "I'm doing it because I feel the kids want to hear more of the fast and heavy stuff."

RH: Than× for the interview, any last comments for all five of my readers?

RH; With the new surge in the popularity of death metal, do you consider the scene might well fall into the same pool of unoriginality, as did the Bay Area of San Francisco thrash metal scene some

years ago? Jakob: "I think already many bands are just playing death metal 'cause it has become a question of popularity, many bands divide their style into death metal to get more popular and that's a bad thing, 'cause at least there will be too many death metal bands around. I think already now there's 1000's of bands which sound similar to each other, death metal has become far too trendy in my opinion, it seems like everyone who likes death metal also needs to have his own band and it doesn't matter it you can play or not. It's a bad attitude, it will mean that the death metal scene will die at last, I think."

RH; In the time you've been together as invocator, how have you personally seen the attitudes of record labels change towards death metal?

lakob; "Right now every record company wants to sign death metal because it's a fashion music style right naw, it's good to see that labels open their minds about death metal, but I think most of them are just doing it to make money. Ir you don't play death metal it can be hard to get a deal, I know we have tried to send material to nearly every label and most labels give us a plain HO, maybe because we are playing more death thrash metal and not pure death metal, I don't know if this is true, but anyway, it's good to see labels beginning to be more interested in the underground, it's just a pity to see many unoriginal death metal bands getting signed just because they play death metal."

to read this interview. Mike would like all you girls to send nude photos." <u>QH</u>; Do you think there is any danger in death metal becoming a trendy thing to be seen by others to be into (as it has sadly become here in Australia)?

Jakob; "I think I have already

Jakob: "I think I have already answered this question, but again, yes, I think it's dangerous 'cause all bands and people want to play death metal or form a death metal band and at last everything will be a copy of yet another band."

PH: Invocator - would you consider yourselves one of the more well supported bands in Denmark by the fans? How has the scene changed in Denmark in your own eyes, since bands like Desexult once reigned supreme in the early to mid 80's and they too released a killer magazine in Blackthorn? Jakob: "I think we get a lot of support by people, we have sold 1200 copies of the "Alterations" demo and that means that people are into what we're doing and that's cool, I think we're the only band here in DK playing the style we do, other bands play more thrash/power metal, and at the moment people want more deadly music, so they support us very well. I think the scene has become much better since Desexult started of course they have done a lot to this, also by making Blackthorn, it has given the underground a push in the right direction here in DK. Right now it's also a lot easier to get gigs and arrange gigs, earlier it was harder to get gigs, 'cause the places didn't want to do metal concerts, so the underground is in the right direction, but it certainly still could be a lot better."

RH; You told me that on the Grindcrusher tour, Morbid Angel only attracted the same number of people as invocator did at the same venue only one week earlier. Is this indicative of people's not really knowing about the Florida scene or just that the venue cannot handle larger crowds? <u>Jakob:</u> "It's right but it masn't the same venue we played at, there was only 150 people to see Morbid Angel/riapaim Death in Copenhagen, I think people in Copenhagen are more into bigger bands and not bands like Morbid Angel, etc. We are lucky we can get more people to our gigs because we are a Danish band and some people here know us, but to be honest, the scene in Copenhagen is dead. over here in Esbjerg there's Way

more people to a norman underground gig, when we play our hometown about 350-400 are coming, and that's cool, people here in our area really are into the harder form of music."

BH: How big a part is the subject of religion in the new tyrics?

Jakob: "The new tyrics don't deal with religion, Per our drumme? has written some new tyrics and they are involved with different topics and his own feelings about it, but I don't think there's anything about religion."

RH: On the subject of religion, what is your account of the ordinary people in the Arab states being so easily sucked into a prospective war with the Western world by their leader proclaiming divine duty to spread Islam to every corner of the planet (a view held by 1/4 or the earth's people who sadly place their lives in the hands of a religious belief called Islam)? Jakob: "I think it's very dangerous, these people are really fanatic about their religion and they will do everything to spread it and to crush the Western world which in their eyes is the devil himself. The situation down there right now is frightening I think, maybe this could be the start to a new world war, cause all countries are more or less involved with the crisis situation down there."

