Zephyrous (Gr.) will release their demo on CD format on IMPURE CREATIONS.

Satyricon's new guitarist is Nocturno Culto of Darkthrone, but I wonder if he is also going to join his new band when they go on European tour in April with Dissection and Gorgoroth.

Talking about Gorgoroth: Their second LP ("Dod") will be out when you read this. The only original member left is Infernus (g), but new members were found. New drummer now is Ex-Immortal's Erik.

Asphyx were declared as dead, but they rose from their grave to keep the death metal spirit alive. They will also tour in May with Rotting Christ, Grave and others.

German band Ancient Ceremony are almost ready to enter studio for their full length CD which should be entitled "Under the Moonlight we kiss". Expect some atmospheric melodical and guitarorientated death metal music.

A lot of things changed at the Austrian Black Metal Syndicate: Summoning are no longer member of this circle as they don't want to be in the same syndicate as Trifixion, their exdrummer. This guy, although he once claimed to be anti-fascist, now plays (beside Pervertum and Trifixion) in Werwolf together with Michael Piesch of LETHAL Records. This band's lyrics show some heavy fascistic tendencies, and some people say that Trifixion is only interested in making some quick bucks... no matter with which kind of moral. The A.B.M.S. doesn't seem to be a strong union anyway, as there are bands permanently entering and leaving this circle. Pervertum lost their vocalist. Paruzu is working on his new album, which should be out this year!

Coming back to Summoning: This Austrian duo is again busy with writing new songs for their third (!!!) album. 50% of the CD should already be finished, and it was told to me that their new stuff will be even more melodical than before. Expect some great stuff (once again).

The best Hellenic outfit Rotting Christ have left UNISOUND, because Mutilator and company weren't satisfied with their album's distribution. It seems as if the band has signed at CENTURY MEDIA now... By the way: Mutilator, the band's bassman, has opened a record store in Athens which should be dedicated to all kinds of metal. So if you are in Athens, then check it out!!!

Not only Rotting Christ have left UNISOUND but also Mortuary Drape kissed this label goodby! Those old Italian Black /Death Metallers now signed for a SplitCD (with Sigh) at SHVADASHANA from Holland. But their next full-length album will be out on NAZGILES EXPERED DELICATIONS.

"ESPECIALLY FOR THE OLD HEADBANGERS AND THRASHERS"

After reading the sentence (which you can see above) on Martyrdom's A5 flyer, I really got interested in this Dutch band and I simply had to contact them, because there aren't too many bands around nowadays who have dedicated themselves to good old-fashioned black / thrash metal.

I was pretty excited when the band's second demotape "Sodomy and Crush" arrived in my mailbox... and I directly put it into my tapedeck. Perhaps my expectations were a little bit too high, but in the beginning I wasn't too mad about Martyrdom's music... their style really sounded old-fashioned, but very unusal and strange, and I thought I would just review this demo for this issue, but not more. But as time went by I listened to it again and again, and I suddenly started to like this demo, ... it just took some time until I got used to this stuff.

To describe "Sodomy and Crush": It contains intro/outro, five own compositions and a cool coverversion of Venom's "Lady Lust". The demo itself is packed in a full-coloured cover with a picture, lyrics, etc, and looks pretty cool (except for the irretating cover). But coming to Martyrdom's music I've got to say that it is a mixture out of good 80s thrash and mainly Venom, sometimes a touch too simple but still cool. It has nothing to do with today's definition of black metal... songs like "Iron Thorns", "Return of the Bombs" and the titletrack carry typical 80s drumrhythms and guitarriffs, and even the vocalist uses a bit of his "own" voice (like Tom Araya, Cronos, Schmier, Warrior, etc. did.... therefore they sound individual and are hard to copy). But especially the vocals were the most irretating element in Martyrdom's music when I listened to "Sodomy and Crush" the first time. René's voice sounds as if he wants to sound dirty and in the vein of Venom's Cronos, but it finally didn't work out too well. As already said, you'll (sooner or later) get used to it, but I have to say that there are some things to improve at the vocals. René "Cruelty" te Vogt introduces his attitude of the band as following: I hate the whole trendy scene of today for normal discokids with 1000 shitbands like Biohazard etc., and all trendy death metal bands. I still live in the good old '80s when Metal was for real fans !!! That's one of the reason why I started my one man band: Martyrdom!!! Especially for the old Alright, the history of the band: Before Martyrdom I headbangers and thrashers! played in other metalbands (1987: Frozen Hell, 1988: Bloody Agression, 1989 Agression, 1990 Obtruncation (all bands three members and dedicated to thrash), 1991 Obtruncation B.M., alone, black/hrash, and in 1992 Martyrdom, alone, thrash/black). In 1994 I released my first demotape "Blackstench" (sold out). All instruments were played by me. That's the reason why it turned out to be worse, but at the same time you can hear the old atmosphere and my influences of my youth: old Venom, Possessed, old Sodom, old Slayer, Destruction, etc. You've got to know that I'm sitting in a wheelchair... that's also a reason why my first tape was really bad. I hope that you don't hate it that I'm sitting in a wheelchair (Why should I? - ed.). Because "Blackstench" s bad quality I used some persons from other bands to help me with the instruments on my second demo "Sodomy and Crush" Of course I wrote the songs for this tape again, because Martyrdom was and has to be a one-man band.' That's probably because "Cruelty" fears that anyone brings some modern influences into the band, ha ha. But anyway, I have great respect for René that he dedicates himself so much to metal although he is handicapted... I think that's a proof for me for how metal music can possess your bloody soul !!! Sorry that the photoquality isn't the best, but it's just the xeroxed picture from the flyer... it should give you a rough visual impression that Martyrdom look (and therefore also sound) different in comparisons to all those make-up wearing maniacs.

Although Martyrdom's "Sodomy and Crush" demo isn't really a killerdemo, I think that we should keep an eye on this "band" as it can probably grow to something more serious. I am waiting the follow-up for "Sodomy and Crush" and hope, that I am right with my prognoses! Those who are interested in Sodomy and Crush" have to send \$8 (pretty

Real metal quality from the land of the rising sun has always been pretty rare, and only a hand full of bands have got some international attention until now. But from the deepest underground of Tokyo a horde called ANJGAJA is getting stronger and stronger, and will probably soon be counted to Japan's leading forces. No, ABJGAJA aren't King Diamond clowns if anybody has wondered, .they've just taken their bandname from the King's second album. These in spikes dressed three guys are nothing but a black metal band who like it very fast, primitive, and energetic !!! After two more or less bad rehearsaldemos ("Abigail" '92, "Blasphemy Night" '93) the first real convincing result was their in '94 released "Descending from a blackend sky", a five track 7 inch which was picked up by quite a few and made the name spread around. I neither can't say that this band is original nor that they aren't joining any trends, but their simple music is cool, because of its raw and simple but effective structure ... and that's what I like. The ABJGAJI / Funeral Winds Split CD is out on Colombian WARMASTER since June, but I haven't heard it yet (where the hell is the vinyl version ?), so I can't give you any details on that one. Some people say that their style sounds more ancient now... I wish this is true! Anyway, I got in touch with Yasuyuki, the band's chief, and of course I wanted to know what he thinks of their SplitCD, especially of Funeral Winds who have often been accused of being fakes : Our split CD is out with Funeral Winds... They are good, but now I'm not in contact with them. WARMASTER Records is a true underground label, and this release was very late, because they had money problems. I don't care... if you are interested in this SplitCD, please send me \$ 20.' A proud price, this is another reason for me sticking to vinyl, it saves money! Yasuyuki (also known as "Barbatos") often mentions many (nearly forgotten) old bands as the influences for his simple music, so I wondered what is so fascinating at those old metal days ? Yasuyuki again: ' I'm influenced by old thrash / black metal bands, and I don't like complicated songs. Simple guitarriffs, fast drumming and heaviness, but I don't deny liking complicated songs. My favourite bands are Bulldozer, Sodom, N.M.E., Venom, Bathory. That's what got me into playing black metal, and I pursued similar cult bands.' If you really worship those old bands, then you can't be a 16-year old guy..... all members of ABJOAJI are 24 years old if I have to believe them, but I think they don't look that old. But who cares? Lately I heard that they had the chance to play at a black metal gig, so I asked for details.... Are there a lot of black metal fans in Japan by the way ! ... 'On 17th April 1995 we have played a gig with Sigh and Sabbat, it was great ! Now black metal has become some popular music in Japan. Almost every fan used to ride a skateboard one year ago, ha ha, some Japanese trendbands as well! Here you see the strength of music, how it can change personalities. Yasuyuki hadn't much to tell, perhaps he was a bit tired after rehearsing his fast songs or his job has suck all energy out of his body, we'll never know ! At the end he added that ANJOATE will probably change their style in future, but before this happens he wants to release their first fulllength debut album called "Intercourse and Lust" in '96 if he manages to find a label until then. Let's just wait for the result and see if ANJOATA deserve a place beside good Japanese bands like Sigh. But let's hope so...

Do you like it old-fashioned when it comes to Black / Death Metal? If yes, well, Gospel of the Horns from the land of kangoroos is probably something for you as they have some cool Celtic Frost / Venom- like guitarriffs and rhythms included on their 4-song studiodemo "The Satanist's Dream". By mixing the old influences with modern black / death metal elements we can say that this band isn't just another outfit in Satanist's Dream". While the other four guys (with the instruments) were practising, Shane Transvaal D., the vocalists spent his time to do this interview with me...

First up I noticed that Side A is much stronger than the B-Side, am I the first person to tell you that? Why do the sides differ so strong from another?

You've made it hard for me to answer this question appropriately Costa as you have not made it clear as to what it is you mean by "side A is much stronger than side B". If you mean musically, then I disagree with you on that, but everyone is entitled to his / her own opinion (I enjoy the simple ancient sounding riffs and drumming of the A side - ed.) Of the two sides. I enjoy side B the most but overall, our newer material is far heavier and in turn, better, wait and see!

Let's hope that you are right with that. "Cold Endless Seasons of Darkness" and the titletrack sound quite ancient (VENOM meets FROST /HELLHAMMER and some thrash-elements), was this done

on purpose? Which bands have influenced "Hellbutcher' while writing the songs?

Of course it was done on purpose, to sound like the way we do but once again, I disagree with you on the Venom part (...and what about the vocal part at the beginning of your second song and some of the drumrhythms? -ed.). I can agree with the Frost and Hellhammer statement. It's not a manufactured sound we play, it is from our hearts, all of us with the exception of our drummer, Vulture, have grown-up listening to the older black metal bands, as well as older heavy metal and thrash bands. So, our sound reflects our taste in music. When pressed, Hellbutcher states he is not infuenced by any bands but rather inspired by them, there is a vast difference between influenced and inspired. Those bands are: old Blasphemy, Sodom, Piledriver (the Norwegian or the old Canadian one? -ed.), Judas Priest and the list goes on.'

What has GOSPEL OF THE HORNS done before your demo was released? And what has happened since the tape is out?

The core of the band, Paimon and myself, formed this band over three years ago and have gone through a lot of line-ups to get the band as it stands today, (Paimon is now on Bass). Under a slightly different line-up we recorded a promo in MCMXCIV but it was never released. Since the demo was recorded, we have signed a deal for a MCD of the demo on EINSTAND Records of Italy (??? -ed.) and we are on the verge of signing for our debut LP / CD, titled at the moment: "Satanic Lust... the passion of the wicked".'

There's never been such a big "poser" scene like the current "black metal" scene (beside the L.A. Glam scene of course), everyone's trying to be as evil as possible. What does "evil" mean to you, and how do you express this?

'Good question! Evil to me means the darker side of my personality but I don't consider myself to evil as such, naturally I am a Satanist, so I lean towards all the darker things in life but I counter balance my feelings / emotions. In other words, I show both love and hate, there is no grey area in my emotions. How do I show my evil side, I really don't too often, if someone fucks with me, I'm going to strike out, but I prefer to stay in the dark in life, so I don't find much need to use my hatred all too often. I dislike the people who claim to be evil when in fact they're normal human beings, if there is such a thing! I have no time for these insane fools but they are rather amusing, we may have many such people in our local scene, they're always good for a laugh.'

What do you think is the main difference between the old black metal merchants and neo-black metal hordes?

Intelligence !!! Though, not all newer black metal bands are low intelligence. And the same goes for the older black metal bands, they often only used satanism as a selling tool, take Venom for instance, a great band who I like and admire a lot, but lets face it, they were never truely what they claimed to be in their prime. Too many of the newer bands only play black metal now as they know it will sell due to it being the "flavour of the month" to use and old cliche (... and it's easier to play if you like it the old Burzumic way! -ed.). In a year or two, they disappear and move onto the next trend or fade away alltogether leaving no impact what-so-ever on the black metal scene. It happened to Death Metal and it will happen to black metal, only the true ones will survive and I know Gospel of the Horns will be there as our hearts are truely in it, it's not an image for us. Sure, I'm not saying we will be rich and famous, but that is not why we got into music in the first place.'



Will there be more "ancient". sounding songs in future or can't you say in which direction the new stuff will go?

We will always be an older style sounding black metal band, as I've already stated, our music reflects our taste in music, so that is not going to change, perhaps we may "grow" as a band but essentially, we'll always remain an old style black metal band. Many assume that it is easy to play what we do, sure, it's not technical but it's from the heart and if it's not in your heart, it sounds false. It seems of late, there've been a few bands claiming to be influenced by the older bands but from what I've heard, it is not very obvious." Australia's underground is getting stronger, but it never got too much international attention (also Australian thrash wasn't too famous although it was quite good). What do you think is the

Perhaps a continental problem?

I think that is on the mend, a lot of great Australian bands are now starting to get noticed by the underground, which is very promising. Bands like Sadistik Exckution, Armoured Angel and Hobbs' Angel of Death have been known overseas now for a while but bands such as ourselves, Bestial Warlust, Abyssic Hate (they've signed to HEAD NOT FOUND), and Samhain are really getting noticed and all of us have or are about to release CDs, so that can only build a stronger scene here in our country. Our main problem is that we are situated quite far from Europe and we are not really able to play live there and promote ourselves more, but that's life, heh!

reason for this?

I would not leave this country for the life of me to advance my musical career!

Do you care about the Australian scene?

'Fucking oath I do !!! No one likes shit in their backyard! I keep an eye on the scene here to listen for up- and- coming bands and for shit ones. I am now a part of a Black Metal Front with some other members of black metal bands. I stress that we

are not a clown of the Norse Black Metal Circle, we don't "rule" other bands, we just help and promote the better bands and don't even worry or care about the ones we consider to be shit. We are no rulers and we don't intimidate non-black metal bands or such. As for the Australian black metal bands I recommend, they are: Bestial Warlust, Destroyer 666, Abyssic Hate, Samhain, Spear of Longinus (superfluous ! -ed), Infinite Black and Oracle of the Void. If anyone wishes to know more about any of these bands, write to me with an IRC.' Do you have any imagination of how a perfect black/death metal show must look like? How would your show look like if you had enough money to realize all your plans?

Well, the perfect line-up would be Celtic Frost, Sodom, Kreator, Bathory, Venom (all in their prime, mid'80s) as well as Rotting Christ, Order From Chaos, Samhain and Gospel of the Horns, this would take place in outside festival. For our own show, I'd like to have a huge back drop, 100's of candles, smoke, two half naked females at each side of the stages and tons of blood. We're working on it. I'd personnally like to have a huge screen showing wild pictures of sex and violence. Ha! Ha!

What do you think of HOBBS' ANGEL OF DEATH's return (on the album market)?

'I haven't as yet heard their new CD, so I can't say what I think of their newer material, but it will be hard for them to top their classic first LP! It's good to see Hobbs back again though.'

Absolutely, and I'm very excited to hear their new album, too. Any chances for the fans to get rid of their cash at your address?

Plenty! The demo is almost sold out, so hurry if you want a copy. It costs \$6 and if any orders do come after it is sold out, I'll tape it for them with our latest promo that will not be officially released. First up please tell the readers how it came to 'reform' MAYHEM again and if it was difficult to assemble the old members 'Maniac' and ' Necrobutcher'? What were they doing before they joined again?

'Well, I would not exactly call it a "reform", because Mayhem were never splitted up after Euronymous' death. The plan was to continue only using Blackthorne on guitar. But what we hoped to be a one-year sentence for him actually turned out to be a nine-years imprisonment, so we quickly dropped that.'

'Anyway, I had asked Necrobutcher and Maniac before and they were totally into it. It's especially great to have Necrobutcher back in the ranks, because he actually <u>formed</u> the band in the beginning of 1984.'

Some people are very sceptical about reforming MAYHEM as they say that 'Euronymous was MAYHEM' and stuff like that as he did compose most of the music, but what's your opinion about such kind of thinking? Some people think you are doing this only to make some quick bucks...

'Oh yes, I heard it all before. Earlier, when Euronymous was around it was like "No Mayhem without Dead", "No Mayhem without Necrobutcher and Maniac", "Mayhem have not done anything in five years, so they're dead". I even remember me and Euronymous had a good laugh when we read in a 'zine "Mayhem (R.I.P.)". Well, about the

quote "Euronymous was Mayhem": What do you think Euronymous could accomplish all by himself? There would be no "Deathcrush", no "Live in Leipzig" and certainly no "De Mysteriis Dom Sathanas" where, for instance, I wrote half of the music. Mayhem was never one person, it was a concept...and still is. A lifestyle as well as a band. But I'm very much aware of those people, and the fact is that most of them not even knew Euronymous or Dead at all. So they can shut the fuck up!"

Rumours say that you signed at german CENTURY MEDIA

records....

'No, we have not signed to any label. CENTURY BLACK is only distributing "De Mysteriis...' under license from VOICES OF WONDER.' Relating to some letters it seems that the development of the 'new' MAYHEM goes very well, but what about new songs? Euronymous once said that he has a lot of new songmaterial written for the follow-up for 'De Mysteriis Dom Sathanas' LP...so do you know those riffs and (if yes) will you use it? Who's now taking care of songwriting by the way?

I know that Blackthorne and Euronymous made some music together for a very short period of time, but for me they are lost and gone now. I asked Blackthorne in jail if he remembered how it sounded like, but according to him, it was only him that has written it.



Oh well, that's not really important, because I have heard that Thorns has been formed again behind the prison walls together with Faust, and I do understand that it might be very hard to gain inspiration musically while staring at a prison wall. Anyway, I wish them the best of luck. About songwriting: Mayhem as a unit will take care of that.' Please tell me something about new MAYHEM material, and what kind of direction it is (please give me some songtitles if there are)
. Will you continue to play incredibly fast?

'The new Mayhem material will speak for itself. I will continue to

play incredibly fast, as you call it, and, musicwise it will be go in a more brutal and blacker direction. Most bans here in Norway are changing to a softer direction (except for Immortal and Darkthrone) and would probably end up playing sweet pop metal or something. Of course twill never happen to Mayhem as we are the true Black Metal band I Let the others follow the trend and become hopeless low shadows.

Talking about 'De Mysteriis Dom Sathanas': To me it's the best album from Norway so far, but a lot of people have problems with Attila's kind of vocals. Why didn't you use a 'ususal' black metal vocalis (in the typical 'Quorthon-Rip-Off' vein)? Was it a part of the 'Anti-Trend' concept at MAYHEM?

If it was, it was only natural. You see, we don't follow any "Antitrends". The reason for using Attila was only one, his voice. And for that reason he did not become a permanent member. About a lot of people having problems with the vocals: Why the hell should I bother?" Whose idea was it to choose Attila as the vocalist for the album ? Was 'Euronymous' a kind of dictator in MAYHEM or was he open for the other members' ideas?

' It was me and Euronymous who decided to use Attila. I would not say that Euronymous was a sort of dictator. Although his kind of



selfishment annoyed us sometimes. But then again, perhaps our selfishment annoyed him also. You have a very unknown but talented guitarist now namely Rune Eriksen, so could you please tell me something about him? How did you finally know that he would be the right person to do the

did you finally know and to guitars for your band?

'Some years ago me and Rune Eriksen had some kind of a project

'Some years ago me and Rune Eriksen had some kind of a project band going on. It went nowhere fast, but we stayed in touch over the band going on. It went nowhere last, but we stayed in louch over the years. Concerning Mayhem, we did not want a wellknown guitarist to replace Euronymous. First, if we were to choose a wellknown bend, that guitarist. replace Euronymous. This wellknown band, that guitarist would automatically bring some of his old band's trademarks into Mayhem, automatically bring some automatically bring s did not want that to happen (good attitude) - ed.). Anyway, Rune Eriksen is just the right man for the job. It's just the way it is.' What differs MAYHEM 1993 from today's MAYHEM (musically) ? How does Maniac's voice sound nowadays?

'Apart from obvious reasons, at the present day Mayhem sounds

musically power, more brutal and faster than before. Maniac's voice is sounding just as cruel and highend as it did in 1987, but with more

finnesses.'
What do you think of the 'Dawn Of The Black Hearts' Bootleg? You must be at least satisfied with the coverartwork as you originally wanted to use them for 'De Mysteriis...', right?

'What's annoying me about all those bootlegs flying around is that totally unidedicated bizniz-minded profits doing profits with our name.

Dead's picture on the cover sure doesn't justify anything."

Beside that bootleg there's also a split record featuring MORBID / MAYHEM available (I think the edition is now very high as this LP/CD finally got repressed)...and I guess you're not happy with this release, are you? What would be the consequences for you to stop this bootlegiobs? Also I lately noticed that some bootlegshirts ('Deathcrush', 'Logo', etc...) are hitting the distro-lists,

' Well, what can I do about it? Apart from beating up the guilty ones if I ever meet them eye to eye. There's nothing much you can do, annoying as it is.

There are a lot of norwegian bands who behave like 'kings' after getting a bit of success, and they really enjoy when young kids follow them blind, but what do you think about young norwegian bands who behave very arrogantly? Do you care about Norway's scene at all ?

"I do not care about any scene."

You now joined forces at IMMORTAL to help them solving their drummer problems, but you are only in as a seesion drummer, aren't you? Is it difficult for you to dig into other bands' music, and how much time did it take you to play the IMMORTAL songs

very well ?

'Immortal's songs came very natural to me. The drum structure is

'Immortal's another thing. When really very simple, but the speed, well, that's another thing. When every song is going as it is on "Battles in the North", playing live can be sort of, well, physically demanding. And my job in Immortal now is permanent.'

Isn't it difficult for you to be in several bands? I mean, learning all the IMMORTAL songs and joining them on tour, rehearsing in Bergen, ...playing in your main band MAYHEM, but also being drummer of ARCTURUS? How much time do you spent into music in one day?

You must be 100% dedicated to what you do. Yes, I have three bands going on, but as different as the music is it satisfies me 90%. The last 10% goes to other music forms.

You're also trying to create your own label as you like to release some TORMENTOR songs, right? Are there any concrete plans for it and will you probably sign more bands in future?

it and will you probably sign more bands in future?

'No no, Samoth of Emperor is doing all that. I have nothing to do with this. I only handed Samoth the Tormentor advance.'

On a MAYHEM rehearsaltape I noticed that you made a coverversion of CELTIC FROST's "Into The Crypts Of Rays", but in a hellish fast version... Why did you choose to play especially that song and will you record it for an album?

'That particular rehearsaltape is from before I joined (pre 1988). We have no plans to release that track. What we have done is that we recorded another Cettic Frost track called "Visual Aggression" to appear on a Cettic Frost -tribute CD from DWELL Records U.S.!

'Hellhammer' is definetely a great name for a drummer.... idea was it to choose this name and was it because of the band 'HELLHAMMER' ?

It was, yes, and when I joined Mayhem I found out that it's a shalle at this particular than it's a shalle it. that this particular name should vanish, so I quickly adopted it. Besides Celtic Frost and Hellhammer are two of my absolute fave

It's no secret that you are one of the top drummer in the black /death metal scene, but do you have any favoured drummers you worship and you still are able to learn from (not only from the

' Flattery is my weakness, hah I Well, I can learn something from every drummer, regardless of the style he (or even she) plays. As I've said before Iron Maiden's Nicko McBrain is my all time fave. I've learned nearly as much watching and listening to him as I have from any teacher I've had.

A question that might interest many young drummers: What kind, of

equipment do you use ?
'I use a Pearl CZX custom kit. Its 2, 22"x 18" bass drums. The toms are 8"x 8" - 10"x 10" - 12"x 12" - 13"x 13" - 14"x 14" - 16" x 16" and an aditional 13" x 13" tom. A Grass 8" x 14" free floating snare, and some speciality snares. My cymbals are mostly Sabian.

Wow, a very detailed answer indeed, now all you young drummers know how the hammers of hell are built. A stupid question, but it really interests me: If bands like MANOWAR or SLAYER would ask you to join them, would you agree? Do you have any fave bands you would love to play in (beside MAYHEM of course)?

' No, I dont think so, because neighter band you mentioned have, or share my point of view. To work 100% in a band it has to be more to it

than just music.

Your prognoses for the future of black / death / heavy metal music (if you have some slight ideas / imaginations)?

'Really impossible to say!'
Do you still care about 'the true' underground which has often been discussed in the past couple of years ? By the way...do you still call your band 'the true' MAYHEM after those american MAYHEM ceased to exist?

' We still are "the true Mayhem "!"

Dead's lyrics have always been very individual and well-done, but who's now going to take care about writing lyrics? Are there still some unused lyrics by Dead available? How important

are lyrics for you?

To me, lyrics are not that important, but of course, if the music is ok and the lyrics suck, it is very obvious that the whole thing sucks.Maniac is now taking care of the lyrics, they're very much in the same vein as Dead's. Just as dark, in fact I'm very pleased with his

lyrics for **Mayhem**. No lyrics of Dead are still unused.'
The frontcover of 'De Mysteriis...' shows the dome of Trondheim (the dome that Grishnackh wanted to blow as rumours said)

...Who was responsible for choosing this motiv and why?

'Mainly Euronymous. He wanted another picture at first, but later we all decided the one we used for "De Mysteriis...". The motive showcases our music, dark monumental and mysterious!

To what kind of bands/music do you like to listen to when you're on your lonesome? What is the most important thing for you in music: Technical abilities, intensity or just the whole heaviness nere ?

It depends, not so much technical abilities as atmosphere is more important. In fact there are very few bands I like nowadays.

Ok, to end this interview abruptly you simply can say some last words to all the sceptical ignorants who still think that MAYHEM's glorious age is over : 'Think again - losers!'

We'll see if Bellhammer's words will turn into reality or if the ignorants were right with their opinion, but I wish the band best of luck and I hope that they won't change the old attitude !!!!







Atmospheric Black Metal based on ancient Greek cult and mythology says the advert for KAWIR's "Eumenides" 7'EP, and it's a good description for their style. Some of you probably know KAWIR from their split 7'EP with Japanese SIGH, but those you haven't heard of this Greek force should expect typical Greek sounding stuff which slips quite easily into your ears. If you don't like 7'inch releases, then this problem will soon be solved as KAWIR are just about to release their first CD_

... Well, our MCD / LP woll be out in the beginning of 96 and it will contain five tracks (including ancient Greek hymns). A few titles are "Ermis". "Kabeipoi". "Kathodos".... all the tracks will be written in ancient Greek lyrics and we are also thinking to change our name to ancient Greek Kawir - Kabeipoi. About the label we're closed to DARK SIDE Records."

Greek bands mostly follow the musical path of ROTTING CHRIST and all their sidebands, and so does KAWIR. Is this within your blood or is it because of ROTTING CHRIST'S status in Greece which forces you to work similar ?

I think it's in our blood and that's why the greek scene is totally different from all the other ones.

It's obvious that you're fascinated by Greece's ancient mythology, is it just because you of greek origin or do you think that ancient Greece has more to offer than other countries' mythologies?

First of all, I want to tell you that Kawir is a religious band, we are writing about our beliefs. All the members of Kawir worship the Hellenic Gods, the gods of light and darkness, Zeus the all-seeing. I also want to inform you that we send all the needed papers to European Community for a permission to re-open our temples, not as sight seeing attractions, but as they really are, holy places of worship. This of course means war with the Christians and we are ready. We want our gods back. I don't care about the others."

You seem to take it very serious! Do you think that the ancient spirit is still existing in Greece ? To me it seems as of the old values disappear_

The old values disappeared because the Christians destroyed and killed our beliefs. However, now I see a small flame in darkness. Just wait for a few years...

How came KAWIR into being ? And how was your music during the first

time of your existence ?

I created Kawir in 1993. In the beginning I was working with session members, so we had no rehearsals or anything, because when I was ready to record they would just come to the studio and record. Now however, in 1995, we are a full membered band and there is a great possibility to do a few gigs after the release of our MCD/LP. Why do you think is the greek sound so different from the middel- and north european one?

'Most of the time, the sound of greek bands is the same because we don't have many studios and there are no choices. However, the result is pretty good, considering the available means.

If you thought that MASTER'S HAMMER is the only great metal force from Czech Republic, then you are wrong. Bands like ROOT, TÖRR and AMON are of course not as famous as Franta's band, but they are worth being checked out by all you headbangers, because all these bands have an own identity and bring us real dark music.

Tet's take AMON as example: Normed in 1989, they'be released three demos so far ("Realm of Kibil" '90, "Book of Death" '91, "Call Thy Master" '92, all tapes have at least 7 songs included) and a six-song livetape ("Alive in Hell") which was released some months ago. Their style is a sort of brutal dark death metal with deep rough sung (not puked !!!) bocals, and the coolest thing on "Call Thy Master" is that ROOT's bocalist "Big Hoss" does some great backing bocals which sound fuckin' amazing (especially when they are sung). The lyrics seem to be written in Czech language, and this sounds pretty good, even if I don't understand anything. Although the AMON guys have some difficulties with the English language, I managed to get an interview with bandleader and bocalist Robin "Br. He" Arcmár..

Thy did it take you three years until you finally have released your fourth demo "Alive In Hell"? What all has happened at AMON during those three years?

After the release of "Call Thy Master" it went a bit wrong with my band, because the bassist. Beauty Schmidt, was interested in his own project Pink Chubby Cigar (that's by the way a shitty name, isn't it? Why does somebody want to call his band "Cock"?) and he was completely absent because of the Seattle Grunge shit. His shitty clothes like for example a lila short trouser on stage made me tired, he left Amon on his own, so I needn't fire him. Therefore we looked for a bassist, plus our drummer had to join the army. After that we had about three different drummers, but nobody took their playing seriously. Last year Fan Medek has joined us as new bassist and Karl returned from the army. We wanted to record the "new" songs in Sommer 94, the studiodate was already booked, etc., but then some personal problems appeared (divorce, than a suicide attempt, etc.) and everything went down the toilet. Everything was complicated for me, I had to move, I had no money, was permanently drunk and without work. This lastet until spring '85, I was the one to blame partly, but I was totally K.O. and I had no will to play or to do anything back then. Now I am already ok, I live alone, I have work and we play again, now and then. But back then I thought that my band and I were totally destroyed...'

AMON is not a new black metal band anymore as you are active since 1989, but you didn't manage to release an album yet. What is the reason for this? Didn't you really get any offers from record companies until now?

'Here in Czech Republik no company has interest in us. But Opyros from N.E.P. has contacted me and the 'Call Thy Master' sessions should be out on CD soon, better said a splitCD together with Mortuary Drape (Well, this was planned, but Mortuary Drape signed at SHIVADARSHANA for doing the split CD, see News section page 2 in this magazine. -ed.). We have the new already finnished and N.E.P. want to make a full-length CD with us, next year. Czech labels have a strange policy in this sector, they only want bands which have released something before already, no newcomers. Well, it is really strange, but that's the way... Another problem here is that nobody wants to release Black Metal.'

Do you at least have any ideas for a KP / CO ? If yes, what kind of ideas are these ?

For the CD we have made a concept story in the length of circa 25 minutes, and in addition to that some songs. It will be called "The Worship", it is a story of the medieval age, about shirty monks, etc. This consists of three songs, "The Worship", "Confrontation" and "In Love with Satan", these lyrics were written by one of my friends. To this I have made two songs, "Hell's Angels" and "Black Work", and now Lava, our axeman, hasdone one further song, with lyrics from me called "Zidák Knéz", it's about a jewish priest. Well well, it will probably be interesting."

You started with AMON before Black Metal became a big trend. What do you think of most of the new black metal bands? Ho you take them seriously? Which ones belong to the strongest / weakest?

'Some mean it honestly, but for most people this is only a trendy thing. You know, here in Czech Republic especially a lot of young fans love Count Grishnackh and Burzum... Grishnackh is an idol and martyr for them, but nobody wants to know that the Count is an asshole... Well, his music is abother thing, I know. By the way, I myself listen to Burzum at times, too... I better don't comment to the last part of your question, better not...'

Now did the international Black Metal trend affect the Czech Republik ? Now is the development in your country ?

'Ha ha, everyone loves Burzum... Development in Czech Republic ? Hey, we are still





a developing country, and in the musical sector this counts twice. People here, I mean the majority, don't buy demotapes from bands from outside, because the haven't the necessary money for it. Plus they don't know the foreign language, so I only know a couple of fans who write to addresses all over the world and collect tapes and CDs. Bands like Countess, Barathrum, Cruachan, I don't mean just the N.E.P. products but other ones, too, are totally unknown here and I believe that people here don't know any other bands but Slayer, Sepultura and Burzum. They are very conservative... In the last years they don't go to concerts, they prefer to sit drunk in bars or at home in front of the TV. I have a bad opinion about Czech fans, that's right.'

You used to be ROOT's tocalist in the late 80s, but you left them and formed AMON instead. What was the reason to leave ROOT and to form a band like AMON?

Ha ha, I didn't leave Root, I was fired by Big Boss. Back then it really hurt me much but it is good so. I want to go my own way. Big Boss is certainly a good guy and my friend, but on the other side he's a big tormentor and dictator in the band. Root, that is HIM. not the three others who are just statists on stage. But he makes it very good, that's true. We see eachother here and then in the bar, or when we played anywhere, and we don't talk about the past. My anger is already gone, ha ha, but back then I was really nevered by this thing.

I suppose that your relationship to ROOT is quite good as "Big Boss" has finally done some bocalparts for ANON songs. Isn't there any competition-thoughts between both bands, and doesn't it make you a bit sad that ROOT has already made three albums while you are still in your demostatus?

No. I'm not sad because of this. I only hope that our time will still come. You know. everything took very long time for me. no matter if it was the driver's license, the marriage or the first child, and I know that I have to wait for my first CD, too. I take it like this, we can say that we have a world wide status in the demo sector, and I'm happy about this, I am a modest undemanding human being. And my statists in the hand, too, ha ha...

Well, this you have to ask at another address. Big Boss knows this better than me. By the way, could we talk about other things?

Pes, let's get back to AMON: What was the reason for you to play Black Metal? Which was the first black metal band you heard and liked?

Thave heard Venom for the first time in the early 80s. It was a bit faster than classical heavy metal, but very simple and rough. And in addition the lyrics, I always like things about death, Satan, darkness, etc., the books, movies and everything else. I have listened to Black Sabbath a lot back then, nowadays I do as well I have to say, and I was fascinated by songs like 'Black Sabbath' and 'Electric Funeral', etc., and when Venom came out I have collected their stuff from the very beginning. Their last records weren't that good as the old ones anymore, but this is of course another thing. Further bands which I like are Celtic Frost, better said Frost at Hellhammer ages.

Has AMON ever played outside the Exech Republik? Please tell us something about your liveshows !

No, we have only played in our country in have to admit, and we play only seldomly, about once in a month. Our livegigs are nothing special. I think, and they are a hit chaotic. But it depends on the chaotic organisation of livegigs here in Czech Republic. I noticed that your drummer is missing on the photo was he just ill during the photo-session or has he left AMON?

When we did this photo Karl has just been in the army. It only shows the core !!!



MASTER'S NAMMER is the most popular Czech band on the international market, but how is this in Czech Republic itself? Which are the leading / most popular bands?

Well, Master's Hammer don't play since quite a while, but I've heard that they are again doing some new material and are wanting to release a new CD in a foreign country. But here they are a bit dead I think. Of course they continue to live in the hearts of the black metal fans, but it is more like a legend, a mythos one could say."

Which changes have been coming up for the Czech metalscene since the communistic system belongs to the past? What has especially changed for AMON?

Well, there are again problems with live-gigs through the church, etc. In times of the communistic era the situation was a bit different, I now say "better", ha ha, it sounds a bit strange now, but it is like this: Black Metal bands and everything like for example sects of Satan, rituals, etc. were prohibitted. And what was prohibitted was very interesting for fans and people who listened to metal back then. In those times there were 10 times as much people coming to the gigs in comparison with nowadays, because it was PROHIBITTED. But on the other side there were some bad things, like for example the police visits at concerts, sometimes also at home, sometimes we had to go to the police office after a gig. I mean the criminal investigation department, well, it was a shitty time. Big Boss and I had always trouble with the police although we didn't anything... It was a school of life, I myself see this in this way today.... Nowadays the fans are too lazy and too many fans are now interested in other musical directions like the Scattle-shit. Well, these fans weren't probably faithful black metal fans, only posers. And to the other question: Now we play even more seldomely than in the past, back then we have played about three times a month."

What kind of problems dp you have with the christians because of your satanic /antichristian music? How strong is the church in your country?

'Church in Czech Republic permanently causes problems. In Slovakia the situation is even worse as here, the pigs have prohibitted a Black Sabbath concert in Bratislava, because Black Sabbath are a "satanic" band, ha ha ha. Tony lommi and co. have invited the shitty bishop of Bratislava to the gig, personally I have to say, but he has refused this offer. Now the trend is a lot of fach articles about satanism in magazines and newspapers, but all deal with human sacrifices, drinking blood, mudered babies, etc. Ha ha, really interessting! Also Big Boss was on Czech TV a couple of times, and they talked about all those things, he has of course always said that this is NOT true, this shitty superstition, but it didn't help.

How do you manage it financially to keep a band like AMON alibe?

"We all do work, therefore we haven't got any problems with this. Larva (guitar) is an electrician, his brother Karl works as a carpenter. I drive with a dusthin lorry and only our bassplayer is without work. He used to to work as a bakerman. In this time it is impossible without a job, working is not really my hobby, but what can we do? The economic situation here in Czech Republic is worse."

Hor all readers who don't know AMON yet, I want you, Roby, to explain them what they should expect when the name AMON appears !

'Ha ha, a piece of chaos, a piece of black metal music, but in a more interesting form. At least fans who know us always say this...! Hail Satan!'

Monaco is famous to be a place for rich bastards who don't want to pay too many taxes, but not for any kind of metal bands. So it's the first time I heard about a metallic force when the (quite stupid) name Godkiller crossed my eyes. It's a one man black metal band founded 1993, and their second demo "The Warlord", which includes 23 minutes of "total medieval holocaust - fast, epic and hateful' (to state their flyer), really satisfied my ears. Although this isn't a very famous band (yet), there are already rumours circulating that a full-length album will appear on French Embassy Records, and of course I had to ask "Duke Satanael". so the pseudonym of the guy behind Godkiller, if this rumour is true... I'm quite suprised you've heard about that. Anyway, yes, it is one of the proposals I've got, and one of the most interesting ones. Embassy Productions is a superior label. But there is also Wounded Love on which I should release a MCD scheduled for the beginning of 1996. So, whatever my choice is: Await soon the most cruel, the most destructive and most slaughter of Godkiller. Hail Satan ! We'll see how cruel. destructive and slaughter-like it will be... but "The Warlord" was indeed a good messenger of good Black Metal in the Norwegian vein. And that brings me to my second question.... Codkiller seems to be heavily influenced by Norwegian bands, the vocals are very Burzum-like as well as parts of the music, other parts remind me at Enslaved and Satyricon. etc... and with "Bren det Hvite Riket" there's even one song included with Norwegian lyrics. But isn't it a bit stupid to hail from Monaco, but sounding totally Norse? Duke Satanel: No. I'M NOT "totally" influenced by Norwegian. Yes, I have a song with Norwegian lyrics, and I regret having done this because it has been misunderstood. It was a kind of tribute to the whole old Scandinavian Black Metal scene with bands like Bathory, the true Mayhem. I didn't want to sing in another language just to sing in another language, nor I wanted to look like a Norwegian band, like most of the worms have believed it [I still believe it! ed.). Hailing from Monaco means nothing. Monaco is not a Black Metal place. What a lot of people don't understand is that the Black Metal sound comes mostly from Bathory (I mean shrill guitars. screaming voice...). It is a tradition, a CULT. So, it's not because the Norwegian keep this tradition alive, Behemoth keeps this tradition alive as well as Abigor... but we are not sounding 'Norwegian', we are sounding like Bathory, like the Norwegian bands are sounding like Bathory. I mean, ok, Greek bands don't have the so called 'Norwegian' sound, but Greek bands are NOT black metal. They don't respect the tradition. My sound is influenced by Bathory and that's all. No more to say about this. Well well, I don't agree with him on most of his points of view... Godkiller's music sounds more Norwegian than like Bathory. even if those Norwegian bands have some Bathory roots in their music. But what finally matters (as always) is the musical quality, and Godkiller play their stuff very well, although it totally lacks of originality. But will Godkiller ever be continued as a one man act ? Aren't there any good metal musicians around in Monaco? Duke Satanel again: Godkiller is, must be, and will be the word of only one Satan's soul. No one can step over the gate of the Kingdom of Godkillet. I. Duke Satanael, I am the godkiller. No one else has a place in me. I am Godkiller, I am Evil, I am 666. He seems to be the true incarnation of the lord of the abyss (...)! Anyway, if you are still hungry for well played and produced Medieval Black Metal in the Norwegian vein, then you shouldn't miss Godkiller's "The Warlord", even if \$ 7 is not a cheap price! The tape comes with a good looking professional cover and a good sound ... GODKILLER, c/o Benjamin Labarrere, 5 rue des Lilas, MC 98000 Monaco.

Honesty finally pays out ! Sadistic Intent has been a cool death metal underground act in the past with their "Impending Doom" MLP and the "Calm before the Storm" 7'inch, But when "Black Metal" really got big, this sadistic horde stroke with their deathliest release so far, a MCD called "Resurrection" which is nothing but a masterful manifest of dark death metal! Meanwhile the band are loading their weapons to strike with their very first full-length album "Second coming...of Barkness"!

Bay, first up please tell us something about the Mexican tour you did... any cool or shitty experiences?

'Apparently things did not go as planned, the bands that were originally supposed to go either flaked out or were unable to go for one reason or another. All I know is that Sadistic Intent went and spread the darkness to our Mexican bloodbrothers. The crowds in Mexico were brutal! They would raise their hands in the shape of claws as we performed. They are more into the dark lifestyle and are very dedicated to the underground scene. We played around with Hexenhaus (featuring Black Massith Exsynthesizers and effects for Absu), and a couple of other bands. We got along quite well with everyone. Basically it was one big party throughout the country of Mexico. As we consumed lots of alcohol and marijuana. Overall we had an enjoyable time down there.'

Your "Resurrection" MCD has really been a spectaculous return of dark death metal the sadistic way, and you've got a lot of support because of this, didn't you? Did it finally pay out for you being not black metal like most of the other former death metal bands?

Yes, things seem to be going great these days. We have gotten a lot of support and respect from the die-hards, especially those who have been involved for a few years now and can see the difference in extreme music. There are many black metallers of today that are ex-death metallers, so I don't understand all the shit talking. Or perhaps it's just all the newcomers who never got to experience the legendary era of the ancient ones. The thought of turning black never crossed our minds. We have been playing this style for years now and are not about to change just because it is the "in thing" right now. I don't care if we are the last ones on this fucking planet."

"Second coming...of darkness", your upcoming CD (LP?), is in preperation, so how is that album going to sound, especially in comparison to "Resurrection"? Can we expect any special things on it?