RH: Anyone can hear that you guys have progressed to become better song writers without falling to the temptation of becoming clones. The "Alterations" demo is one of the best to be released, yet do the zines support you as much as you would like? Jakob: "Ves, I think most zines have supported us very well, we have been in numerous zines and have always gotten good reviews. Anyway it seems like record labels seemed to be interested in it. Actually the offer from Wild Rags was one of the few offers we got, other companies haven't been interested. But we have to thank all the zines to have supported us so much, we get many letters everudoù, because people have seen us in a zine and that's cool, it helps us to get more known."

<u>RH</u>; How did you come to commit your next vinul releases to Wild Raas Records?

Jakob; "Richard C. who runs the label has sold our demo and we have ta:Iked with him about a record deal and he always has been interested in the band. First we would do the special "Alterations" 12" EP with CCG Records in England, but Richard gave us a much better offer and that's cool. That's how we signed with him for the 12" EP, I hope this EP will help us a lot to get more known and also so people can get a chance to hear the "Alterations" demo, you know many people don't buy demos so here we have a chance to reach even more people."

RH; Is it out of the question to hope for a small tour within the Eastern Coast scenes of the USA such as Florida, New York, New Jersey and so on? (I ask this because already some members of our scene in Florida have been to Europe, as well as people from the West Coast).

Jakob; "I don't know, it could be extremely cool to tour the States, but it's difficult for us to sit here and do anything, we need help from guys over there to help us arrange the gigs and do all the stuff for the promotion, etc. Maybe Wild Rags can help us or some of the other bands on the label, also it's a question about money, it's quite expensive just to get to the USA, but I hope it could be possible some day."

BH: Just how many labels have shown interest in the band? Jakob: "Only a few small labels. CMFT Records was interested, Underground Records from Sweden and Wild Rags, so I think you all know why we chose Wild Rags."

Jakob: "In the last 3-4 months we have been playing a lot of gigs in Denmark and other places, we've played in Germany with Blood, Gorefest and Deathcore and several gigs in Denmark with bands like Deadhead (NL), Hysteriah GBC (Sweden) and Prestige (Finland) and we'll play upcoming gigs in Sweden and 3 dates in Finland with Prestige and later we'll support Tankard at a gig here in Denmark. Also we have been working on new material and practicing a lot of new ideas.

RH: Not being in touch with Ronny Eide much these days; how was his band Emptor live? What was the reaction from the crowds?

Jakob: "The crowd liked Emptor, but well, they don't play very well and also I know Ronny has left the band and now is a member of Swedish Suffer. Also Emptor was quite stoned when they played, but they are nice guys helio Dag and Ronny!"

PH: What do you guys do besides working on your mags and getting invocator released on vinyl? Do you guys like to party or what?

Jakob: "Besides all the stuff with zines and band, etc. we don't do much, I have no work and Jacob Hansen also doesn't work, Jesper and Per are at school. We like to party!"



RH: Could you list all the merchandise available from Invocator at the moment? Jakob: "The merchandise available right now is the following: black or white t-shirt with "Alterations" design size XL or L, \$12, black shirt with "Biossom And Decay" design L only (big size), all shirts with backprint. Stickers 2 for \$1, pics 4 for \$3 and hey 1 forgot to say that the "Blossom..." shirt is \$12. And also the 12" "Alterations" EP is available from us or Wild Rags, \$12 incl. postage. That's all."

RH: What can you tell us about the forthcoming vinyl releases by Invocator? Will your album/ EP covers be more "conventional" (by this I mean using colour, etc.) or like the other WRP releases using only a limited amount of effects? Jakob: "I cannot say much about this. The 12" EP will have the same cover as the demo, it will of course look much better and it has been redone a bit. That's all I can say, also I think other WRR releases look professional and they are also professional cause many of the releases have free posters and stuff."