' "The Second Coming... of Darkness" will surely be our best as I can already tell. This will be an album that you can listen to all the way through, not just the first and last songs. Don't you hate it when bands do that? Anyway, it will be in the same vein as "Resurrection" with some new ideas as well. It will contain a mixture of blast, slow atmospheric doom, thrash, dark death all blended together. We make sure that all of our songs flow. They are not just a bunch of riffs all stuck together and called a song. It is quite difficult to explain ones own music, it must be heard as everyone has their own interpretation. All I know is that our music has a lot of emotion (feeling). A lot of people don't understand music. It's not just a bunch of noise and growling. It is not easy to create, each song is special to us as it reflects ones own personality. That is why we don't like to rush when it comes to writing music. I like music that I can close my eyes to and see. I can't concentrate when people are talking and distracting me. I could care less what the band claims to be (death or black). That is why I like to get stoned, in this state of mind you can really feel the music (ha, that's what good old Jimi Hendrix did, too ! - ed.). It takes me a step further into the music which makes it a more memorable experience. Of course, the music must be good also.

I just hope we get the right production, so you will be able to hear all the instruments come through the speakers. We will soon record a promo tape and shop it around to see if we could get a decent offer. We will not record it for GOTHIC anymore, because we don't think they can handle it. As far as anything special on it, I believe the whole thing will be special. At least for us it will be.'

You've a new drummer now who's got that special feel on the thrash beat (as you've written)... will he bring a change of sound into SADISTIC INTENT's music, especially on your CD?

'Our new drummer's name is Emilio Marquez. We have been very picky with who we chose to join the band. We did not want someone who was going to change our sound drasticly, since this is what seperates us from the rest. I'm sure there will be a slight change in style, but not as much as feeling goes. The big change is that Emilio has more power and can play longer on the blast beats.'

Death Metal seems to return (once again) in these days, the latest releases of DEICIDE, MORBID ANGEL, LUCIFERION, etc. proove this. But do you think that there's really a serious (not trendy!) market still existing for this kind of music when you look into the dark future? What do you think of those black metal guys who fight against death metal (there're still some of them around)?

Well, I think as time passes things should improve. The trend truly hurt the death metal scene and it does not help much with all the idiots talking out of their ass. As far as the market goes for the future? As long as good bands keep coming out, it will continue. Brutal fucking bands (!) that are dark and have that special feel. I think things are slowly getting better in the underground, as the trend fades only the diehards will remain.

There will always be people talking shit. Whether it is death or black. I don't give a shit what these people have to say, they mean nothing to me. A lot of today's black metallers are ex-death metallers, so I think it's mainly the new comers, they don't see (or hear) the difference. They are blind sheep followers. I like bands that can play their instruments. Death, black metal I don't care, as long as the music is dark and has feeling.'

L.A. was (is?) famous for a huge glam/poser scene (remember the mid 80s), but also for hardware like SLAYER, DARK ANGEL, SADISTIC INTENT, etc.

How's the current situation in your "smoggy" town's scene?

'Smoggy. The glam / poser scene pretty much just faded out, or went underground.

L.A. is a brutal city to live in. We have many gangs here. It's pretty fucked up and getting worse, I think we will have to move soon. The other day my neighbour was murdered. He was shot repeatedly inside his own home. Now I have had neighbours killed on both sides (fuck, you really have to move soon or you will probably be dead when "Second Coming... of Darkness" is out, and that would be horrible, wouldn't it!

- ed.). As far as bands go, there are many here that are now getting into the dark lifestyle. The scene will surely flourith. Hail! to the Horde of Darkness under the Dark Realm!

Please tell me something about your shop which you've taken over from Gothic Records? Am I allowed to ask if this is going to be in the style of Euronymous "Helvette" shop?

'We were part of the record shop when it was called GOTHIC. Enrique did not want to continue with the shop, so he left to do the label under the same monicker. So we continued with the shop and changed the name to DARK REALM records. So it is not like we took over, we were always part of it. The shop, not the label! I have never seen photos of "HELVETTE", but from what I've read I'm sure it must have the same atmosphere, dark! Our walls are black, we have candle holders, incense burning black chandeliers, gargoyle statues, wall plaques, a tribute to the ancient ones wall, etc., we are here to help spread the scene in L.A.! We will convert them into the underground die-hards. Our mailing lists are growing daily. We will have a strong scene.'

DY

I'd love to see your shop, it sounds really cool, but I think it will never happen as I'm not a friend of the U.S.A. (and especially not of a town like L.A., sorry). There are some rumours around that L.A. will not survive the 90s as a giant earthquake is going to lay your town into ashes. Your comment on this?

'Yes, they have been saying this for years "the big one is coming". It has not arrived yet. But I'm sure one day it will be here. If I will survive I cannot say (that would be one more reason for you to leave this town - ed.). Anyone who has experienced an earthquake knows that they can be brutal. They sound very evil as they creep their way through the ground. Not stopping at anything in their path. Very intense and unpredictable!

At least the future for SADISTIC INTENT looks bright (if you ask me), so will there be some tour activities after your full length album strikes? What about invading the European countries?

'I hope so. If we get the support we deserve from a decent label we will surely be there. It would be great to perform in Europe, especially Germany since we get lots of support there.'

You are one of the bands who are very into the ancient death/thrash metal stuff of the 80s, and quite a lot of bands try (or claim) to be in the "old vein" without any success. Do you really think that a revival of death/thrash metal in the old vein is possible in these days? 'I think so, as far as image goes. But as far as being to create music in the old vein, there are only a few that can do it.'

SADISTIC INTENT is going to appear on DWELL RECORDS' tribute to CELTIC FROST compilation CD with the song "Return to the Eve", but do you really think that all the tribute things are good? Just take the VENOM, METALLICA, SLAYER, etc. tribute-CDs for example?

'Well, some are good, some just suck. I guess it depends on what bands appear on it. We wouldn't have done it if a bunch of shitty bands were going to appear on it. On this comp it will be Sadistic Intent, Grave, Mayhem, Emperor, Divine Eve, Enslaved, and others, it should be pretty interesting (Yes, the fans will buy this CD for sure, so that DWELL can easily make some extra-cash...-ed.). I have just found out that Tom G. Warrior has a new band and will also appear on this complilation (Yes, Apollyon's Sun covered "Babylon Fell"). Yeah, I know what you mean, it seems as everyone is doing a tribute to someone.

The whole scene isn't as honest as it used to be, especially when the quite eliterian and arrogant "true" (...) black metal wave appeared. What were your most ridiculous experiences with black/death metal bands during the last couple of years?

'No, not exactly. The only thing that comes to mind are a couple of 'zines that said they could not feature us 'cause we are death metal. I don't need them (We all don't need them, do we? ed.). They could stay in contact with their five friends for all I care. They would rather feature anything that claimed black metal. Yes, you are right. The underground is not as honest as it used to be. There will always be rip-offs, Nowadays there is large percentage of people involved. And with all the bullshit going on, things have not improved. Not only is there rip offs, I think another problem is all the false advertising by the record labels and bands themselves. Back in the old days when I read an ad that is what I got. How many times have you ordered something that was nothing like what the ad said! (It actually happened too often....

ed.) Yeah, some look all fucking crazy and evil with all their gear on. Talking too much and making themselves sound good. But could they play? They might as well have written a book.'

Which are your five favoured death metal albums?

Possessed "Seven Churches", Destruction "Infernal Overkill", Venom "Black Metal", Celtic Frost "Morbid Tales", Slayer "Hell Awaits"...(* I can't forget Sodom "In the sign of evil").'

None of these mentioned albums is youger than 10 years, really not bad ! It quite "trendy" nowadays to do hundreds of "sideprojects" (is it just because of the money !)...do members of SADISTIC INTENT also play in other bands ? 'No!'

The "once so proud underground" is destroyed by the capitalsitic spirit inside the metal scene, but still bands try to be "underground" with the help of getting more extreme (like being more satanic, having nazi attitudes, etc.). What do you think of this development and what is your concept (if there is any) in order to save the metal scene from being killed by money thirsty pigs /labels /bands?

'The scene must be controlled by the people who live the lifestyle and have the knowledge. I think these money hungry pigs will eventually move on. They are false, they are not truly into it, so it is not in their heart to stay. Though as long as there is still a market out there these pigs will exist. I think that the underground will split in half soon. You will have the die-hards in one and the trendy posers in another. I like it that the bands are getting more brutal and extreme. But there are certain things and attitudes that don't belong or have nothing to do with the underground. For instance, Nazism. To me the underground is for anyone and everyone who supports it. It is world wide that is why it is unique. These other idiots can write to each other-like a bunch of dumb fucks. I think this will only go so far. So they can stick to themselves and look in the mirror and think of how great they are. FUNNY! As long as there are honest people, good bands, good 'zines, it will continue. But the views, music, etc. must be passed on to the future generations, so they will know. They have to know the history! If not it will truly become extinct and forgotten.'

Can you imagine a life without music? What does metal mean to you?

It would be quite strange. Music is my life, we all have dropped everything for it. We even have opened DARK REALM records for the sake of the people here in L.A.. Our goals are to spread this music amongst the youth and polute their minds. We are not making money (it would be ok if you do as long as your attitude towards the underground is healthy - ed.), it all goes back into the shop so we can buy more merchandise. We do it, because we are die-hards for this scene. And we will keep doing it as long as we get support from the Hordes of Darkness (everyone on our mailing list). And of course make enough money to keep doing it.

We've reached the end...

'Hail to you Costa for the great interview (hail to you for the interesting answers ed.)! May you keep spreading TALES OF THE MACABRE throughout the underworld. And of course a salute to all the German death metallers. You guys are fucking brutal! Keep it dark! And remember in the end only death is real ...'


There's nothing to ad but to watch out for this band's first full-length release, 'cause I can't get rid of the feeling that "Second coming..." is going to tear some wimpy souls to pieces !!!













COUNTESS



COHNTESS is definitely not everyone's cup of tea, but I got really impressed when I listened to their second CD "The Return of the Horned one" which is simple as fuck, but very very original and raw. This kind of Black Metal music is just based on a couple of riffs which make the whole result sound so primitive but effective. In addition to that there are the insane vocals of Orlok, who screams aggressively through the whole album. And this strange music hasn't been honoured at all by the underground people until now which is a shame if you ask me. Therefore I thought it was my job to take command and make an interview with Orlok, who's the only warrior behind COUNTESS, possible.

What has happened since "The Return of the Horned one"? Any new targets in sight?

Well, after the release of "The Return of the Horned one" I recorded the next album "Ad Maiorem Sathanae Gloriam" in January'95. One of the tracks from that album, "Wrath of Satan's Whore", was released as a cassette-EP together with four other new tracks in March'95. After that, I got a new guitarpalyer and a new drummer and with them I did a short German tour in May'95, co-headlining with Mortuary Drape and supported by Mayhemic Truth and Drowned, which was pretty cool. After that tour the other members had to leave the band again and currently I'm working on material for the next album which is scheduled for release through NAZGUL'S EYRIE Productions as well so I can play after the release of "Ad Maiorem as well so I can play after the release of that album in Samhain'95, which is pretty soon.

Samhain 95, which is pretty soon.
Yes, the album is out now! COUNTESS is fuckin' primitive but very original black metal, but why this strange style? I would say that it's nearly impossible to more primitive at some parts....

go more primitive at some parts.... probably never heard the first Countess album Gospel of the Horned one" (Well, no, I haven't heard it ed !)...I like primitive music, both to listen to and to play. Primitive music appeals to primitive and basic instincts and I think it fits well in the whole concept behind the music. On the first two Countess albums, the primitive music is combined with a very primitive productions (four analog tracks) which makes them pretty unique in this age of overproduced albums. It gives them a certain purity in feel which people either seem to love or hate. However, I don't think there is any use in standing still and releasing albums which are the same. There is already a progression from "The Gospel..." to "The Return..." and this progression will continue. The third CD "Ad Maiorem Sathanae Gloriam" was recorded on sixteen digital tracks, so the sound is a lot more professional. The music of Countess will always remain simple and "primitive" in base, but there is space for progression nevertheless. On the second album there is a lot more variation and originality than on the first two and on the third one there is a little more melody. The new naterial for the fourth album I'm working on right now has more complex arrangements, but the basic style will What do you mean by "Orthodox Black Metal"?

Black metal the way it should be, primitive, raw, pure, dark, evil, brutal, satanic, vile, perverted, filthy, occult, sick, obscure with a lot of atmosphere. It doesn't mean, as it is sometimes misinterpreted, "unoriginal", Real Black Metal has always been original. All real Black Metal bands have their own identity and thus in this case originality is "orthodox". It is impossible to clone a real black metal band, even though so many try these days. But they don't really understand the music, so they copy the superficial characteristics like the face paint, inverted crosses, high guitar sound and high vocals, but their music lacks the soul of real black metal. I think this is also because most of these kids who try to play black metal these days have a grindcore or thrash or whatever background and have probably never even heard a heavy metal album (good point! - ed.) And black metal has of course developed out of heavy metal. I'm not saying that all these bands play bad music, but it is not and never will be black metal. COMPLESS only exists of you, Orlok, right ! Is this the reason why you used a drummachine instead of a drummer in flesh and blood, or do you prefer computer drums? Do you want other musicians to jo Countess !

Originally Countess was a real band, but after the recording of the first album the other members quit so I continued alone. I have had several line-ups since then but mone of them really worked out, so I think I will continue working alone and I will use session musicians to play live. The reason why I used a drummachine on "The Return..." is that I had no time to look for a drummer and teach him all the songs, I do prefer a real drummer. Perhaps I will have a session drummer on future albums, but since I did "The Return..." I have become much more experienced in programming the drummachine. But of course a real drummer is better (when he's good, I'd prefer a drummachine over a bad drummer) and live I need a real drummer anyway."

NAZGUL'S EYRIE PRODUCTION is a very small label which doesn't promote their bands too well, or am I wrong? Are you satisfied with their work for you? How many times has your CD sold by the way?

I'm very satisfied with my deal with NAZGUL'S FYRIF PRODUCTIONS. First of all I don't have to take care of the business side anymore now and can concentrate on my music. And N.E.P. might be small, but the label is growing

and besides that I'd prefer a good small label over a bad big label. With N.E.P. I have total artistic freedom, I can record when, where and how I want and N.E.P. is also reliable which can't be said of all underground labels, sadly. It is true that there isn't too much promotion, but it is getting better. As for sales, at the moment I think "The Return..." has sold 900 copies, but the sales are increasing."

You used to play in a hell lot of bands, but how's the situation now? Is 13

CANDLES for example still active?

No, at the moment I dont do anything outside Countess musically and I doubt that I ever again will, although you never know what might happen in the future of course. 13 Candles wasn't a band but a solo project, but since I do Countess on my own now there is not much need for another soloproject, especially since 13 Candles was musically in the same direction as Countess anyway. Some good, old musical ideas from older bands and projects of mine that never got anywhere will surface in Countess every now and then.'

The black metal hype is calming down now, so where do you see COUNTESS when the massdying of all the young black metal bands begins? Do you think

you'll still do this kind of music in about 4 - 5 years?

I don't see why I shouldn't be still doing this kind of music in 4 - 5 years... I've always been into this kind of music and I always will be. Like I already mentioned before, my music will develop, it won't stay the way it is now for all eternity, but it will always remain Black Metal.

What about THURISAZ Productions, your very own label? Can we expect anything new to be released ?

'Actually I stopped doing THURISAZ Productions last year. It was taking far too much of my time and I wanted to be able to concentrate completely on Countess. Holland has an active black / death metal underground, but there seems to be a kind of trouble between bands like you, OCCUIT, JUNERAL WIRDS,

etc....vour comment?

Well, I don't have any trouble with any Dutch band, at least not as far as I know... I do hear things every now and then of trouble between various bands, but I don't really care about it. I know quite a lot of dutch bands of course, but I'm not really in a lot of contact with most of them.'

Your opinion on the often heard statement that "true black metal" can only be played in Scandinavia?

Well, I don't know if this is a very often heard statement. I never heard it before actually (some bands say so ... -ed.). I think it's a statement that shows an utter lack of any form of the vaguest possible intelligence. Where the hell did Venom come from ! And Hellhammer !

Ha, good answer indeed! When I listened to COUNTESS' music I wondered if BURZUM is your biggest influence? I'm asking this because of your simple music and extreme screamy vocals...if not, please name some of your

inspirations you have.

I really can't understand this comparison... I don't think I'm influenced by Burzum at all. The inspiration for my music comes from a lot of things, music I listen to, books I read, my own experiences, but mainly from within... musically my biggest influence is Venom, after that Bathory and Hellhammer and all other bands I listen to, like Manowar, Samael, Marillion with Fish, Rainbow with Dio, old Sodom, Uriah Heep with David Byron, Mercyful Fate, Manilla Road, Cloven Hoof, Saint Vitus, Cirith Ungol, Angel Witch, Black Sabbath, Sorcerer from Sweden, old Candlemass, Sabbat from UK, Master's Hammer,

Iron Maiden, Snyper, Witchfynde, Poison from Germany, Brocas Helm, Tyrant (US), Dio, old Deep Purple, old Rush, Alastis, Mortuary Drape, Barathrum, Mercy, Judas Priest, old Celtic Frost, Hobbs' Angel of Death, Sarcofago, old Kreator, Ancient Rites, old Saxon, AC/DC with Bon Scott, old Accept, Infernal Mājesty, old Destruction and more... I also listen to classical music a lot, like J.S. Bach, Wagner, Stravinsky, Beethoven, Vivaldi and more.'

Black Metal bands often try to be "old-fashioned", in the tradition of the black / death metal forefathers, but most bands don't keep the vinyl tradition alive,

and so it is at COUATESS. Why no vinyl?

Well, I would prefer LPs instead of CDs, but you have to be realistic. In Holland, for example, only one factory still presses LPs and they are more expensive than CDs by now (then I still can't understand why the CDs still are more expensive than LPs when you buy it ... -ed.). And I think it's quite impossible to sell vinyl these days, almost everybody wants CDs. On my own label I did release a Hordes 7 inch, limited to 500 numbered copies, which is out for a year now and it's still not sold out completely. At the moment N.E.P. is looking into the possibility of having some albums, including "The Return of the horned one", released as limited edition picture disc LPs. I don't know if that will work out, but I would really like to see Countess on vinyl. I would really like to see the two first CDs on a double LP with fold-out cover, but I don't think that will ever happen." If this happens, I'll surely buy one copy ...and I guess some other vinylmaniacs, too. Talking about albums: What was the first metal record you picked up? Are there any albums you regret having bought?

The first metal record I ever bought was "The Number of the Beast" (by Iron Maiden if anybody doesn't know - ed.) and I don't regret that. I'm usually pretty low on cash, so I only buy albums that I'm sure I won't regret buying. There is an album I regret buying however, that "Requiem" crap CD that was sadly released as a Bathory album. I just bought it without listening to it first , if I had listened first I

wouldn't have bought it."

Nature seems to be a big inspiration for many of today's black / pagan / I don't know what metal bands, but this might be difficult for a Dutch band as Holland's nature isn't too interesting (no mountains, wide-forests, but a hell lot of people and fashions instead). Are you happy living in Holland? What do you think are the advantages / disadvantages of your country ?

Well, first of all there is some interesting nature in Holland. For example the beaches and the dunes, I often go out at night to walk over the beach and through the dunes and listen to the songs the sea sings. Nature is not really an important inspiration for my music however. I can see why these pagan metal bands are inspired by nature, but I don't really see why black metal bands should be inspired my nature. About living in Holland... well, I'm not happy here, but I don't think that has got anything to do with the country, I don't think I'd be happier anywhere else. Living in Holland will probably have some advantages and some disadvantages compared to the other countries, but in general I don't think life in Holland is that much different from life in Germany or other North West European countries.

Well, to keep the tradition at an interview's end I give the last words to you. Thank you for this interview. Cum nihil omnia erat, iam in vacuo existitis. Ille eart, est eritque. Sibi nomines mille sunt. ILLUM ADORA !!!!!!!!

The fourth COURTESS album is already recorded and will be entitled "The Book of the Herectic". Await its arrival in Spring /Summer'96 !!!



Although we get almost buried with Northern Black Metal albums and demotapes there are sometimes still interesting new bands arriving from the unknown with good music in their back... one of those bands is Sorhin. Their promotape '95 (recorded in summer'94, including three songs) isn't the new revelation in Black metal, but their straight ahead, rough sounding but still melodical riffs filled style causes a certain dark and powerful atmosphere. The vocals are a bit Grishnakh-like, you know, high distorted screams, and do fit to the whole music. But as those recordings are not the newest anymore I had to find out if Nattfursth, the man with the sore throat, is still satisfied with the on cassette banished result, and if new songmaterial is already written for Sohrin's next unholy attack....' We are still satisfied with the work on promo'94. The production is probably a bit thin, but what the fuck it was recorded on a four track porta studio and without bassgultar. We have recently recorded a MLP / MCD in Mid August for the Swedish label "Arte De Occulta". This time we used a real studio, so the sound turned out really great. The music/lyrics is still in the supreme dark Sohrin - style, raw and melodic, with an obscure atmosphere. The LP version will be out at the end of '95, the CD



version will follow within a few months after.' New albums of still unknown bands come out like mushrooms out of the ground, it's really unbelievable and surely fatal for the survival of the scene when too much (bad) releases are thrown on the market each month. So I hope that Sohrin were really ready enough to record something for a CD/LP-release, but I'm looking forward to hear the final result when it's out (if I can afford buying it.... there're a lot of LPs to choose from !). Coming back to the band's promotape, it is really shit for me as a non- Swedish speaking person to take a look at the lyrics as Nattfursth writes them in Swedish language. Is the band only interested in Swedish people listening to Sohrin's lyrics.... or wouldn't it be better to sing in English language as Nattfursth also sells his stuff to foreign people? He defends: No. 1 did not think it's better to write lyrics in English language. In my case, I for the first try to satisfy my own pleasures and feelings and then it is much easier to express them in Swedish or native language. But we will probably do some translations into English later, time will tell. Yes, that would be a good idea... or probably not in case your lyrics suck, ha ha! Some bands even became famous without having real lyrics, remember old Xecutioner / Obituary. Before I left Nattfursth with his other mail I wanted to know what he thinks is Sohrin's strength in comparison to other bands...and his answer that 'It's very hard to answer this question, better you do.' lets me fall into my own trap as it's also hard for me to answer this ugly question. Perhaps it are the offs and the entire atmosphere that make their music strong, at least on their promotage. I don't know. The band's line-up now consist only of Eparyson (electric strings) and Nattfursth riffs and the entire atmosphere that make their music strong, at least on their promotape, ... I don't know. The band's line-up now consist only of Eparygon (electric strings) and Nattfursth himself (chants and voice), for the MLP recording they used a session drummer. If some of you black metal junkies simply can't wait until the MLP / MCD appears, then you have to organise \$6 for the promotape, which is still available at....

There are luckily still bands and you have some 80s feeling in their music, DAZUZU North-America is one of Their high-sounding Black Metal has some simple thrash roots (here: \$15962, \$6\$52066302 - rhythus,...) which sound pretty cool as I've heard on their .advance tape for the upcoming demo. It includes titles like "Hellhorde with Trendkill', Reigning", "Infernal Iron Legion", etc., and so raw and primitive as the titles sound, so primitive (but effective) is PAZUZU's music. The vocals are a bit in the vein of the old whispering style of Holocausto (BERERIE) and can be considered as quite typical neo black metal. But lately I received another demoadvancetape with new vocals (done by Warren of SABBATH Records, now the band's permanent singer who sounds a bit like 3##OXEML's Abbath). Tony (guitars) does also play in CZURACE beside PAZUZU, and their 4 song demo is a bit different from Tony's main band (apart from being inspired by ancient sounds). It's not as with primitive, complicated drumrhythms and guitarriffs, even keyboards were used at some of the songs. By contacting Tony I had the promising bands in one interview, but his answers weren't always too satisfying as you can read as following...



In PAZUZU everything goes as planned. Darking Hails for Warren Window / SABBATH Tomasz T. /

Well, this is a strange and stupid answer to my question, Tony. But it's of course your thing... You still call your band \$12222 although there are a couple of bands around with the same name, one of them already with an album out. Wouldn't it be clever to change your name to escape the problems?

There is no problem, Costa!'
Is \$238,886 just your sideband? What is the difference between the .
two bands you play in? Who are the other guys in \$238,886?
'EZURATE was another band of mine for \$-9 months during

PAZUZU line-up changes. EZURATE remains only by the reign of the infernal PAZUZU Horde! HAIL PAZUZU!!!

Are both your bands black metal? I ask this, because you are wearing a RURGISE WIRD shirt (cool!) on the flyer for \$\text{FERREE}\$, and you can't really say that "Rock'n'Rolf" created evil

Are there any ideas inside your head concerning a more professional release? What about a present / CZURSEC split LP?

Majestic Metal

new star at the northern horizon is born with **Covenant**, a duo from Norway. Their majestic kind of black metal sounds quite typical Norwegian, but it has a proud character and noble feeling. A demo under the title (12) should give us a rough imagination of what we should expect when "In Times before the Light", the band's debutalbum, will be unleashed upon the metal consuming maniacs. It was obviously that I had to start this short interview, which was done with Thanatos, with a question concerning the album....

"In Times before the Light" contains material written over the last two and a half years, together forming 10 songs of supreme majestism! Some "old" ones (including demo songs) and some "new" ones. Most of the music is in the same vein as our demo, only more noble and majestic.

The actual title "In Times before the Light" reflects upon absolute darkness, where thoughts like christianity / religion, good / evil did /does not exist...only pure darkness!!! This is our tribute to this darkness...may we meet some day!! Why did you choose BLACK TOWER Records to release your album? I think they are a quite unknown label....

' Yes, BLACK TOWER Records is up till now pretty unknown, but that's probably because they've never released anything! Our album will be their first release, and by this we will help eachothers to get our names established. Besides...the deal we got was excellent!'

Your music heavily reminds me at Satyricon just with the difference that you're more hymnic...which influences do you admit for your songwriting?

'Hm...difficult question! Well. I certainly don't agree with you that we sound like Satyricon, but it's pretty difficult to know one's influences. I guess I am influenced alot by classical music, but also books, weather, strange happenings, feelings, nightly landscapes, winter, etc. I will try to make Covenant as noble and majestic as possible, but still very dark and destroying. These are the most important musical factors in Covenant, and I think most of the "influence" comes from none others than my self!"

Don't you think that it will be fatal to play "nordie-styled" metal? It's obvious that the normal listener will sooner or later lose his interest in a certain music that is played by hundreds of bands nowadays...Are there any ideas which should help Covenant survive the upcoming hard times (which will surely come) for northern black ...?

'Ok...listen here now, and listen good! We play this music, because this is how we want Covenant to sound like, and not because this is what's 'popular' right now! This is what we want to do, and we couldn't care less whether the "normal" listener is interested or not. We play for ourselves, not for others (..it's a good attitude, of course, but this is a contradiction when you are releasing albums for other people! - ed.). But if someone likes us for what we are, hey ...coo!! But if no one does...well, fuck off! We wouldn't change our musical direction just to gain more listeners. "Fatal"? "Fatal" for the wallet is what you really mean Besides, I don't think there will come a difficult time for "northern" black! Because, admit it: Norway has the best bands! ...and quality never goes out of style."



Yes, there are some great norwegian bands around, but the number of worse bands in your country has increased also, you must admit. But of course I hope that you're right that "quality will never get out of style". Who really knows that in this chaotic world...But coming to the next question: What makes you so sure that your album will be one of the greatest releases from Norway ever ? I mean, with this promise you have to compete with great albums like "De Mysteriis Dom Sathanas" by Mayhem, Burzum, Immortal, Enslaved, old Darkthrone, Emperor, etc...

'Well, I don't see this as a "competition" at all !!! We are not on a mission to create the "best" black metal album of all time! If it's good or not will be up to each individual listener to decide for themselves. But personally I think it's one of the best albums from Norway in a long time (I hope that you're right with this !- ed.), but if you don't...well, that's your problem! I don't care. I like it myself, and that's all I have to know.'

You're playing in a "mighty norse band" (as you call it on your flyer), but with "Thanatos" you use an old greek name of the "god of death", so why a hellenic name? Are you also interested in south-european mythologies?

'First of all..., if you had read our flyer more properly, you would see that these are the words of Aasmund Jordal of BLACK TOWER Records, and not ours. But anyway, the name Thanatos was chosen on a purely individual basis, and has nothing to do with the "concept" of Covenant. Just because I live in Norway, doesn't mean I can't be fascinated by other cultures / mythologies beside the norse one. Fuck off to narrowmindness!"

Good point, really. Statements like that are quite rare in these days from norwegian people... Well, I guess that you are still not able to live from **Covenant** financially, so how are you able to survive?

'Ha ha! I live in my mom's house actually...! Yeah, it pretty much sucks, but I'll be getting some cash soon, and then I'll afford to get my own place. But I won't take some shitty job just to get money. I have other methods.'

As usual you get the chance at the end to tell something the readers what should have been told...

'Ah, clichee! (Yeah, of course, but clichee can sometimes be nice, too. - ed.) Thanks for this interview, finally some intelligent questions! Our demo can be ordered for 7 US\$ / 8 US\$ (world) / 50 NOK, until the end of time. Our album will be out in October on CD and ltd. 500 Lps, with poster and sticker! Everyone may hail themselves if they think they deserve it.'

In comparison to their Scandinavian neighbours Sweden and Norway, there aren't too much black / death metal bands coming from Finland. But if there are some, then those bands are (mostly) very interesting ones... and so is Curse. Their debutdemo "The Black Hordes" includes 4 songs of straight ahead black / death mayhem in the vein of Beherit, Archgoat and (old) Impaled Nazarene, not original, but good stuff to listen to. I asked Toni if he admits those influences for his music, being inspired by typical Finnish sounds...his comment: Well, there night be some Beherit / Archgoat influences, because we like both of them a lot. But I think we still have our own way... we don't like to copy anyone. I like a lot of bands like Immortal, Barathrum, Equinox, Emperor, Mysticum, etc., but we don't copy them.' Yes, you don't sound like those bands, but the above mentioned Finnish

sound can't be denied, you can find typical fast rhythms and screamed vocals like Impaled Nazarene, and sometimes slower parts with growling vocals à la Beherit / Archgoat in your music. Staying in Finland the question "what's up in this country concerning the actual black / death metal scene" can't be avoided as there don't seem to be many new bands....Toni again: Black / death metal "scene" in Finland is really poor, and if some new bands show their faces and mustc... eh, they are usually shit. I don't blame anyone but that is it. Simple but clear answer. On the other side we could be happy that there are not as many bands coming from Finland than from

Norway, who of you is really able to listen to all the uncountable new bands? But what's going to happen at Curse... what about new songs?... I must say that I don't know. We will probably, record a new tape at the beginning of '96, but that's not 100% sure yet. New songs are faster and harder than the cassette EP-songs. I take care of singing now, so no growling "Cannibal Corpse" shit anymore.' Oh, really ? I think that this sounded cool and refreshing, not listening to screamy vocals all the time. A change will probably be a mistake, but you have to figure it out on your very own. The first edition of "The Black Horde" is sold out, but DARK MOON Production will soon make another edition. I think the price is \$ 5, but I can't guarantee it. As said before, not an original demo, but a cool one with good sound. God Kainlulainen, Autioiie 3, 79480 Kangslamp I, Finland



hen it comes to great underground magazines we have to mention VOICES FROM THE DARKSIDE from Germany . In just a couple of years Frank, the chief of this mag, managed to release seven issues of supreme metallic art, and with every new issue the mag is getting thicker and thicker (# 7 had 84 printed pages !!!), and has developed to one of the best and most honest black'n' white zines in the world. Frank Stöver is active in the metal scene for more than a decade now (long before black or even death metal became a giant trend), so it was a honour for me to interview this experienced man as it was obvious that he had a lot of interesting things to say. To start the interview I went back to Frank's last station before he started VOICES FROM THE DARKSIDE

What was the reason to stop the "VOICES FROM THE DARKSIDE column" in HORROR INFERNAL mag and to do a mag on your very own? Wasn't it easy to work for H.I.?

'Oh boy, here we go again... The main reason for me to stop working for HORROR INFERNAL magazine was probably the new publisher / editor: Uwe. He's a complete jerk and doesn't know anything about this music at all ! He's just doing it to cash-in on advertising money and to get free CDs and tickets (Yeah, .like the guy from LEGACY mag - ed.)! He tells the record companies lies when it comes to the quantity of mags he's printing, just to get more money for advertisments. By now, there's probably a lot of small fanzines that are doing better than he does, salewise! And HORROR INFERNAL used to be a mag with 20.000 copies (!!) before he took over... So, as you can see, it was always a pain in the ass to work with him and as far as my column in there goes, it was full of mistakes, wrong pictures, shortened features and so on and so on. Besides that, the response was so good, that I got buried in material and could easily have made the column a full magazine, instead of 2-4 pages every month... which I did by starting VOICES FROM THE DARKSIDE, the zine!

You belong to the kind of editors who work very intensly on the magazine, I mean, you manage to release two over 70 A4 pages strong issues in just one year. There can't be anything else in your life beside VOICES, or am I wrong?

In a way you are right! VOICES turned more or less into a full-time thing, which is pretty good on one hand, 'cause I'm unemployed for some years now and would bore myself to death if I wouldn't have something to do. But, it often really gets on my nerves as well, 'cause almost every day consists of the same activities: mail (a VERY BIG part), interviews, layout, typing, reviews, listening to demos, records, etc. But I guess you will know that yourself, won't you? (Well, I'm not working as fast as you do with the mag, but I know what you mean - ed.) When I started VOICES, I didn't really think that it would be accepted THAT fast. I mean, just look at the first issue... it was an average A5-size zine with not that good layout and just a few interviews and reviews... But it got a tremendous feedback !!! Every new issue that came out sold faster and got even more feedback, so right now I'm at a point where it's easy to sell 1000 in just about one month only (which happened with # 7). So, it basically takes a lot of sparetime to get done with all that and that's what I dislike a bit... I'm absolutely dedicated to what I'm doing, but some days I am just bored of it all, 'cause it's getting too much, you know?! Even concerts are just a part of the whole thing by now and it happens pretty rarely that I'm impressed by any of the shows I go to... sad but true! With the black metal trend came a lot of fascistic points of view into the scene, and you fight against such a development as everyone can read when getting his/her eyes on VOICES... Did you get any problems with people because of your attitude?

Tuhm... not really problems, but there are a few people that wrote in and were telling me that I get on their nerves with all my anti-fascism stuff, which I understand, 'cause it was never intended to become such a big part of VOICES. But there are so many zines and kids outthere that are not voicing their opinions, they just "feed" what those braindead bands tell in interviews and I'm not here to do the same. I mean I'm probably one of the oldest fanzine editors (when this issue hits the streets I might have turned 30 already!) and I'm not willing to accept anything! I can't stand it, you know!! I will continue to boycott those dickheads, although I hope that this stupid "trend" will pass away pretty soon, 'cause it mainly is about music, not politics, isn't it!

What about VOICES Productions? Are you intending to make it bigger, is anything planned?

VOICES Productions is probably the section of VOICES that I'm the least dedicated to. It was just an idea when I heard these Venom-covers that Sigh did. I wanted to do something with them as I was heavily into their versions. Also the Master demo... that came out on VOICES Productions, because Paul did send me the tapes without covers and I talked to him about doing a cover for them and put it out again on VOICES Productions which he agreed on. That's all! I mean, I was thinking about more releases in the future, but there's already so much stuff floading on the market that it doesn't really make sense to come up with even more (it depends on what kind of stuff you intend to release - ed.).... Although I'm dealing with Rob Urbinati of Canadian Sacrifice at the moment. Perhaps I'll do his new project Interzone on VOICES which is fuckin' excellent! Great old stuff!'

Let's really hope so! But talking about other great old stuff: You used to be the manager of DESTRUCION in the mid 80s.... how did you get into those managing things? I mean, you are coming from the northern part of Germany and DESTRUCTION lived at the Swiss border...

For the Destruction thing I have to go back in time even more, 'cause it all started in the beginning of the 80s when I used to do the fanclub for ROADRUNNER Records, who were just at the beginning of their career at that time. I was doing a Heavy Metal-fanclub and wrote to a lot of labels, asking them for info material on their bands... One day SPV contacted me, because they seemed to like what I was doing and told me about this new Dutch label that would need a helping hand when it comes to promotion. I was totally into the idea and got bombed with info and photos of the ROADRUNNER bands which were sent out to the fans who asked for it. I also put out a xeroxed fanclub zine which was called "Roadrunner Fan Club Metal Warriors". I had about 50 copies or something, nothing really serious, but the name kept spreading and I got material from bands that asked me for help. I listened to their stuff, reviewed it in the zine and passed on the good ones to ROADRUNNER and SPV. One of those tapes came from **Destruction**'s drummer Tommy. I freaked out on it, 'cause I never heard anything that brutal from a German band, so I offered them to do their fanclub exclusively. They agreed and I started to mail out tapes. SPV were the first to call me up, asking me for the band's phonenumber... The rest is history!

When they've been into the studio for "Sentence of Death" they called me up and asked me to become their managed instead, 'cause it "would look better" to have a management address printed on the sleeve... I had no idea what to do, but agreed. Within the next months I started to organise small gigs and interviews and kept sending out stuff for them. That's how it all started, ...everything was done over the phone.'

Please tell us some interesting experiences that you had during that time (like the DESTR. support for SLAYER's "Hell Awaits"-tour, parties, I don't know what...)...and what do you think of your "manager" time when you look back?

As far as experiences go, I made a lot! I was about 18 then and didn't know anything about business at all. For me it was fun, but I remember how serious it can become when Destruction had to open-up for Slayer in Bremen / Germany on their first tour ever. 1 went there and thought it would be fun to hang out with them, see them play and all that, but the tourmanager was a professional one and freaked out on me, 'cause I didn't tell the band to get on stage in time and stuff like that... The introtape they used back then was "tested" and Destruction thought it would be time to get on stage, so they did and played the first song without the PA and lightshow... Luckily the guy at the mixing desk reacted and the show could be continued the way it should be, but don't remind me on the tourmanager's reaction afterwards... He yelled at me all the time...! As far as parties go, I only remember one very good, which was on new years eve in their hometown. They invited me to party with them and I went down there. Unexperienced as I was in terms of alcohol, I tried to compete with them when it comes to drinking, but I failed, because I puked very early and slept a lot. Even the next day I still felt drunken when I woke up... It was horrible! If you consider how I turned into the role of a manager, I think I did the best I could at that time, although I would do a lot better nowadays of course.'

DESTRUCTION are still alive but not comparable to their old period, but rumours are going around that they will reform the original line-up. Do you think that will come true and that their heart still beats for the old thing?

'Never heard about this rumour before, but to be honest with you, I doubt that it'll be the same if they ever get together again. I mean, they have developed as musicians as well as becoming older, so you can't bring back the old times, plus Tommy would never be in the band again as he and Schmier are only talking to eachother through their lawyers. So, it only would be the 2nd Destruction line-up and I have serious doubts that the old fans would like to have that back together again... Destruction was "Sentence of Death", "Infernal Overkill" and "Eternal Devastation" and that feeling is not there anymore, so I hope they WON'T do it!"

You belong to the sort of guys who are busy with writing for magazines since quite some time, so what do you think of the current situation in the "zine-underground"? Is the general quality better nowadays?

Yeah, the quality of the zines is a lot better nowadays, but I think the majority of today's editors is lacking in the real spirit of this music. They discovered the whole thing way too late and you can easily find out about it when you read their zines... Mostly they are pretty boring. They care too much about having a professional looking zine, with high glossy paper, full-colour cover and a lot of advertisments in it, instead of writing about interesting bands. The contents of most of the zines gets dedicated to the record companies and that's really sad... I prefer zines that try to be different... but they are hard to find unfortunately!

What was your first confrontation with "metal". Do you remember that time?

Yeah, I do it very well. I visited my cousin when I was about 8 or 9 years-old and was totally fascinated by an old poster of Kiss he had in his room. They looked so great with the leather and the make-up and all that. Shortly after I got to see them on TV, they had a special about their first Germany tour and also showed some live-footage. I went to our local record store and bought Kiss "Alive" right away and was blown away ! I was the biggest Kiss fan around, bought everything I could get about them and got to see them on stage in 1980 finally... my first concert ever ! That show changed my life, 'cause Iron Maiden played as the support act (I'm feeling a lot of envy, Frank ! -ed) and I started to buy their debut record as well. After that, everything that looked typical METAL was bought: Saxon, Tygers of Pan Tang, Samson, Def Leppard, Judas Priest etc. until Metallica's "Kill 'Em All" and Venom's "Black Metal" came out... That's when I got into really heavy music... Before Kiss I used to listen to Sweet, the band I thought of being pretty heavy for that particular time also.'

What's different between the scene of the 80s and the 90s, especially between the bands, fans (their general behaviour and at concerts), the whole thing? Do you think that those two periods can be compared? By the way, which was the best "metal year" for you and why?

There's a big difference ! In the 80s people were really hungry for metal in general and the shows were crowded because a lot of kids wanted to see all the bands for the first time! The fans went to the shows just to have a good time and see great bands. Nowadays people are often there just because they are bored with their everyday life and to meet friends. They often come to a show of bands they've already seen many times and are not that enthusiastic anymore. But the bands are often not that exciting anymore, too. My best year in terms of metal was probably in the mid-eighties sometime, when I saw Metallica, Possessed, Venom. Kreator, Voivod, Assassin, Celtic Frost, ... those kind of bands for the first time !

They will never be replaceable by anything new, that's for sure! I also have hard times when I see really young kids at shows of death metal bands today, taking themselves verrrry serious and posing like if they are the most evil ones around just because mommy gave them the money to let them buy a Cannibal Corpse Shirt or whatever... In the early years of metal, fans were accepting many bands the same way (just look at old photos of kids with denim jackets full of patches), today they are fighting eachother... stupidity reigns!

What are your favoured albums if it's possible for you to make a selected choice? And are there any great old bands you know who never got the attention they deserved?

'My favourite records? Hmm... let's see: Possessed "Seven Churches", Venom "Black Metal" & "Welcome to Hell", Destruction "Sentence of Death", Celtic Frost - everything up to "To mega Therion", Exciter "Violence and Force", Slayer - everything up to "Reign in Blood", Hellhammer "Apocalyptic Raids", Kreator "Pleasure to Kill".. and stuff like that! Stuff I used to grow up with and listened to again and again. That's something 1 really rarely do nowadays, 'cause most albums / demos do not impress me that much anymore... There's many older bands that should have become more successful, like Infernal Majesty, Razor (YES! -ed), Necrophagia, Slaughter, Sacrifice... I can't think of them all now,

but I think you got the point.'

Who's the one to blame that our current scene isn't as healthy as it used to be?

'Mainly everyone that is putting out records! I mean, there're way too many labels or wanna-be labels that are flowing on the market, plus there're too many idiots in the scene that are just doing it for money, mainly those who pretend to know everything when they write for big full-coloured shit magazines (we don't have to mention any names, do we ?) ! They take themselves more serious than the actual bands they write about. It's just getting too much of everything. Nobody can listen to all that! Take me, for example, I get everything for free, but I have tough times to listen to everything really in-depth... I wonder how people should know about good or bad bands if there are so many to choose from. Reviews in zines are sometimes a helping hand, but they are often far away from the truth. I hope the scene will collapse totally and start from zero again. With less of everything - may the good ones get what they really deserve and the crap should burn in hell, yezzz !'

I guess that a lot of your old mates don't listen to metal anymore (in other words: they wimped out), right? What kind of feelings did you have when this happened?