RH: Please comment on the following releases: Entombed "Left Hand Path", Napalm Death "Harmony Corruption", Deicide debut LP, Obituary "Cause Of Death" and Hellwitch "Szygial Miscreancy" LP. Jakob; "I like the Entombed LP a lot, anyway I think it gets kind of boring in someways, but it kills anyway. "Harmony Corruption" is a really fave LP of mine, I love it, the best from Hapalm Death so far, I hope they continue this way. The Deicide LP is also one of my fave albums, some of the heaviest shit ! have ever heard, very cool. "Cause of Death" is disappointing, I like "Slowly..." a lot more, the solos or James Murphy don't fit that well into the Obituary style, anyway, their cover version of "Circle Of The Tyrants" is very cool, also live the new songs are very good. The debut LP from our labelmates Hellwitch is some of the best original death metal I have heard in awhile, very good indeed, very good debut release, much better than their demos."

RH: Taking into consideration unsigned underground bands, who do you see as being a band worthy of more attention? Other than Invocator, of course....

Jakob: "What band could I think of?. It seems like every new good death metal band already are signed... maybe Revenant, they are a really cool band and of course Exmortis (Hello Brian!), they really deserve a deal here and now! And also Cynic and the Gulf and Ritual Sarcifice, they deserve a deal, some of the

best bands in my opinion!"

BH; Anything I may have neglected to include? Please comment dude. Thanks a lot and best of luck with the forthcoming vinyls.

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

I was never a big fan of the compilation tapes, and it's not with tapes like that that I'll become one. This is for a couple of simple reasons: first of all, most of the time it's cuttings from official recordings that I aiready know, the layout generally sucks and bad bands are more present than good ones (it seems that the gays doing these tapes fill 60' or 90' with what they can find). Here we have a couple of good bands that we already reviewed here like Darkthrone/ Geronimo/ invocator and these ones are definitely the best to remember here. There's also well known bands like Agathodes/ Carbonized that are not impressive at all here. The others, well, Regicide are coming on first with their interesting techno thrash, with a somewhat Zetroish singer. Hoise band like Systematic Massmurder may be interesting for tank of Dollsh grindrore. The Dutch band Dead Head, who seems to have an increasing following in Europe is not the hottest stuff but they might go somewhere if they avoid the Kreator (Pleasure To Kill) influences in the future. Afflicted Convulsion are now starting their Paradise Lost period like so many bands today, but they have fast ports thrown in too, so got as boring as Paradise Lost are. As Asphur, Afflicted Convulsion have definitely more ideas in the slow parts than in the fast parts, but their track is good. it's another M.G.S. band (Might Or Somewhere), I don't know Where the hell Little Devil is coming from but I figure they're from South America (we don't have any fuckin' addresses herel), but who cares as they suck. Agathocles deliver their version of Mapaim Geath's "Declaver" (a rip off of Repulsion, of what when everybody knew that. Mick Harris said "It's dedicated to them.", before he was saying "It's our stuff, not influenced by anyone...") Flying Skull play thrash, but it's rather wimpy, the singer could be the new Hellowimp (oops...Helloween)

singer. By the way, ideas are all taken from Hellowimp, so it's a rip off. Eternal Dirge have the only live track of the tape and suffers of a soundboard recording (vocals and drums but where are the guitars?), but they seem to play thrash like 10 billion bands and have the riffs of 5 million of them. The singer is really good though. Pyathrosis start with this boring hellish intro taken from various soundtracks and then jump into a horror music, slow with growling vocals and morbid riff's (not like some riffs of Obituary's latest LP to date). A better sound is badly needed for them with more time changes or they'll turn like Derketa. All in all, 60 minutes that are quite boring for me as you can't avoid the bad tracks coz my tape deck has no F.T.S. 

1/17/91 Jannus Landing, St. Pete

Let me start this review by stating that this was a real show, as opposed to most where the band just plays music. This was the most entertaining show I've ever seen, they are definitely worth the effort to go see. After a suitable warm up period, Sleazy P. Martini, the band's manager (with a foot high hair do, no less!) (ame out to try to get us to buy Gwar shirts and