No, not really ! Most of them just added other styles of music to the ordinary metal we all loved so much. Some turned into the hardcore direction, others discovered more commercial stuff or some even began to enjoy rap / hiphop (arrghhh....this is wimp-out! Don't you remember COMBAT's motto in the mid eighties ! "Ultimate revenge (for disco)" ed.). But we often talk about the "good old times" of metal and pick up old albums... There's magic in the air when that happens 'cause everyone has a big smile on his face and a lot of good memories... That will ever be! Take the older generation, they used to grew up with Led Zeppelin, Black Sabbath and so on and they will still like them, no matter what is hip today (and gone tomorrow), you know ?! It is a big part of your life! It formed you when you were younger!

Coming back to VOICES: You managed to publish seven issues in just a couple of years, and I guess that there will be more in future. But aren't there frustrating situations at times which make you think about stopping the mag, for example when bands don't answer interviews or fans disappoint you (especially at concerts)?

'Some of the frustrating moments I already covered

in your second question, but as fas as interviews go that haven't been answered by bands... I don't really care, unless the band means a lot to me (mainly the old heroes of mine) - that can be frustrating indeed! If a newcomer band doesn't reply, there are still plenty of others who are willing to do so. And I don't really care for the fans at concerts... I mean, as I told you before, most of them don't mean anything to me. They are young kids and taking themsleves way too serious, so I avoid to care about them. If they don't like VOICES, I don't care. The zine is for people who are looking for the old spirit that gets lost nowadays and if there's a feature about an old band in there, some of them even don't know the band.... bad luck for them!

Are you already working on # 8 ? If yes, some details would be cool !

'Yep, # 8 is already in the making, but I won't tell you anything at this point of time as I hope to come up with a really special issue in terms of the contents. And as of yet, I'm not sure if anything will be possible, so I better do not talk about it already. The only thing I can tell right now is , the quality of the texts will be better as I use a computer for it now and I don't have to reduce my old typewriter stuff on a xerox machine over and over again. But don't worry, the feeling will stay the same, 'cause I'm not going to use it for layout and stufff, just for the typing to get a better printing quality! I hope to have it out early 1996 sometime.'

With all your experiences and metallic knowledge I want you to give the readers / fans some wise words for a better orientation in this quite with attitudes, releases, etc. overloaded scene!

That's a tough closing one... The best thing to do often can be tapetrading. This way you get to hear a band quite early and you can already make up your mind whether you like them or not. And it's getting easier to select albums that way also, 'cause you are already aware of many names when albums finally come out. Don't let yourselves fool by reviews or hype, always check out the stuff on your own, and be true to yourself. If you like something - good, don't worry about the reactions of other who do NOT like it. Don't follow the masses, it will be a waste of money if you discover that you bought stuff you don't really like yourself...

Costa, thank you so much for giving me this oppurtunity! It's a real honour to get a feature in TALES OF THE MACABRE as I admire your work very much! Keep the spirit alive!

Thank you for your great answers... if everyone answers an interview like you do, then the general niveau /attitude in our scene would be much much better.

At the end I like to say that VOICES....# 8 is probably out when you read this, and I can guarantee you that especially fans of old bands get a stiff in their jeans when holding # 8 in their hands as interviews with POISON, RAZOR, SACRIFICE, etc. are intended to be included beside the actual bands. If you like to know some info, write to Frank with an IRC (or send \$5/\$6 directly to pre-order your copy as his mag is always sold out very quickly!).

Forgotten Jewels

Classical metal albums you should never get out of your mind...

EXCITER - Unveiling the Wicked

Canadian Exciter managed to strike with an album ("Heavy Metal Maniac") even before Metallica's highly celebrated 'Kill 'Em All'-LP was out, and the band has always be counted to the premier power/speed metal bands. "Unveiling the Wicked", Exciter's fourth record, is the most powerful one if you ask me, although it wasn't as fast as the band's previous released stuff plus the album suffered from a weak production (it was produced by the same asshole who ruined the sound on Possessed's "Beyond The Gates" LP). But the songs are really great, heavy metal with great pounding drums, totally screaming vocals (which are still original and uncopied until now) and ,most important, phenomenal guitars (just listen to the godly soli, fuckin' excellent !). Songs like "Invasion / Waiting in the Dark", "Living Evil", "Brainstorm / Die in the Night" or "Mission Destroy" are an excellent proof for the 80s' metal bands being much better at their instruments, especially at the guitars, than the majority of today's bands. If you want to experience real heavy metal power, then you shouldn't miss this one here (the other Exciter LPs except for "O.T.T." except for "O.T.T." are great, too). For unknown reasons "Unveiling the wicked" has been crushed by the critics, saying Exciter has wimped out and shit like that, and this had in my opinion some negative effects on the band's career. The last big success at Exciter were the Brazilian gigs anno '87 as supportact for Venom, who still were very famous in Brazil during that time. I don't know whether the band is still alive or not...the latest sign was the "Kill After Kill" album back in '92, which was a kind of 'Back to the Roots' album (in the vein of their in '84 released "Violence and Force" LP). It was a really hard to see Exciter being the opening act for the Rage tour in '92 (I guess), when the played in front of 150 people...



DESTRUCTOR "Maximum Destruction" (Roadrunner)

Cleveland's answer to Slayer !!! Thrash Metal in the vein of old Slayer ("Show No Mercy"), just with the difference that Destructor's music was more based on rhythmic energy, although good guitarsoli aren't missing. This album was released in the beginning of 1986, but due to bad promotion the band didn't get too much attention in the scene. However, smasher like "Pounding Evil", "Iron Curtain", "Destructor", etc. are the kind of thrash metal which was very popular back in that time as nearly everybody was mad about Slayer !!! "Maximum Destruction" sadly was destined to be the only LP by this promising band, because their bassist Dave Holocaust was stabbed to death by an insane asshole on new year's eve 1987. This was Destructor's end, during a time when they were recording their follow-up LP which never saw the light of day (unfortunately). If you like old thrash, you simply have to get a copy of this forgotten jewel!

AVENGER "Blood Sports"/ "Killer Elite" (Neat Records /Roadrunner)

Heavy /Power Metal at its finest. These English rockers deliver us music that sounds like a bastard out of Iron Maiden and Exciter which hammers pretty heavy into your ears. Don't get shocked by the stupid front- and backcover, the music is really well-done. Nice !

Also their second (and also last) album "Killer Elite" is cool and in the same direction with good guitarwork, etc. . Real Power/Heavy Metal freaks should have their own copies of both LPs

HOBBS' ANGEL OF DEATH

"House of Death" (Steamhammer)

This Australian outfit has probably released the last real wicked thrash album it was the time (1988) when shitbands like Anthrax, Helloween, Testament, etc. have ruined the old rough thrash spirit and ruled the scene with their pseudoheavy music. That was the reason why "House of Death" hadn't been celebrated by the leading magazines, but to me this is one of the best thrash albums ever made. Straight ahead dark thrash in the vein of old Slayer, Sodom and Venom (exactly the influences which a lot of new black metalbands claim to have).... The songlyrics seemed to be quite clichee, just take a look at titles like "Lucifer's Domain", "Satan's Crusade", etc. BUT even if this seems to be unoriginal, Hobbs' music is (at least for me) way more evil than the stuff most of today's black metalbands play! Especially Peter Hobbs' vocals are more than just ugly...his hard but clear pronunciation of the words sounds great as well as the voice itself (young Tom Araya meets Tom Angelripper). Songs like "Crucifixion", "Marie Antoinette", etc. still beat the hell out of the amps and totally convince. Hobbs' have released a new album after 7 years of absence, and I'm very excited to hear it. When it's great (I hope so), then expect to read an interview with Peter Hobbs in TALES ... # 4 ! All of you headbangers who still aren't familiar with "House of Death" should get a copy of it, especially as it gets sold for a few bucks only. The CD version contains two bonus tracks !

AGENT STEEL - Skeptics Apocalypse (Roadrunner /Combat records)

With the "Speed Metal" wave came the dangerous Agent Steel (as they were called by COMBAT), probably the best Speed band ever. Their debut-LP was highly expected after the band released their debutdemo "144,000 gone", plus ex-members of Abattoir played in Agent Steel, and this album turned out to be one of the strongest in '85. Excellent rough sounding guitars (riffs that nearly every of today's black metal bands couldn't play), drums, bass and John Cyriis' vocals which sound like Bruce Dickinson's (at Iron Maiden-times), just a bit higher and theatralic at parts. Every song is sounding individual and present first class metal with guitarsoli which make real metaller's heart pound wilder, "Skeptics Apocalypse" is nothing but an unforgetable masterpiece of furious metal. The band got weaker with every new release (a 12'inch and an album followed), and suffered from many line-up changes, so that their career ended in '88. If you ever get the chance to grip this record, then make sure that you won't get your hands off it again (also the 12'inch "Mad Locust Rising" is enjoyable and pretty rare). A lot of new bands were formed by Ex-Agent Steel members (like Holy Terror, Evil Dead, Scepter, Pontius Pilatus, etc.), but they all couldn't compete with the class of Agent Steel's debut-vinyl strike



(Roadrunner / Viper Records)

Until today I can't really understand why a band like Razor never got too much attention in the metal underground, especially when I listen to "Executioner's Song", the band's second release (the first one was a mini-album called "Armed and Dangerous" which was limited to 1000 copies and is an ultra-rare jewel now). Back when this album was out (early 1985) they were described as Motörhead on speed because of Stace "Sheepdog" McLaren's rough voice, but musically the band was a mixture out of Slayer and traditional heavy metal with excellent guitarsoli, cool basslines and pounding drums. Killersongs like "Take This Torch", "Hot Metal", "Fast and Loud", etc. still overwhelm me and bring back a certain old cool feeling. The band's trademark was always Stace's piercing screams which haven't been imitated by any other band until now, Razor got harder (and more monotonous but still great) with every new album (they released three LPs in one year !), and the band didn't care about what all the critics said. Because of the massive Razor- boycott in most big magazines, the band got a certain cult status some thrashers' heart. All VIPER ROADRUNNER albums (three albums) and of course especially the MLP by Razor are hard to get nowadays, so open your eyes very wide for it.

THE UNSANE - Inverted Crosses

(New Renaissance)

This is not really a masterpiece, but an essential MLP . for everyone into old Slayer. Songs like "The Godsend", "Clouds of Death" sound like simpler versions of Hannemann's / King's early songwriting. So if you ever see this piece of vinyl (also available on Picture Disc). why not checking it out?


OSTRO60TH

'Full Moon's Eyes'

Friends of melodical but still heavy Power Metal have surely heard about Ostrogoth from Belgium, haven't This MLP (released in '84 !?) was the band's first. step on vinyl as far as I know, followed by two LPs ("Ecstasy and Danger", "Too Hot"), but I think that "Full Moon's Eyes" was their best strike. Today their music might sound clichee, but on the contrary this is especially interesting, because this style can not be heard in the 90s anymore. Not everyone's cup of tea!

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UNPURC

सक्रमाहर - an original but also a not too beloved band. After a couple of demotapes they released their debut CD which includes both new and old songs which could be described as northern sounding black metal, but with the difference that UPPURE have some strange rocky rhythms and riffs included in their music. It's something you have to hear a couple of times before you really get into it (that's the reason why some people find this band boring), but as long as there are people out there liking it (including me) I don't care. Like in TALCS Of THE 州ACABRE # 1 it was again Kolgrim (the grim person on the picture) who had to

What did you think after holding the first USPUR€ CD in your hands?

The first reaction was: What happened to our cover??? But it felt great to release this one. I hope it will give the band more promotion than our demos did. Of course it would really feel better to release a LP version of the album, but in these days it's quite hard to find a good deal which includes LP versions.

Although you're one of the older swedish black metal bands nowadays, you didn't get too much attention until you signed at NAPALM... What do you think was the reason for this ? Do you see Unpuke as a kind of "outsider band"?

Our demos weren't printed in to many copies and we did not do too many flyers for them either. And we didn't work too much with promoting the band earlier, we thought it was better to work on the music and the band itself more, instead of promoting it. The music is absolutely the most important thing to us (It simply has to be when you are a "band" - ed.). I don't know if Unpure is an outsider band, I don't give a fuck either. I just probably see Unpure as total idiots, they can kiss my bleeding ass.'

Well, I don't exactly know what Kolgrim means with that.... Anyway, I must admit that it's not easy to get into UAPURC's music when listening to it for the first time, so I can imagine that some album reviews haven't been too positive, right? How were the critics for your CD?

'Eeeh, I haven't read any review of out album so far. Some people told me that the album is very good, etc., but I haven't seen or heard too many reactions. Perhaps you know more about this than we do.

Not really, but some people told me that "U介DURE is pure boring" and stuff like that. I think they should listen to your stuff again until they get used to

your style... But continuing to bore you with my questions: You had a second guitarist, but he left very soon. What was the reason and what about a new guitarist?

'We kind of kicked the last guitarsit out, because he didn't seem to give Unpure very much intention as he should have done. He fucked up a bit. We are looking for two new guitarists, but it seems to be quite impossible to find any. But right now we will be joined by two session guitarists from another swedish band. They will help out for the next recording and for gigs. But we need two guitarists to join us and who will devote their asses to the band."

Black metal bands often talk about old bands / influences, but most bands do not have the ancient touch in their music as they claim to have. What about UNPURE's music ? Do you intend to sound ancient or doesn't that matter when composing

'We are very influenced by bands from the 80s, but we are aware of living in the 90s now, and we play our own crap. We don't intend to sound ancient (with some exceptions of course, hail Celtic Frost !!!)... (oh yeah, I heard this in your "A Forest Event" song which heavily sounds like "Circle of the Tyrants" - ed.), we are a developing band. Our music comes quite naturally.

There's still a lot of unreleased stuff existing like the one from '93... what will happen with it? I think that those songs like "Horny goats", etc. are really cool...

Those unreleased recordings will stay unreleased. But we just might record some of those songs. Some will surely appear on albums if we still keep on releasing albums. Talking about "Horny Goats", 1 think this one will absolutely be re-recorded. Perhaps even for our second CD. We like those old songs and we will give them better versions and better chances to rape the world with its disgust. Fuck, yeah. On one paper sheet I read the name "Pornostar Kolgrim"

so does this mean that we can see your sexual activities on horny videos ?

You wish, huh?

Ha, not really... it depends on who's your sexual partner, aarrrgghhh !!! I know that you're very interested in traditional heavy metal music like DEAUD LOAD, etc... will you ever write a real heavy metal song for UNPUR€ one day?

I think we already do play real metal. But I wouldn't of course call it heavy metal. But we are highly influenced by it. So far we haven't any plans for doing a heavy metal song, but it could happen. The question is if it really would be released then... But it is highly possible that we could release some kind of heavy metal cover song. Just small plans at the

You're also a vinyl-lover, but your album is only sold on modern compact disc format. Doesn't that matter you? What about releasing your next stuff on vinyl?

Yes, we surely wanted to release the album on vinyl, but it is very hard to find a good deal and we decided to accept it anyway. It will give us great promotion and probably this can lead to a fair LP deal later. We have signed for two Cds at NAPALM. So far we will release at least one more CD for them and after that we have no idea what's going to happen. Perhaps it would be time to find a good LP deal then.

To end this interview please give me your imagination on how the general metal scene will develop until the year 2000?

'Homosexual Metal will be a big trend when we reach the year 2000. I've already seen it coming!"

We pretty much found our own style I think... You've probably already read something about

Empyrium in other zines, but anyway: Their successful demo "Der wie ein Blitz vom Himmel fiel...." (2 songs + intro/outro) contains slow, simple and atmospheric music which is based upon harmony instead of power. Why not? I think these two German guys did their job very well, even if the music is sometimes too dominated by the synth sounds (guitars are more in the background). But all in all it is music which will be liked by most of you readers in case you like to hear something that is way more atmospheric than Gehenna's MCD "First Spell". Apropos "First Spell": Empyrium's vocals are sounding like the ones on this MCD, so don't expect any

Like most of the other demobands also Empyrium got contacted by labels, and they finally decided to sign at PROPHECY Production. As this is a brandnew label I wondered how their contract is. Markus reveals this secret... Yes, we signed for one album (CD/ lim. vinyl) with PROPHECY Prod. The contract we got from Martin is fuckin' great and fair. The album will be released with the title "...like an embers-red wintersunset". PROPHECY Prod. also print T-Shirts of Empyrium at the moment, so everyone interested should drop a line.' Yes, I saw this Shirt, and I must admit that it looks nice (black shirt, golden logo...noble!). Talking about the album, I wanted to know from Markus if it brings us a change of style or if they continued to use those heavy synth effects.... Can he imagine his band writing atmospheric / hymnic music without the help of synths ??? ... There will be no radical style-changes in Empyrium



as for the keyboard, it's still used as massive as before (a thing you don't like that much, right ???) (Well, I prefer a healthy balance between real instruments and synthetic sounds - ed.) or even more... Some of the new songs are very calm and some are more METAL. To the second part of the question: I could imagine Empyrium without synths but only if you pay us an Orchestra, Costa...' there's some Greek blood in my veins, but I'm certainly not Onassis, ha ha !!! Let's come to another term that is used quite often in these days, I'm talking about "paganism". Also Empyrium deal with pagan thoughts, but I asked myself if it's possible for a German to be really "pagan"? I mean, there were so many

different tribes marching through the country that a real origin is hard to find... Markus answers...' It depends on what you mean with pagan. Of course it's absolutely ridiculous if somebody claims that he has pure Germanic blood in his veins. It's kind of impossible... On the other hand it's of course possible to be pagan nowadays if we talk about the ideology. Pagan/ Heathen means "free from God, one with nature" to

Well, at the end I just want to add that more than 500 copies have been sold of the demo, and it is still available (for 10 or 12 DM, I've forgotten the exact price). The recordings of the albums are finished and I guess that it'll be out pretty soon. For info

One of the most original but also most infamous labels must be NAZEGIL'S EXRIC PRODUCTIONS (N.C.P.) from Germany. While labels like ABSANTOROPD, MOONFOS, etc. received maximum attention within just a couple of months, N.C.P. still remained a small underground label up to this date. But Oppros, so the name of the chief behind this company, already released almost ten CDs until now, and all those CDs (except for probably Polish Behemoth) presented untypical and sometimes really strange music, in other words... all CDs have something what is missing at most labels' products: Originality! You can read about all the releases elsewhere in this issue, so I needn't describe and mention all the things that are out on N.C.P.! And due to this strange label concept I simply was forced to get in touch with Oppros for this issue's labelimterview. Of course the best thing to start this interview was to ask him about the past of N.C.P., how the idea came and how the concept looked like at the very beginning....



'The idea of starting a label is actually quite old. I always have had the wish to do something for the music I indulge in, yet never had the financial oppurtunities to do so. It became more real when I got in contact with Euronymous in early 1992. I still have great respect for him as we got to know each other quite well in the relatively short time I knew him. He was always comfaining about money problems and as I have a quite well-paying job since a couple of years now, I came up with the idea of putting money into DEATHLIKE SILENCE Productions. We all know how the D.S.P. story ended and thus I decided to carry on myself anyways. I came into contact with Dawnfall more or less in the same time and they had this "Dominance of Darkness" tape ready and were looking for someone to release it as as I liked it for its extremity I decided to release it on NAZGUL'S EYRIE PRODUCTIONS. The concept was (and still is) to release bands that are too extreme for any other label and who are at the same time something totally unique and have this kind of "ancient" approach; I guess you know what I mean? Well, yes, I think I got the point! But as all your releases don't present usual music, ...I mean, especially bands like BARATHRUM, COUNTESS, etc. have an extreme style which only attracts some die hard- fans but not the majority of listeners..., does it pay out releasing such kind of stuff? I can't imagine this music making you wealthier...

'Well, why should I thread a path that others have before me?' I really don't care too much about the majority of listeners. They don't have to buy my releases either. But I knew that from the start and I did it anyways. To be honest, I really like the idea that most people hate what I'm doing. I'm 28 years-old now and in my 'time I've seen a couple of trends come and wither away yet, always those releases which were something special are those which are sought after in later times. For example Bulldozer: Everbody is desperately seeking for their first two albums but back then, when they have been released they got ripped apart in every review I read, the same goes for Bathory or Hellhammer and a lot of other acts which are highly acclaimed nowadays. To say it straight, it doesn't matter what people say NOW, what I want to achieve is not to might money (although there's nothing wrong with that) but to leave a mark in time. Of course N.E.P. is more or less an expansive hobby. It does however pay back my expanses.'

What is coming next on your label? Any new bands you're willing to sign? 'My next releases are Barathrum's "Erie" CD and Countess "Ad Maiorem Sathanae Gloriam" CD which are both out since Samhain 1995 C.E., I guess there are already the reviews somewhere else in this mag?! (Of course, ha ha! ed.) After that I will release a CD by Amon Goeth from Czech Republic ("Call Thy Master") still in this year, followed by CDs of Bifrost ("Wildfire"), Mortuary Drape, Drowned, Cruachan, Dawnfall which should all be out in the first half of 1996 C.E. New bands? Hmm, I'm still listening to a lot of demos of course, but it's really hard to find something original in a time when (almost) everybody is trying to imitate norse acts. Which leads us to question

Yes, I wondered why you don't sign stuff that sounds like typical Norwegian Black Metal? Don't you like that stuff?

'This is actually one of my favourite topics to talk about... I don't think that these days there is such thing as a Black Metal band in Norway!!! I mean, most kids don't know but those who follow the scene for longer than the last two years do know about the roots (or better: the LACK of roots...) in the so-called norse scene. I consider it consulting that kids under 20 want to tell me about Real Black Metal. I was already collecting demos with that stuff when they were still soiling their pants....

"Popular style"? Isn't that a proof for my theory? (In these days of extreme commercialism, yes! -ed.) I extremely hate the idea of Black Metal being popular. It's a paradox to me. The idea behind black metal is to be the most extreme form of music thus is simply cannot be popular (I don't think you're right here, just remember how big Venom was and how many copies the Hellhammer MLP and the first Sodom MLP sold when it hit the shops, the critics laughed and called it the worst, but the fans loved it!But it wasn't a popular trend music! -ed.). Otherwise it's not REAL black metal. And so it is, just listen to all this stupid hardcoreriffs in Norwegian pseudo black metal. They all think they are sooo great but they just created another trend. It started because people were fed up with the Sunlight or Morrissound productions, didn't it? I wonder how long it will take until people realise that it's just the same to record in Unisound or Grieghallen.... Just the names have changed, yet they are still as stupid as always. I do like Mayhem and some of the Darkthrone stuff, but all the rest? Bah! Forget it... By the way, why didn't you ask Mr. Vikernes about his old (well, 1991 C.E.) band Old Funeral?! When will people understand that it takes more than facepaint to play REAL Black Metal?!!!!!!

The existance of NAZGUL'S EYRIE seems to be in "danger" according to some "death threats" which you got from the Austrian Circle of Hate... What's the reason for this, and what do you think about these "true black metal" people behind this circle?

'Well, I hardly think it as a "danger" to be honest. Why I got this masterpiece of German orthography, I have no clue, although I suspect it has to do with the Dawnfall CD. As you might know, Dawnfall are really hated by the German Black Metal Mafia or the Teutonic Brotherhood or whatever they're called right now (by the way, why do they use an English name when they are sooo German ???), because they said that Absurd are dilentantic idiots, after they committed this heroic deed in 1993 C.E.! As they are all "true" brothers they probably felt the need of adding something to it. But I don't really know and neither do I care. I can assure you they won't find me easy prey if they really have the guts to show up. Probably they even can't afford the train tickets anyways... About "true" (I prefer REAL...) people in general, I think there is only a very little number of those who really know what this music is all about. All the rest is childplay that will wither away within the next years so I guess it's useless to waste my energy on commenting their utter stupidities. Instead I will care for the few who deserve it.'

Although you are a big SLAUGHTER-fan you once said in one of your letters that the 80s weren't as strong as the 90s.... why this? Don't you think the most 80s bands simply played better music and that the whole thing (scene) was more honest and underground?

'Yeah, Slaughter I know since 1985 when their second demo blew me out of my boots first. Well, I never said that the 80s weren't as strong as the 90s, I said that I can detect a lot of similarities between both eras. What I mean is that (at least among those people I'm with) there's this certain mood of things moving. Now and then there were some bands who were truely original and went their way and also a lot of crap bands who barely knew how to hold a guitar properly (this was only an exception in the 80s, nearly every debutLP back then had a certain good instrumental level, but nowadays there are a lot of amateurish bands around that are releasing CDs!-ed.). Those who read fanzines since 1985 already know that there certainly were fights between underground bands (Slaughter vs Death for example) and there was a lot of shit-talking, so I don't think there was much honesty back then (but the bands and fans weren't as infected by images / pseudogrim attitudes as it is the case now, no such "true"

behaviours! -ed.). It certainly was LESS underground than today's scene (??? Metal was less accepted back in the 80s as it is now! People even laughed at Metallica who now are megastars! -ed.); It wasn't a problem to buy almost everything in normal record stores and nobody cared about it (and today you can almost buy everything in big supermarkets - ed.). Nowadays you're more "commercial" when your releases are in a bigger mailorder already... I certainly do agree to the idea that you have to know about the glorious past of our music (and I mean NOT just Bathory and Celtic Frost....) to be able to understand. But staying at SLAUGHTER: Why don't you try to get the rights to release their legendary "Surrender or Die" demo, the one you were talking about, on CD / LP format? Wouldn't this be a cool idea, especially as most new metallers don't know too much of the old stuff anymore?

'Well, it certainly would be nice to have it on CD and LP but apart from the fact that it would be really hard to get these rights (if the mastertape still exists anyways...), I don't think that too much of today's kids care (They simply have to care as they can find the original version of "Tales of the Macabre" on it, ha ha!-ed.). They just want this Norwegian pseudo music... and just to please myself? Well, I do have it on DAT... For those who really care, most of the tracks are on the CD of "Strappado" (yes, most of the tracks, but I want them all!-ed.), so it's up to them. It's certainly a pity that there are so many forgotten jewels, but for those who really care there are always ways, don't you agree!

Yes, of course, but holding it on LP format would be ultimate,...at least for me! You released two German CDs so far with DAWNFALL (R.I.P.) and THAR-NORR.... but will there be more German stuff? You seem to be the only label (beside MERCILESS Records) which is interested in German hardware... What do you think about the German scene?

'Well, first of all, Dawnfall are not R.I.P.; There will be a new CD during the first half of the coming year. Why there are no more German releases, I don't know, probably they are all to busy being "true" ??? I think the German scene has a lot of potential, it was proven in the 80s with bands like Iron Angel, Poison and others as you all know. Yet these days all originality seems to be lost as almost everybody tries to sound like their idols. There are very bew German bands however who try to be themselves and not the new Burzum or whatever and those are the ones I'm looking for. I've already talked successfully about eals with Drowned and Mayhemic Truth (arrgh, you really want to sign this horde of posers? -ed.) and I'm open to others as well as long as they are original. Further I think that most of the people in the German scene are just little punks who found themselves something new to shock their parents. That's probably the reason why there's so little originality as for just shocking it's enough to reproduce.'

Are you able to live from the work you invest in NAZGUL'S EYRIE?

'No, certainly not, but that's not what I'm going for anyways. Luckily I do have a good (means well-paid) job that pays for my daily life and allows me to run such an expansive hobby as N.E.P. Personally I'm very happy about this as I don't have to make any commercial compromises and can release whatever I want (That's probably the difference between you and other labels, your

independence of the sales !-ed.). If I only sell 100 copies of a certain CD, so be it. This is probably the most important thing about N.E.P. which makes it totally unique: I'm not responsible to anybody about sales or releases, I AM the label.

Sounds very cool, and such attitudes deserve a certain respect! But why no vinyl releases? Do you really think that vinyl doesn't sell anymore???

Hmm, I have thought about vinyl myself a lot of times, but I'm not sure about it to be honest. Certainly, it would be very nice to have my releases as a real record, but it would be as expensive as a CD in production and selling price (say 25 DM) and I don't see enough people willing to pay that. Another difficulty is the length of my releases, there are a couple of CDs which are close or even beyond an hour playing time and you cannot put that on a record. There will however be a series of limited Picture Disc LPs done by FOLTER Records in near future to satisfy all the vinyl junkies. I could imagine this to be selling, we'll see, but actually I prefer to put money in new releases instead of putting it out in every way possible. Also it's a lot easier for me to handle as I'm very busy with what I'm already doing. However, if someone's interested in licensing my releases in vinyl form, I'd be happy to hear from him. Perhaps we could come to an agreement. I actually have offered this to two labels who still do vinyl, but all I've got was delays and excuses, so I guess they're not interested and I will certainly not start begging...'

How are the contacts to your bands? Is it important for you what kind of guys are hiding behind the music?

'Yes, of course it's very important for me to know the people behind! Contacts are very important, I'm phoning about once a week with every band (which causes enormous phonebills), so I always know what's going on. I don't think I'd like this kind of business relationship that bigger labels have towards their bands. Before signing a band I usually travel to their place and meet them, thus I've been to the Netherlands quite a lot and also a lot of to other places. I will go to Portugal pretty soon to take a closer look onto Tanngrisnir's new band Ironsword (you know, he's got kicked out of Moonspell for refusing to agree that Ares' phonebills are being payed with bandmoney, don't you?) and I'm also thinking of some other possible travels. To know more about the internal N.E.P affairs, I just want to refer to the fact that I'm still friend with my bands even after a release. Not every label could say that much I think....

Really fair and honest treatment of the bands! Your personal wishes for 1996?

'Hmmm, that's a difficult one, I certainly wish that people would find some other way to shock their beloved families, probably without insulting my favourite form of art. Most of my other wishes are a more personal nature, so I won't bother you with it. I'd like to see bands like Angel Witch, Witchfynde, Cloven Hoof or Demon live as those were the first Black Metal bands, even before anybody ever talked about Venom, a fact that is sadly forgotten as well.... It will remain a dream.

FUNERARY CALL

Funerary Call are not a usual band. Their music is really weird black magical, with strange ritualistic sounds. It is based on infernal and obscure effects like sighing voices, slow drums, melancholical but also morbid keyboards and wicked vocals. Their second demo ("Damnation's Journey") features "six tracks of ritualistic hate...the blackest hymns of god's disgrace !" (to quote their flyer) and is a real interesting piece of dark music which is far beyond the trends. It's impossible to describe, you've got to hear this yourself, but be sure that you have to listen to it a couple of times until you get used to it! As this band doesn't play ordinary black metal music I guess that they've received very different reactions from the metal people, right? Impius Erga Deum, the guy who you can see on the picture, answers:' So far all reactions have been very positive. Most people have commented that they find the music to be very dark and very original. I have had only one person so far who has received one of my demos and complained that he did not like due to the fact that it was too "strange" for him. I guess he was disappointed that we didn't sound like Darkthrone or Emperor. Probably yes, as this is the music which sells best in these days... and exactly this has caused one question in my mind. Does Funerary Call play that weird stuff just to be "anti-trend" in the "trendy" black metal scene, or what has moved them to play that morbid ?! We play the style of music we do because we are trying to reate one of the most truely darkest and perverse forms of music ever! We are not specifically doing it to be "anti-trend"; this is the way our music turns out beacuse this is the way we envision our sound. Fuck people! Fuck trends! Fuck everything! I don't care about that shit!" So what about the term "Abruptum light" for Funerary Call's style ?...'No, I would not associate any term like that with Funerary Call at all. Is that supposed to be a joke !!' Ha, probably yes, but it is also a little bit honestly meant.... you can't deny that Abruptum are one of the ultimate weird and perverse black bands existing (even if I don't like them too much), and that this is this Canadian band's goal as well, isn't it? "Damnation's Journey" belongs to the more original demotapes, BUT it's not stuff for those who fear musical torture and like the easy way !!!

The sun slanted through my bedroom window, one sweet summer morning. Though not fully awake, I placed a CD into my deck, a CD that had appeared only moments earlier on my doorstep. Soon I was awoken, and bewitched, into alluring world of grandeur and gentility, a pure and mesmerising experience. It was a world borne from the soul of Kari Rueslatten, once a member of the well known Norwegian outfit, The 3rd and the Mortal.

Now she has beenfreed of the shackles of that band and gathered together her own harvest of rich melodies. It is a chance for her voice to command the music more than ever before. Simple arrangements let the vocals soar with the whispering wind, an air of innocence and romance prevails. It is a rare experience in this day and age. I would suggest that it is an experience that is hard to resist.

Though this CD is only filled with basic demo recordings of her songs, I believe people should be forewarned of the coming glory of her music. Therfore I had to find out more about what lies behind this lady's music, her motivations and inspirations, plus the unravelling of her recent past. It is here where I started, with a question that must have become tiresome for her by now. What were the reasons for leaving The 3rd and the Mortal and pursuing a personal project? What is a matter of feeling restricted within that band?

"I left The 3rd And The Mortal for personal reasons. It was a really tough ision to make. I felt that I was leaving my family. We had done so much together, een through so much. But, at that moment, at was the only right thing to do.

Ending up on my own, as I have never been before, because I have always been ing in bands of some kind, I found that I just could not quit music. So, I starts play instruments that I could comprehend, such as the piano and synthesiser, and so Istarted to think that maybe I really could do this, make music entirely on my own. After her departure from the band, there were some heavy rumours surrounding her reasons for leaving. There was a lot of slander and allegations in the Norwegain press, concerning Nazi sympathies and other such ridiculous suggestions. I wondered if Kari thought that had helped or hindered her in the long run.

I think, and surely hope, that in the long run what counts is if the music is good or not. I definitely would not say that all promotion is good promotion. The worst of it is that poeple actually seem to believe that what the journalits say is true. Only the one who in the first place spoke the words can say whether the journalist twisted them or not. In most cases they do, is what I have experienced. They turn things around, so that they can make it sound the way they want it to. I think they call it freedom of speech...

Now let us concentrate on the present, the CD of demo recordings. It is obvious that the material is heavily centered on her voice. The music has a different feel to The 3rd And The Mortal's material. Can Kari explain what she is trying to achieve with his material musically?

The music is definitely, as you say, much more based upon the vocal lines. I build the arrangements around the vocal lines. That comes very naturally, since I consider my voice as my main instrument. I am trying to create music that is warm, atmospheric, melancholic, but not depressive, and a bit up-beat

sometimes, too. I try to make music that is unique to myself, that comes from my heart and scul." There is a strong folk influence in the sound. Whereabouts did those infuences

come from, has folk music been a long time love?

Yes, folk music has been a part of me for as long as I can remember. Folk music is both fine and pure, it is created by people who cared for the beautiful nature that surrounded them. It was musically built up on tones people had in them, not tones that can be found on the piano. The melodies were not writte down, they were sung from one person to another, who each put some of their uniqueness into it before they gave it away. When I write music, I let myself be inspired deeply by those tones."

I saw from the CD inlay that Kari states that she is infuenced by Norwegian nature when she writes her material. Certainly the material has a tranquil setting that is similar. So, how does Norwegian nature affect her songwriting! I see that she also lives in the city of Trondheim, so does she often get out into the countryside to breathe that atmosphere?

Even though Frondheim, the town in which I live, is the third biggest town in Norway, it is an incredibly small town compared to other towns. So I live approximately 5 kilometres away from the inner city of Frondheim, and still 3 can take ten steps and I will be out in the wilderness! People moan about how I handle living so far up north, where it is a cold all the time. Well, I gu that explains it.

I very much gather both strength and inspiration from walking out in the woods. It's so quiet, patient and understanding. At the same time it is majestic and filled with mystiscism. Now isn't that most of what you need in life ? Well, you will find no arguments from this scribe! Mother nature's babes have strayed into their concrete wilderness and lost simplicity. But nature is not the only force that drives this music. I detect a heavy scent of romance in the lyrics and in the vocal delivery. Is that a reflection of her character, or is it simply to fit in with the style of music?

I would very much consider myself as a romantic person. I love the folk tales and stories about princesses in towers and castles, trolls and people who live underneath the earth, people of the night, and I must not forget the who who enchant the living with the charm and beauty, solely in the due... well, in the end, hill them. The thing in the felk tales very often is the reason for people's unhappiness and disgrace, the reason why they kill themselves a others, is love. Now isn't that romantic ?

Romantic, but tragic I would also say. But what about the main source of this romantic feel in the music, Kari's voice ? I wondered if she had had any proper training to attain that purity, or if it was just a natural gift? When did she first start to realise the potential of her voice, and how does she look after it and keep it in shape?

I have always leved singing, and used to sing in a girls cheir for many years. When I was twelve years old, I did vocals in my first band (He wed to do Scorpinas-songs). Two years later I attended the local school of immit for



more classical training of my voice. I have always been like "two sided", with rock bands on the one side, and more classical singing on the other.

A couple of years ago I finished my musical studies at the University of Trondheim. That was also the end of my regular voice training practising. It is nice to sing things of Mozart and Grieg, it is really a challegne. What I dislike is all the rules in classical music. You can not sing it totally the way you want to. New I mostly sing music I made myself, and it is completely up to me to sing it the way I want.

The promo CD is just a very rough example, done on a 4 track, of what can be produced in future. What we need now is an explanation of how the material will change when they full arrangements of backing instruments have been added.

"I will use more "real" instruments, such as grand piane, contrabass, flute, more acoustic instruments basically. I will also use a mixture between sampled drums and acoustic drums. I have a thousand ideas really. I just hope that some day I will get the opportunity to make them come true..."

I think that day will come soon, as quality can't be ignored. What is interesting is how the material will be handled. So far Kari's involvement with the music scene has been mainly concentrated inside the so called underground / extreme music scene (outside Norway anyhow) I guess though that that will be pretty restrictive and she will want to move and reach out to as many different genres as possible. Would that be correct?

'I think every artist's dream is to reach out to a wider audience and make a living out of their music. I guess the same goes for me. I kope the music I make now will appeal to a wider audience, but I still think that the people who liked what I did with The 3rd And The Mortal will not be disappointed either.'

Well, I certainly wasn't disappointed, and I am sure that the majority of people out there won't be either. Destroyer 666

The Clyer for "Six Songs With The Devil" looked pretty promising, so I sent my money (\$5) right to the band's address. When I heard the tape I was a bit disappointed, because I awaited thrash metal as they Clyer has said. But after listening to those six songs (without the devil of course) again, I detected that DESCROPER 666 play some cool and satisfying with thrash infected death metal. Questions came up and I wrote them again for more details about this strange band. Still I don't know who is responsible for these anwers, but I think it's not really necessary.... just read what they have to say!

You have drawn my attention with your flyer saying "thrash in the vein of ONSLAUGHT, DESTRUCTION, SARCOFAGO, etc.", but I think you are more death metal (SARCOFAGO meets BESTIAL WARLUST) with some thrash-influences here and there... Some old fans might be a bit disappointed after reading the flyer...

'The flyer stated Evil Death Metal unashamedly played in the "vein" of etc. etc. Unfortunatley today to be influenced usually means they've ripped the band off outright. The influences in **Destroyer 666** should be obvious, but still slight. If anyone wants those bands they should gonna listen to their old records or one of the numberous rip off bands circulating these days (**Destruction / Onslaught -rip** off bands in these days ?!? Are there any ??? -ed.). Personally for each band mentioned in the flyer I could point at a song of piece from hich a direct influence is obvious. As for the **Bestial Warlust** influences: I wrote most of the material for their first CD, so a comparison is unavoidable. But their new stuff "should" dispel any similarities.'

The new fashion in black /death metal is using Nazi symbols, and I've also noticed that you use the "svastika" in your demosleeve, why? If you aren't into Nazism, don't you think it's quite stupid to use these symbols as they might irretate some fans?

'The svasika holds meaning to me beyond the realms of the brainwashed masses. If fools got irritated, then it invariably means you're doing something right, doesn't it? (Fools, who probably like your music and think you're praising nazism might try to copy you, both your music and image,...so fools can cause trouble, everyone can be dangerous! And finally it doesn't matter if you get killed by a fool or intelligent person, is it? The result is the same anyway!-ed.) I can't find no use of the svastika throughout its long and varied history that displeases me enough to not use it. It also served another purpose, which was to make sure that any interested labels would not for "any" reason inflict cencorship on my art.' You're right, but when it comes to the german country, albums with svastikas on it won't see the light of day as it's simply prohibitted to use such kind of symbols here... Talking about another subject: You aren't into all those evil (northern) black metal bands as I could read from your letter, right? What's the reason for this?

'Not exactly, there's just too fucken many of these cunts. It gets tiring seeing skinny kids carrying swords and axes, they look completely unable to swing any detrimental effect. There's only so many times you can read of their "spi-fi" (spirital fiction) bullshit. If the soul of the whiteman really is black, then it means the wise of all centuries past are wrong, and these 18 year olds are right !!! The closest comparison I can find for these people is the hippy kids from 25 years ago, same bullshit, different colour. They said love, we say hate, they said peace, we say war, blah blah. They're perpetualing the same one sided lie christianity has pushed down our throats for the past 2000 years. Balance! Without it you will seek unnecessary enemies. And you will produce as many psycho fuck-ups as we have today.'

Pretty unusual statements ibdded, but it sounds very interesting. Do you think that the thrash infuence will increase in your new songwriting? Which kind of release will follow after "Six Songs for the Devil"?

'Destroyer 666 have an LP/CD release within the next month on MODERN INVASION Records. There is some more thrash-orientated songs plus my real songwriting style shines through on a track called "Burning the veil of Falsehood" and some others.'

That's another proof for today's phenomenon that new bands get their deals sooner as the fan can notice their

bandnames... Any final declariations of war from a former bestial warlustseeking maniac?

The Death Metal Winds howl again !!!! Gospel of the Horns, Spear of Longinus, Bestial Warlust. Buy Vinyl!

Deah, buy vinyl is a good sentence to end with. I don't know whether "Six Songs With the Devil" is still for sale or not as the band's debutalbum "Violence is the Prince of this World" is out now to shock the masses. I haven't heard it myself, but I believe that it will be a good death thrashing metal opus....

enslaved belong to one of the strongest forces from the land of flords, and i simply had to interview them on their support (!) tour for marduk (!!!). This interview isn't the newest anymore, but as enslaved haven't released anything new after "frost" i think it still is actual enough. ivar, the guitarist and main songwriter, was the viking i talked with....

what's the difference in your orinton because the horch and south european audience when it comes to their behaviour?

The middle and north European audience are nearly the same, they prefer to listen to the music. In Spain for example it was quite a shock for us as the fans were very insane, that's probably because of the hot blood, but they also listen very carefully to the music and seemed to know it well, they go crazier. It were extreme changes in people from country to country, so if we weren't prepared for this we would have got a shock. (...) I feel glad when people say that it's great that we sing in our own

language. Many bands don't dare to do it, because they think it sounds stupid... It's good for me, because I have a better mood of expression when using your own language, you can fully put your spirit into the music. About a cultural thing we had a shock tonight. Especially the German audience don't seem to know culture too well when we asked who the wargod is, they screamed out many stupid things. In Spain for example they all screamed it out... of course it was Wotan'

gou can't deny that you had your profits out of the new black metal wave... how do you see your badd among most of today's satabic hordes?

We are great friends with old bands like Darkthrone. Immortal. Satyricon and Emperor, because we have been influenced from the same music, but not from the same views. They're satanists, we're into the viking stuff. I'm not too heavily into the scene, but I like contacts just because of the musical tastes.

When we started nobody believed in us, because of the viking stuff since '92...and now it gets more popular, and that's great. Now were seeing the results of it! The first metal bands who came up with viking themes were stueds beavy load and certainly mandwar, but most of coday's metal heads make fun of those bands, even you made some fun of mandwar in slayer #10, although your song "fennes" is very influenced by mandwar's opener for their "tritumph of steel" lp, especially the drumphythm.