shoot one of three protesters who were holding ridiculous signs (not real protesters, of tourse). After this opening salvo, the real bloodbath began, with the two other protesters being decapitated and mutilated. Blood flew everywhere and anyone close enough to the stage got soaked. It wouldn't be the last time during the show that happened. The first song they played was "The Salamanizer from the new album. Yes, they can actually play their instruments! The whole band is made up of more than the five who actually play the music, the others do disgusting things on the side. The second song they played was "Black And Huge" and was a cool song to play live. They played a selection of old and new stuff throughout the show, but it was what was going on while the music raged that was the attention grabber. Their costumes and stage antics are so ridiculously extreme that it's funny to watch and see what will happen next. Thanks to Ripping Corpse's roadie Dieter, and Ed Farshtey from Roadracer/ The Book Of Armageddon, I got a lift to the Skyroom. Other people in the turmoil on the way to the show was none other than Austria's Disharmonic Orchestra and crew, as well as Maru and Steve from the Prime Evil team. After a night in a motel, we took Disharmonic to the club and there the festivities began. Mu friend Josh (bass for Suffocation) organized passes, so free beer was drunk all night, as well as being able to save \$ on the entrance fee, super cheap at \$10 regardless. A lot of people turned up, but I don't think there were as many people as what turned up for the Morbid Angel/ Revenant/ Ripping Corpse/ Immolation/ Baphomet show I was at in May 1990 at the same venue. The bands that played were Radiation Sickness, Lucifer's Hammer, Suffocation, Cannibal Corpse Baphomet, Immolation, Disharmonic Orchestra, Deceased, Goreaphobia, Mortician, Repulsion and Autopsy. As you can imagine all the people there, and the heavy party spirit followed, I can't recall the exact order of things! Put it this way, the best thing you could get is over 12 hours of death metal, including the West Coast's classic Autopsy! The personal highlights for me were to see Autopsu finally after being a fan for so many years now. The band was heavy as fuck, their new material is slow and melancholic, with a surefire Trouble influence making itself clear. Their set was among the best of the night! Another band that I freaked on were Baphomet. They have an even more personal style than when I saw them last, almost a prehistoric/ savage approach to howling death metal. Baphomet have a strong local following that should reap them some rewards when their debut LP comes out in 1991 on Deaf Records (UK). Cannibal Corpse were also enjoyable to watch, because they play a simpler heads down brutal assault. Their LP was killer and they did a lot off of this one live. Another strong point to make about their show is Chris Barnes' even more intense wolverine vocals and the killer support they got from the crowd. Recieving equally as good a response as CC were New York's Suffocation. These guys are intense and along with Goreaphobia, show a real new generation of death metal, as the great Immolation are of course worldwide and this will be proven fact after their debut for Roadracer Records, Suffocation are

brilliant, and they will be releasing

an LP on Relapse Records. Immolation were the of the bands I'd call truly spectacular live! They've improved so much again since I saw them last, especially Neal Boback's drumming which is a lot more confident now! Disharmonic Orchestra turned out to be much better live than I expected. Totally hideous and after that long arse ride to Buffalo, I discovered they are some of the most down to earth people you could meet. Their merchandise turned one area of the club into a fair, so much shit was for sale from all the bands playing, plus a million more. I got to hear the advance Deceased LP on Relapse Records outside before the show. It's classic Deceased material, which they also delivered excellently live. My only slight negative point would be like Autopsy, Mocturnus and other bands that have a drummer/ vocalist, Deceased managed to do the best they could in that situation. Very intense and powerful live! Of course, how could I possibly forget to mention how killer it was to see Repulsion in the flesh instead of video. They appeared to be killer dudes, and they played a bonecrusher set of all their old tunes, plus a few new killers, I hope a new LP will come out eventually, they need to release something better than all the Paul Speckman projects, with good sound, then do some US touring! Faces at the show were numerous, Jeff of Carcass, Derketa, Exmortis, Abominog, Funeral Nation, Colostomy, Exit 13. Splatteareah, Apparition, Eviscerate, Incantation, Mortician and of course a lot more. People came from Canada and all over for this show. After the show we drove home to NVC (which sucks-Ed.) nonstop, a huge thanks to Ed Farshtey and Mark "Psycho" Abramson at Roadracer for showing me around the office and also getting my ass to the gig! After our mammoth drive, with extra people from Apparition and Suffocation, I returned to NJ naving been to one or the better shows in my life. Certainly better than the Sepultura/ Obituary/ Sadus tour that just came around everyone's way recently. A Well organized, well attended show that proves than metal is popular to hold a festival with such great talent. Long live the underground death scene.