Yes, I know that! Manowar is definitely one of my favoured bands, but I'm afraid of getting too mad on things, which isn't that good. We make fun of almost all things generally, people make fun of us. We have hunour and if we take ourselves too serious we won't get anywhere. Manowar aren't reading SLAYER

magazine anyway.....
In the osmose info it was said that you don't deal with policy, but don't you think that a lifestyle iscelf can be a kind of policy?

We don't deal with policy in the sense of the word....of course not having a political view is also a political view. I'm also interested, but I haven't found my right policy yet...most ideologies are just some policy in different packages, having the same aims.



is chere angiching reside enslaved?

Two other projects...a metal band called **linvatar** (meaning the highest god in sumerian). It's in the same direction as **Esslaved**, but not so fast. We are going to release a demotape soon, hopefully to get a record deal. It has a different concept, it's more magical with role-play (dealing with troll stuff).

And I have another project which is a non-metal band, I haven't found a name for it yet. I don't think any metalhead would appreciate that. It's piano/keyboard stuff inspired by classical music, very moody and depressive. It has a melancholical touch, and a girl with a beautiful voice will do the vocals. If someone would be interested in

Rumours will always exists concerning some bands, because you are a public person and you are in the spotlight, therefore it's easy to make rumours. We have a lot of respect for our fans!!!

COULD GOOD LIVE FROM EDSLAVED?

I could live from Enslaved, the record sales, but I live from the social wellfare. At the band one guy is working, the others are studying. I have a strong urge to learn, although I know that I can get a good job but if Enslaved gets good

I fuck on good jobs! I'm studying English, German and French. I tried alot of stuff like maths, but it's better studying languages because you learn a lot of history. We CAD SAY CHAC EDSLAVED HAVE A KIDD OF CREDOSECCER ID DORWLAY FOR DEWER VIKING BATDOS [LIKE elinherjer, ulver, etc.] As you were che first one to bo it, so bo you feel proud or bo you think that clowing is a scupio think that clowing is a scupio thing to do?

It's really great as long as those bands don't jump on a trend. It's dangerous when they think it's something

new and have no idea what the meaning of this theme is when starting the band, then its only a big joke! New bands are really good, Einherjer sadly ceased to exist, and we hope to have great contacts in future. It makes all stronger...Enslaved can help talented bands, and they can help and bring Enslaved forth.

what about new material for the follow up for 'FROST'? tonight you played a new song called whing metal....

I have a lot of new material at home, but we'll see after the tour, after we've slept and got the alcohol out of our bodies. Then we go back to our rehearsalroom ...and play on

ten !!! This tiem we'll work a hit longer, not just jumping into the studio .We pollish the new stuff up before we are gong to the studio again, more worked-out material, we want to get better and better! Viking Metal' will be on the next album...

you praise the old viking spiric, But do you really think that it is still alive in scandinavia?

The viking spirit is still alive ...some flames are left, because it's heavily rooted in the northern way of thinking or even further the european way of thinking. The metal people are today's vikings, because you have to fight to get anywhere you want. Living a metalstyle isn't easy.

i Chink that signing to osmose opened you a lot of doors, like better promotion, tours, etc. does "FROST" sell better then your previously released stuff?

The sales changed very much. OSMOSE is the first label doing real promotion for us, they for example pay the whole tour. People may call us as comercial as much as they want to, but 50% of the OSMOSE rumours are just because of envy.


how old are the members of enslaved?

'I'm 18, the drummer is 21 and the vocalist is 22. A part of our biggest fans could be my father, it's great that we are a young band, we still have a lot of life in front of us to make everything better. In your youth you're more creative!'

That's for sure. I think you can experience many examples where bands had their best period during their early days (Hellhammer, Exodus, Kreator, Metallica, Venom, etc.).

Well, that was all I could get from the sympathetic guitarist as he had to take his well earned shower before Marduk were going to leave the stage again. If everything develops the way it should for Enslaved, then we can expect a fine new album in 1996. Viking Metal' (the song) at least sounded very promising. Lately I heard that their drummer got fired, but I hope that this won't stop the band's way to success.



BLAZEMTH - 'For Centuries Left Behind' (Abstract Emotions)

The info says that Blazemth is "Spain's finest Black Metal act" and "...in the Norwegian vein" (Norwegian Black Metal from Spain ? Sounds funny...), so these two 'selling points' had to be check first. Well. ABSTRACT EMOTIONS are right that Blazemth sound norwegian (a bit like old hymnic Immortal and a bit like Satyricon, filled with a lot of keyboards), but they're are (at least in my opinion) not Spain's finest Black Metal act (remember Primigenium). The point at Blazemth is that they just sound like a clown band without having any exciting moments...it's just a product of pure trend. I can imagine that a certain number of fans will like this 22 minutes lasting MCD, but those who look for more than just another atmospheric black metal copy should safe their money for other albums



(Napalm Records)

Don't get irritated by the albumtitle, this CD has nothing to do with the band's third demotape. Summoning have chosen their best songs from the first two demos (which are still very unknown) and added some new tracks to this album, and the result is pretty good. The CD differs quite a lot from the demorecordings due to a better production, now you can hear all the fine details better (except for the vocals which were better on the demos). It's nordic sounding black metal with great, wellworked out melodies and cool atmospheres (sounding a bit medieval). Also you can here some spoken parts by Pazuzu, although the original demoversions featured more vocals which were done by him (why are the new versions different?). To me Summoning is Austria's best black metal outfit, just try to concentrate and you will hear all the fine elements in "Lugburz" which is an album that can easily compete with most Scandinavian releases

SUMMONING "Minas Morgul" (Napalm)

You really can't say that most of the Austrian Black Metallers are lazy guys, just take Abigor and Summoning as "Minas Morgul" Summoning's second full-length album in just half a year, and the most astonishing thing is that the musical quality is always great. This oldest Austrian Black horde understands to compose memorable music with intelligent synths and guitarriffs which transmitt you into other dimensions. There's nothing to criticize at this wonderful release except for the drums which would have sounded better if they were real ones. Buy or die !

Ved Buens Ende "Written in Waters" (Misanthropy)

Although quite a lot of people praised this new Norwegian outfit, I am sure that their "Written in Waters" album won't make the band rich at all. Their strange experimental nordic metal stuff (with for metal untypical vocals) goes on my nerves, and I'm sure that this is not music for the majority of the headbanging masses. I like it when bands are original and good at their instruments, but it still has to be a pleasure when listening to their music. So I hope that this was MISANTHROPY's first and last disappointment.

MANDATORY SUICIDE / ABISMONEGRO (Heavy Metal Rock)

Although one of those two bands has chosen "Mandatory Suicide" as their bandname, they have absolutely nothing in common with Slayer. It's power metal with high vocals (à la Metallica / Satan (Heathen) and it's nice to listen to their five songs as this is something we seldomly hear in our "evil" times. Of cousre there are still things to improve, but fans of old school power metal should keep an eye on these guys, because potential is existing. Abismonegro are a touch harder, but their style sounds very strange. The reason for that seems to be obvious when you listen to their part of this SplitCD ... they've mixed too many different sounding styles into their six songs. Sometimes you hear bay area thrash parts, then Iron Maiden-like stuff, etc. etc.... Not my case at all (especially because of the vocalist). I'm quite convinced that most of you readers will not like this release too much, and it would be a waste of money if you buy this CD even if the first band sounds nice...



(Listenable Records)

This is the ultimate answer for those who think that true death metal the dark way is With heavy loaded cannons Luciferion strikes after the quite satanic intro...and without mercy they present us their definition of satanic death metal in a total killing sound. Of course most of you will at once notice that Luciferion are absolutely sounding like Morbid Angel and Deicide, some parts even seem to be stolen, but I don't care at all as this album totally blows me away. The only point to criticize is the coverversion of "Blasphemer" which could have been turned out a bit "deathlier" and meaner (where's the demonic laughter ?). But beside that I can fully recommend you this album ! BUY !!

Tha-Norr "Wolfenzeitalter!

(Nazgul's Eyrie Productions)

Although Tha-Norr seems to be just another corpsepaint wearing band, their black metal is a bit different from most of the other bands in that sector because of their primitive raw arrangements like simple drumrhythms and riffs. But generally seen it's just another simplestyled nordic sounding black horde (with high vocals and guitarsound), and you lose a bit of interest in this CD after a couple of songs, it's always in the same vein with little "AHA" effects. But on the other side I have to say that it's not very easy to convince with this kind of black metal in a time when hundreds of bands are playing a similar style, and I think it's no suprise when people get fed up with this stuff when they get too much of it.

HELSTAR "Multipes in Black" (Massacre)

It seems that this old american band will never surrender. This must be the fifth album now (if I'm right), and it's still U.S. power metal with a healthy amount of energy. Just the vocalist isn't too good, his high voice and his strong american accent I do not like too much. But it's cool to see Helstar still alive!

BARATHRUM "Hailstorm" (Nazgul's Eyrie Productions)

Demonos' Barathrum always belonged to those kind of bands who were different to the usual black hordes. "Hailstorm" is so fuckin' extreme, they play doomy black metal with two bassguitars and only one six strings axe (which you can only hear in the background). And Demonos' vocals sound as if they were recorded in a huge dungeon of torture, very extreme! sounds like being a fusion out of Holocausto (Beherit) and Kühne (Messiah), no usual black metal voice at all. Although there are some demosongs included on this CD they sound completely different in comparison to the original recordings. "Hailstorm" is an album for people who like untrendy music that sounds very dark and obscure, but it's not easy to get into it I must admit.



"A Pale Debilitating Autumn" (Imperator Music)

Who says that metal quality isn't available anymore in Germany should listen to this death metal raid. This CD's sound comes like an explosion (fuckin' well-produced), but Pavor's death metal is brutal and complex at the same time. That's probably the point where to criticize the band... by putting too much fine elements into the music the danger exists that you're going to destroy the whole creation. On the contrary it's cool to listen to some of the fine elements like the original style of the bassplayer, etc. ... They are all excellent musicians, and I really can say that "A Pale..." is a good release, but Pavor should try to compose songs which are easier to recognize.

FOUR WAYS TO MISERY

The four bands included are Caesarean Section, Nyctophobic, Winter of Discontent and Croinchurn. Brutality is guaranteed here, it's death / grind (and depressive deathdoom with Winter of D.) at its rawest, but very well played, so do not expect any dilentantish shit. Especially the first and the last mentioned bands are the best ones! Get this CD if you are looking for something explosive.



KRABATHOR "Lies" (Morbid Records)

It seems as if the big death metal crisis is over... just take the new Krabathor album which contains first class death metal in the vein of early Morbid Angel, straight and brutal, but more melodical than the angels. "Lies" is a convincing result, and if you are into real death metal, then you shouldn't miss this fine Czech quality band

W B Z X B &

'Burzum / Aske' (Misanthropy)

Originally released on Euronymous' DEATHLIKE SILENCE PRODUCTIONS you can finally get these great Burzum creations on one CD/DoLp re-released through MISANTHROPY Records. Back when "Burzum" was released I was completely astonished by this fuckin' primitive but original style, it was something totally different back then MISANTHROPY has sadly dropped the original version of "A lost forgotten sad spirit" (which has been re-recorded for the "Aske" 12'inch), but this makes the original "Aske" 12 (nen), but the many songs DSP-vinyls more worthier. Anyway, songs ""Black Spell of Destruction", "War", like "Black Spell of Destruction", etc. simply belong into every good black

In The Woods... 'Heart of the Ages'

If you look for music that is original, emotional. atmospheric, calm, heavy. hymnic, aggressive, pagan, old- and new fashioned, etc., then this is the perfect release for you. "HEart of the Ages" is an album which people from different scenes will enjoy as In the Woods ... don't fit into any categories (anymore). The only thing that reminds me at the band's successful demo "Isle of Men" are the faster parts (if we can say so) with the screamy kind of vocals, but generally it is a fact that In The Woods... are now more epical and hymnic than in the past. The sung vocals are a bit in the vein of American Tyrant (if anyone remembers), and sound quite individual in these days. Musicwise they are also different than most bands who carry some atmosphere and pagan feelings in their music. Well, what else should I say? I guess that most of you readers have already bought this album anyway, but those who still haven't shouldn't hesitate to check this superb Norwegian first class (non-black metal) creation.

LUSTFUL "The Almighty Facets" (Cogumelo)

What do you expect from a band which hails from Brazil and releases their stuff on COGUMELO Records? Yes, sheer fast exotic death devastation which still seems to prevail in Brazil, even if black metal is popular and influencing the Brazilian fans in these days. Lustful would be better if they wouldn't have too much tempo and riff changes in their music. But their deathly stuff is cool, especially the ultrafast parts which sound bloody brutal!

Belmex "Berserker" (Napalm)

Former Eminenz-guitarist "Zwerg" returns back to business with his debut CD. Screamy vocals, computerdrums, strange guitars....very unusual stuff. It sounds like black dark wave metal, and it is not always casy to listen to it and it soon gets boring, so at the end it's something only for a few ones among you.

BEYOND NORTH "The Dark is my Father" (Imperator Music)

By mixing some epic Bathory elements with Death Metal you get a result like on "The Dark is my Father". Although this one man project (done by Pavor's drummer) sounds professional, it's not too convincing on the long run, there are too many changes in tempo and style... sometimes it sounds totally majestic (with acoustic guitars, choirs, sung vocals) and sometimes just brutal with a usual screamed voice. This CD is simply packed with too many ideas, so with less of all it would have turned out better.

On Thorns I Lay

"Sounds of beautiful Experience" (Holy)

Usually we can always expect quality from a label like HOLY Records, but with this new band (formerly known as Phlebotomy) they 've finally released something that isn't too extraordinary. It's harmonic metal with keyboards, but due to untypical arrangements /changes at parts and an irrertating voice (spoken and growling) it sounds not well worked out yet, although the musicans are no dilentants at their instruments. Some parts are really good, other one in contrary are shit. Try again!

DIABOLOS RISING "Blood Vampirism and Sadism" (Kron H)

Weird as always! Industrial meets black metal techno!! Still not my kind of music.



(Adipocere Records)

While the entire underground celebrated bands like Graveland, Behemoth, etc (when it comes to Poland's scene), another band namely Christ Agony developed to a great and serious act. Being different from most other Polish black metal bands, this trio has not sworn themselves to northern black metal (although there are some slight influences). Christ Agony do their own thing on their debutCD, they try to reach power through slower rhythms which sometimes remind me a bit at Samael, therefore you can imagine that it's quite dark and serious stuff. Also they produce some moody atmospheres with cool acoustic guitars and spoken parts, which add the final touch of darkness into Christ Agony's music. Just the last track "Abasatha Pagan" does not fit too well to this album as it differs a lot from the other tracks being very Deicide alike. All in all a nice release which shows that Christ Agony have some kind of own identity which is important nowadays to survive among a countless number of competitors.

COUNTESS

"Ab Majorem Sathanae Sloriam" (Nazgul's Eyrie Productions)

It's a typical Countess album, simple but effective stuff, but "Ad Majorem..." isn't as raw as "The Return of the Horned one" was. Anyway, Orlok once again managed to record some original Black Metal music which is more hymnic and slower now, and based on just a couple of simple melodies. Those who liked his previous released stuff will also get their pleasure with this new one, but those who aren't familiar with Countess yet should not expect another Darkthrone copy!!!

ZYKLON B "Blood Must be Shed" (Malicious)

These Norwegian guys do not only mix raw Norwegian black metal with **Deicide** sounds, no, they even release this MLP with a playing time that is also "in the vein of **Deicide**". It's not bad music (it's pretty aggressive), but it's quite stupid to release a MCD / MLP with only about 11 minutes of music, isn't it?



"The Sun of Tiphareth"
(Osmose)

Although "True Northern Black Metal" was meant to be from originally Scandinavia, there are hundreds of nonscandinavian bands also playing that sort of music nowadays, even exotical bands started to play in that direction. But luckily it isn't the same with American blackmetalls from Absu, as they have some old non-scandinavian influences in their music. I'm talking about thrash here, because some of Absu's new songs sound like being inspired by old Destruction and old Slayer. This makes "The Sun of Tiphareth" a great album indeed. Check out the vinyl version as it is packed in a great gatefold cover with cool artwork!

HAEMORRHAGE 'Emetic Cult' (Morbid Records)

Take a look at the album title and you'll know what Haemorrhage are about. Gory deathgrind (including slow parts as well) with very distorted (pukelike) vocals which are supported by high old Napalm Deathlike screams. It's not bad, but it's not the kind of music which will make MORBID Records wealthier. This music doesn't have a real spirit in my opinion, therefore it's hard for me to review it.

DEMONIAC - Prepare for War (Evil Omen Records)

Evil stuff from sunny New Zealand here with Demoniac! After a cool heroic intro (the same one as on Saxon's "Crusader" LP) the band's feast of "hellish metal" (as they call it) begins. Of course it is black metal, but Demoniac's style is quite original, for example you'll hear a King Diamond-like voice beside the usual screamy one in the opening track. There are also slow and fast tracks included, sometimes a keyboard is added to the music, acoustic guitarparts can be heard as well, etc,. so variety isn't a strange word for this band. Of course there are things that could have been better, but this is just a debutalbum...and all in all we can say that it's a good release. Besides a coverversion of Bathory's legendary "The Return of Darkness and Evil" there's even a New Zealandish folklore song which sounds very cool (remnds me a bit at Irish folk music). The playing time of hour (some bands like Deicide make two albums out of that) guarantee that you get something for your money.

BETRETRE / WIAD TENES (SplitCD by Embassy Productions)

Two of the "truest" French black metal forces assembled to make this splitCD possible. The first one, Belketre, is extreme distorted black metal with dirty vocals (a bit like Graveland, just higher)... it all sounds pretty raw and wicked. It's absolutely not original, but a must for every extreme black metal lover. Vlad Tepes are not as extreme as Belketre, but their style sounds pretty raw, too. Some of their cool rehearsaldemo songs were rerecorded for this splitCD, ancient styled stuff will find their pleasure. Both bands managed to record eight (why not seven ???) blasphemous hymns, which haven't got a perfect sound. But this CD is for die-hard black metallers made only anyway, so who cares?

DEATH OR GLORY - Vol. 1 (Heavy Metal Rock)

Triple Brazilian death attack... the first band, Abscess, is nothing but aggressive death. Five songs of old news, but it's good stuff. Psychoneurosis, the second outfit seem to be attracted by the gory side of death metal, but it's not primitive stuff what they play. The vocals are even screamy at parts (almost black metallike)... again old news, but cool! The last band is Extorsion, brutal, straight ahead death metal with vocals in the vein of Order From Chaos (not so rough though). These three bands deserve one common word for their music, and that is "brutal". You will decide if those bands receive death or glory. Death metal cultivators get 50 minutes (14 songs) of their favoured metal style.

SCUM NOISE "Chaotic Distree" (Heavy Metal Rock)

Fast, mean and old fashioned punk / hardcore with weak vocals. It's not the kind of hardcore with which our proud ears get disturbed in these days, that's probably because Noise Scum are from Brazil and not another stupid U.S. band, but it's still nothing that fits into this mag.

DIMMU BORGIR "For all tid" (No Colours)

When you judge the heaviness of a band by the amount of spikes, nails, etc. a musician is wearing, then Dimmu Borgir must definetely be one of the most extreme forces in metal business. But that's not the case, they're even softer as I thought! Their melodical Norwegian black metal sounds not dangerous at all, it is more hymnic music, especially when the synth appears and the vocals are sung (in a viking way, but it sounds a bit "wanna be'slike). Anyway, I can't deny that this is a nice album, but I don't know if you should support a stupid nazi label like NO COLOURS.



(Hammerheart Records)

A lot of people praised "Heirs of the Northstar", but I have my problems to share the same opinion with them. It's certainly not a bad product, but it isn't a great one either. Typical melodical northern black with nice ideas, but the vocals sound silly.... and sometimes I can't get rid of the feeling that I've heard some of the rifts already in other bands' music. The atmospheric (with synth loaded) parts are the only parts where Darkwoods My Betrothed (Ex-Virgin's Cunt) are really strong at, but the whole CD can be considered as average.

VOMITURITION - A Leftover (Invasion Records)

You shouldn't get deceived by the dark 'n' mystical frontcover (a Mortuary Drape kind of monk reading an old book). Vomiturition don't play black metal. The first two songs represent fast'n' dark death metal the brutal way, but then the album starts getting groovy elements in the necentombed vein which I totally hate. On the one hand the band's absolutely great when they play their raging death stuff, but on the other hand I feel totally sick of that groovy shit. And this makes "A Leftover" just an average compact disc.

GEHENNA 'First Spell' (Head Not Found)

Instead of playing grim black metal Gehenna have chosen to play their black art in a majestic way. Due to the massive organ sounds in their songs we can say that "First Spell" (MCD) differs quite a lot from most of the other Norwegian releases, and is therefore absolutely recommendable for everyone who likes proud atmospheres.



(Malicious)

The fact that Fenriz of the once so mighty Darkthrone plays bassguitar on "Kronet til Konge" will probably guarantee a definite number of album sales. But Dodheimsgard isn't a new cult band, it's just one hour of dirty standard black metal with harsh but not high vocals. Some drumrhythms sound interesting and the aggressive way of playing from start to finnish give the album a special touch. However, it's just one of many new black metal releases...

Musanthrope

"1666...Carnival Bizzare" (Holy)

What a positive suprise! I would lie if I say that this French outfit belonged to my favoured bands, but this new CD is way better than the previously released one, even if the band's style is still very complex. "1666..." is much better, memorable, intelligent and well-worked out with a lot of good ideas, and is filled atmospheres with both and energy...Misanthrope have finally created something that is not only interesting for friends of epic avantgarde metal. I'm sure that even after a couple of listening you will still find some undetected details here and there, and this makes the album worth the money if you ask me.

EXOCET "Confusion" (Massacre)

Death /Thrash, filled with both interesting and boring parts, nothing special but at least brutal and well-played.

ENTHRONED (Evil Omen)

Ordinary northern black metal (from Belgium) like we have already heard it many times before now. This album would be much better if they didn't use too much of those boring fast parts, because the slower rhthyms sound powerful and convincing. The music itself is inspired by the first Immortal LP, but of course Enthroned can't reach the class of the original. I think there are better albums to invest your money in.



"Diabolosis"

(Head Not found)

U.S. metal gets better and better with bands like Usurper. Those guys are addicted to old Celtic Frost and mix this influence with modern black / death elements... old fashioned riffs (and T.G. Warrior inspired vocals) meet modern drumtechnologies and studioproduction! The music is always very heavy and powerful, and "Diabolosis" is musically way better and professional than the "Visions From the Gods" demo, which was great as well. Usurper managed to capture the old feeling without losing some typical 90s sounds... and this makes this band original. This is definitely one of the heavier and more spectacular albums in 1995, so buy it now!!!

MONUMENTUM "In Absentia Christi" (Misanthropy Records)

"In Absentia Christi" has been announced for several years now, an I really doubted that those Italian lazyguys will ever manage to record it. But here it is, the long awaited opus of Monumentum, originally scheduled to be released on Euryonmous' D.S.P., and the long time of waiting finally pays out. Although Monumentum are less metallic than they used to be we can say that "In Absentia Christi" is a very strong festival of gloomy, by metal influenced dark atmospheric goth. Beside a coverversion of "Fade to Grey" (a famous pophit of the 80s, you will recognize it) there is a new vesion of the demo/7'inch classic "Nephtali" included, and especially shows new version Monumentum have changed their sound during their 7 years of absence, almost every detail changed ! No old Celtic Frost influences can be heard anymore, only the Christian Death influence remained, and a bit of old The Third and The Mortal hides in Monumentum when the acoustic guitars appear. It's an impressive album, but it's not an album where to bang your head to.



"Subterranean" (Wrong Again)

Still very guitarorientated but with even more melodies In Flames return with a MCD. But how the hell should I find the right words to decribe this? Probably the term intense melodic / harmonic thrash / heavy metal, which is mixed with classical and modern elements, would fit! The guitarwork is awesome, and it reminds me a bit at old heroes like Judas Priest anf Iron Maiden. If the band changes their screamy vocals into good melodical ones, then they would be a new hope for all traditional heavy metal fans. Great release anyway!

NIGHTFALL -Athenian Echoes (Holy Records)

All the Nightfall releases in the past were good, but this new album is fantastic. It's a perfect example for the musical death metal quality that still is unexperienced in Greece. You get everything what your metallic soul needs, ... death metal from fast to slow, atmospheric / hymnic to aggressive, but always with great guitariffs and melodies. It's really a pleasure to listen to HOLY Records most expensive album! What else should I write in order to convince you? If "Athenian Echoes" would be available on vinyl, then I would say "Buy or die!"

NECROMANTIA "Scarlet Evil, Witching Black" (Osmose)

Nothing much has changed Necromantia, it is still in the same vein with the same sound. The only big is that they difference aren't experimental as before (although it's still original music), it's more typical Greekstyled now. Those who didn't like this band too much in the past will probably be suprised by this new from vampirism inspired opus. Good album with great synthwork, but the clichee-coverartwork is really horrible



(Holy Records)

Let's hope that Sceptic Flesh will get more attention with this new album than they used to get in the past. They're more emotional now, but it's still proud death metal with a voice that sounds even more Suffocation-like than in the past. It's a brilliant album with great riffs / atmospheres and arrangements, and it's a a piece of "dark romantical" music you shouldn't ignore. Fine !!!

FLEURETY "Min Tid Skal Komme" (Misanthropy Records)

Those who remember my first issue have probably noticed that I was completely overwhelmed by Fleurety's demo "Black Snow" and their 7'inch as this band had the most sharp vocals a human being can imagine. So I was of course looking forward to hearing "Min Tid Skal forward to hearing "Min Tid Skal Komme".... Although They are much better at their instruments than in the past and the whole music is better arranged, more variable and well-thought, but "originality" has decreased, especially as the vocals aren't incrediby high anymore and are usual black metal-like now. Some people think that this is better, but it's a question of taste. The music itself is more professional than it used to be, there are a lot fine details and riffs to experience, and even a beautiful female voice can be heard The musical spectrum is very wide now at Fleurety (acoustic parts, cool bassparts, slow, fast, etc ...). A good release, but the things that I once so adored at Fleurety are gone, so I'm just satisfied, but not happy with this album.




"Voice of Harmony" (Wrong Again Records)

A new melodical Swedish sound has been developed during the last couple of years, and a lot of new bands have adopted this style which bands like In Flames, Dissection, Miscreant, etc. are playing. This means: Mostly fast melodic and well-played from thrash inspired metal with death / thrash vocals. And if you like this style you won't be disappointed with Excretion. The only thing that is different is the speed, because "Voice of Harmony" play their stuff quite fast (especially because of the drums) and this makes the album more furious. You can get this CD for 25 DM at the VOICES FROM THE DARKSIDE address!

PROVOCATION "Blind Patriot" (Positive)

Grind /death with the difference that the vocals aren't so deep. Some rhythms remind me at Carcass (not bad), but generally seen it's just another ordinary album without any real highlights.



nothing more to say than masterpiece for this debutCD. Dark doom (not death doom) isn't of course music for everyone, but what these three Swedish metalheads present on "One With Darkness" is at least for me fantastic. The danger always exists that doom metal soon gets boring, but this is not the case at Tristitia. It's dark but melodical doom, the whole music is very moody, filled with a lot of cool elements (like choirs, synths, acoustic guitars, etc.) and the most original thing must be the vocals which sound quite theatralic but very good. If you know Pagan Rites' "Hail Victory" 7'inch, then you know what will expect you as Thomas sings for this band, too. Give them a chance, and be sure that this album sounds like no other one.

CRUACHAN "Tuatha Na Gael" (Nazgul's Eyric Productions)

Good stuff! Cruachan are the kind of band who sound completely pagan Irish folk but in a metallic disguise. On almost one hour you'll get original music which is filled with tones from mandolines, bouzoukis, flutes, uilleaun pipes, etc., and especially this adds a special old feeling to this with screams filled pagan metal. Perhaps this CD gets a little bit boring after a while, but for a debut album it's very strong and it has an individual-touch.



"Nachthymnen" (Napalm)

This is the third Abigor CD in within just one year. But as long as the music good we shouldn't care.... It's again (of course) nordic styled black metal, but this time they haven't got as many fast parts as before, and especially this makes "Nachthymnen" the best Abigor release so far. They are very strong when the play their mid tempo parts, it has more atmosphere and feeling, and is a sign for the band's quality. Another great thing is the CD cover which looks just phenomenal. Finally a great Black Metal release!

MÜTHLATION "Vampires of Black Imperial Blood" (Drakkar Productions)

The headquarter of the Black Legions has arrived on the CD market... Mütiilation is one of France's most extreme forces, both in image and music, and you will experience this when the sounds of "Vampires of..." creep into your deaf ears. Pure ugly Black Metal with an dirty sound and untypical guitarriffs, all is a bit in the vein of Graveland / Vlad Tepes... The vocals sound very dirty, sometimes like Graveland (once again), sometimes like Mayhem ("Dead", especially at the second song when it comes to the vocalrhythm, which reminds me at the one from "Funeral Fog"). What else should I say? Die-hard Black metallers can raise a cup of blood to salute another unholy album.

BEDEMOTH

From the Pagan Vastlands (Nazgul's Eyrie Productions)

Originally released as the second demo (through PAGAN Records) these recordings are also available on CD now. It's black metal in the vein of old Immortal, just with the fine difference that Behemoth also use synths here and there. Best song must be the new version of "Summoning of the ancient ones" (original version is on their first demo), and of course I have to mention the cool coverversion of Mayhem's "Deathcrush" which closes this 35 minutes lasting CD. The musical quality is too good just to be released on tape, but in comparison with other northern sounding black metal CDs/LPs it's standard stuff.

BEDEMOTH

"Sventenvith (Storming Near the Baltic)" (Pagan Records)

Staying at Behemoth they once again attack with a new release. But for the first time they've created something more original, not being just a clown band of certain Norwegian bands. "Sventenvith" presents not only black metal, but also some folk/ pagan influences (played with acoustic guitars) which sound excellent and add a special feeling to the whole result. Musically and also instrumentally the band has improved a lot, so you wouldn't be wrong to say that Behemoth is probably Poland's strongest black force. Other cool things at this CD is the playing time (45 minutes) and the original artwork of the booklet (made by French DARKARTS)... This is something worth the money.

GUT "Ordour of Torture" (R.S. Records)

Sickos have another good reason to party. Gut have returned with their gory grindy death metal. Deep simple guitars, puke-like voice, etc... Although it's not bad I was pretty happy when the playing time (45 gory minutes) was over. This CD comes with parental advisory for both artwork and lyrics.

DEAD INFECTION "A chapter of accidents" (Morbid Records)

Those you think that Gut are not fast or brutal enough, well, then fasten your seatbelts and blow you brain away with Dead Infection. It's ultrafast almost through the whole CD... and it's sometimes really astonishing to hear a drummer playing so extremely speedy without sounding chaotic. Like Gut, parental advisory for explicit artwork and lyrics.



(Fullmoon Productions)

Black Metal from Sweden... but wait! This is not in the old Bathory vein, no, it's melodical stuff straight to the point which we are used from so many new Swedish bands now. But especially Algaion's simplicity is the band's strength, playing music you simply get used to. This kind of black metal doesn't sound "evil" at all if you ask me, but that doesn't matter much. This album is not bad, but also not a new jewel. If you see it at your local record (or should I say CD store?), then you should try to listen to it.

HELHEIM / NATTVINDENS GRAT (Promotracks for CDs)

Two bands from Norway to be released on German SOLISTITIUM Records. Helheim (not to be compared with the ridiculous nazi horde with the same name) is fast black with high distorted guitars and extremely high vocals.... quite typical Norwegian. The CD is going to be entitled "Jormundgard" and presents music which we are used since black metal became famous. Nattvindens Grat are much calmer than Helheim, and they've not dedicated themsleves to black metal. It's more emotional stuff with pianosounds, leadguitars and sung vocals (à la new Beyond Dawn and Tristitia) which sound quite clichee. Female voices can also be heard, but the whole music doesn't sound very well-developed... it sounds as if Nattvindens Grat wanted to do more than they are really able to, but of course I must admit that playing such kind of music is more difficult than playing the ordinary black metal stuff. Their CD is going to be called "A bard Tale"... but I don't know when it will be out (same goes out for Helheim's release)



VINTERSEMESTRE "Jääver isaatana" (M.M.I.)


Scandinavian stuff once again! It's of course Black Metal, but it's more melodical stuff with a lot of keyboardwork. Although it's good music, the listener gets a bit tired after a couple of songs, because the tempo (very fast) is nearly the same from start to finnish, plus the vocalist sounds a bit boring. But if you are into symphonic music you should try this MCD (19

OBTAINED ENSLAVEMENT "Century of Sorrow"

Although it's again a Norse Black Metal band there's a bit of originality in Obtained Enslavement as their music is mostly fast, aggressive, but still with good melodies, and is not as much from old Bathory-inspired in comparison with most of the other Norwegian bands. All in all: It's powerful! And the high vocals are sounding as if they are coming from the abyss. Let's hope that their new album "WitchCraft" will be as good or even better than "Century of Sorrow".

KOROVA - A Kiss in the Charnel Fields (Napalm Records)

Wow, a very complex and professional CD by this new Austrian band, especially when you think that this is just the debutrelease. "Barok Black Metal" is the term which is used for Korova, and their music is really different from other bands' styles. The vocals are variating during the whole album (sometimes screamy, sung, aggressive, melancholic, theatralic). screamy, sung, Technical and simple, slow and fast parts can be heard as well as violines and keyboard elements, so you see Korova's musical spectrum is very wide, I must admit. But although the album is made very professional I wouldn't fight in order to listen to it again....it's simply makes me nervous. But the band's variety / originality is probably their advantage in order to survive in this huge metal scene. Korova is certainly not everyone's cup of tea, but for some they might be a gift from heaven (or is it hell?).



(Primitive Art Records)

The CD cover shows a drunk metalhead lying beside his own puke, and in the innersleeve you can see four musicians in insane (funny) poses. So you see, Swedish Gehennah are a bit "different" than most of the other bands ... and their aim seems to be obvious: They try to revive the wildness of the 80s, try to capture the old black / thrash metal feeling that seems to be lost in the 90s. And the musical result points in that direction, influences from Destruction, Venom, etc. can be heard, but there's still a big difference between Gehennah and the true old feeling... I think they want to sound more 80's-like than their favoured bands, and I think that "Hardrocker" has more punk riffs in the songs than real thrash /old black metal riffs if you know what I mean. Perhaps my negative words seem to sound devastating for Gehennah, but "Hardrocker", which contains 14 songs and a 12-pages strong booklet, isn't worse if you might have thought. But the music isn't as close to Venom, Destruction, Sodom, etc. as the label info says....

BARATHRUM "Eyrie" (Nazgul's Eyrie Productions)

Yes, that's it! With albums like "Eyrie" the boundaries of Black metal are still have already undefined. Barathrum shown on their debutCD that they're not another Scandinavian sounding black metal band, and on "Eyrie" they continue their way just with the difference that they're not sounding as tortured and extreme as before. But this is a positive development, this new CD sounds still very original and wicked, it's a bombastic manifest of jetblack metal power in support of two bassguitars. 70 minutes is a damn long playing time, so give yourself a kick in your ass and at least try to get into Barathrum's music which blows the music of most of the other Scandinavian bands away when it comes to intensity. Bands like this one are important to keep our scene interesting !!!



"Spider's Lullaby" (Massacre Records)

What else but first class heavy metal do you expect from an old metal warrior like King Diamond? He's one of the rare creatures who always knows to write excellent albums, I really haven't heard anything weak from the King yet. "Spider's Lullaby" is therefore another great album with great songs and lyrics. And the best thing is that Mercyful Fate and King Diamond are still two different sounding bands although the King writes songs for both of them. You must be a fool if you miss this new album (it is also available on Picture disc which looks fantastic).

AT THE GATES - Slaughter of the Soul (Earache)

For some people this is a cult band, but I never found my way to any of this band's albums, so I'm probably not the right person to review this one here when it comes to comparisons to the band's old stuff. Anyway, "Slaughter of the Soul" is a very strong release of straight forward Swedish Death / Thrash with screamy vocals. It all gets very easily into my ears and it great listening to all the fine and powerful guitarriffs. With Grotesque, the pre- At the Gates band, this album hasn't anything to do at all. Those of you who've probably fallen too deep into the abyss of black metal should clear up their mind with this album, quality is guaranteed!



NAGLFAR "Vittra" (Wrong Again Records)

"Vittra" is generally seen in the same vein as Excretion, but Nagifar have more variation in their music, and they have some black metal-like sounds here and there (also because of the higher vocals). It's a strong CD and shows that there's a lot of potential hiding in this band whi also have adopted this new Swedish sound. Naglfar are still more outragous and less thrashy in comparison to Dissection, and if you think that "Vittra" is just the band's debutCD, than we should suppose that Nagifar can grow to something mighty.

UNGOD - Advance for MCD

A new (M)CD of German Ungod, and as announced they've put some old thrash influences into their music. But their style is still dominated by black metal, although this MCD hasn't much to do with the band's debut album anymore. What I like at Ungod are the fast and simple but effective black/thrash riffs, which cause cool headbanging situations. If Ungod would even be more "thrashy" and less black metal (especially the vocals), then they would have a certain advantage towards other hordes in this huge metal scene. I hope that you, Schiekron, are reading this and will follow my advice !!!

UNDER BLACK CLOUDS "Dawn" (Green Tree)

Intelligent fresh hardware which seems to be influenced by the (old and new) Swedish kind of death metal. But Under Black Clouds, a German outfit, are not a Rip Off band if anybody thought so, they have indeed their own face. Their rhythms vary on the whole CD and so do the riffs, but it all doesn't luckily sound chaotic. The vocals sound a bit like those of Hypocrisy and fit to this quite atmospheric but still powerful music. It's not the ultimate release, but for a debutCD this is very strong.

LET ME DREAM "My Dear Succubus" (Adipocere)

Emotional death from Finland with several cool riffs and ideas, but on the other side with silly vocals (when they are sung) and too ordinary songs in the long run. It's finally a CD with both good and bad sides. so it's not something you have to kill anybody for in order to get it.

SOULGRIND: Ladit A.D. 1999... (M.M.L)

Better than the previous released "La Matanza" but still very hard to take is this new album from Finland's one man invasion Soulgrind. It's still nerve wracking stuff (although it's more controlled now) as there are numberous different styles packed into 70 (1) minute reaching from heavy doom to industrial from classic to black metal, from nice acoustic parts to sheerest chaotic explosions. And that's exactly my problem with this CD, this music demands to much attention and concentration from the listener and is therefore hard recommend.

MORDETH "Lux In Tenebris" (Heavy Metal Rock)

It is no secret that just being a good musician doesn't mean that the music itself is good, too. Mordeth are the kind of band who know how to play, but their (at parts) complicated death / thrash doesn't always make it easy for me to find some pleasure in their music. This really gets concious when listening to the five bonus tracks (which are taken from the band's "Dimensions of Death" 7 inch back in '92). Back then they sounded like Sarcofago at "INRI" times, you know, simple and fast music without any compromises, and it very well. This musical contradiction on this CD makes it probably interesting, but if I were you I would only look for the 7'inch (in case it is still available, I don't know). "Lux In Tenebris" is also available on vinyl, but without those bonus tracks.

Ancient Rites

" Blasfemia Eternal" (Mascot Music)

New label, new album, new perspectives! And I can say that this is the best stuff these three Belgian metallers have done so far! By mixing death black and even old thrash elements, "Blasfemia Eternal" turned out to be an interesting album with many different faces (and a great coverartwork I must say). But it's mostly powerful stuff (thanks to the drums... is "Witchhunter" playing on some parts ???) with cool guitarriffs and different vocalstyles. And although Ancient Rites' music is more based on energy, the songs sound a bit more atmospheric than in the past. I hope that Ancient Rites will get what they deserve (and that means not being treated like shit by wimpbands like Cradle of Filth on their tour!) and I think they are a good alternative for black / death metallers who are a bit tired of all the Norse stuff.

CATHEDRAL "The Carnival Bizarre" (Earache)

There's nothing wrong with copying the old Black Sabbath and Trouble style, but Catherdral's copy sounds a bit too wimpy. There are too many positive / party-like feelings in "The Carnival Bizarre", especially due to Lee Dorian's vocalstyle, and real "Doom" metal hasn't anything to do with fun, has it? The musicitself is ok, it is very powerful at parts and lasts for almost one hour, but Lee sounds like Hetfield meets Ozzy meets any kind of L.A. poser... "Forest of Equilirium" remains the only real enjoyable Cathedralalbum, and if the band would be clever, than they'd look for a new vocalist now.

DISGRACE "Superhuman Dome" (Morbid)

It's definitely a disgrace to see one of the most brutal and goriest death metal band wimping out that much. Disgrace now play a sort of groovy Rock / Hardcore which sounds wild 'n' powerful, I must admit, but if you into "metal", then you won't love this album. By the way, can we take such a band for serious ???

ALASTIS "...And Death Smiled !" (Adipocere)

Still slow, but with more power in their music Alastis, one of the elder bands from Switzerland, have returned from the unknown. "...And Death Smiled" is quite different than "The Just Law", the band's debutalbum, they're more hymnic and enjoyable now, and the Samael-spirit isn't as strong as it used to be, but this time I think it's Tiamat who seem to have influenced Alastis. Creeping power is what makes "And Death Smiled" an impressive and heavy album, although I expected more originality from a band like Alastis. It won't be a mistake to check this well-produced CD, trust me!

BHRZUM "Filosofem"


Grishnackh's final strike for Burzum! "Filosofem" is the strangest of all his five releases, it's mostly slow stuff with electrified vocals (sounds a bit industriallike), but you hear that this is the following album for "Hvis Lyset Tar Oss"as there are many parallels to detect like for example a calm (and far too long) song in the vein of "Leere", just a lot more boring and unspectacular. Although "Filosofem" seems to be the weakest Burzum album, there are again some real killer-guitarriffs to detect which only could be composed by Grishnackh. I guess that most of you will buy this album anyway. won't you ???

Athenaton "Divine Symphonies" (Advancetape from Adipocere)

When the musical class of symphonic Emperor, moody / mighty sounding movie-soundtracks (like Dracula or old cult western movies) and last (and least) Fields of the Nephilim collided, "Divine Symphonies" was born. Excellent!

MANGLED TORSOS 'Godless' (Morbid Records)

Mangled Torsos play mostly slow death metal the simple way, sometimes very intense, melodical or groovy but sometimes also boring! There are both good and uninteresting songs included on "Godless", so I really can't say that this album is a strong release. I can say for example that the drums are great, but in contrary the voice sucks, it sounds a bit like the one of Atrocity ("Blut" LP). This is not a release most of you will miss.



(Glastnost)

"The Feathered Snake" is a good alternative for those metallers, who are looking for calm and non-metallic music which is still played on real instruments (no synth and computerdrum-shit). It's a mixture out of The Cult (rock elements, vocal-arrangements) and typical Gothic rock guitars with cool use of drums, delays, riffs, etc. Although I'm 100% into metal I must admit that Into the Abyss are a cool band worth to be checked out by you. A nice suprise!

HAGGARD " Have you seen ... "

This is first quality progressive and technical but still controlled death metal. Ican imagine that it was hard work to compose all those intelligent riffs, etc...., so people who like death metal on a technical high level (intrumentally inspired a bit by Death) should grap this nice CD. But as there are still a lot of people just supporting images instead of music I doubt if Haggard get the support they deserve.

VOND "Selvmord" (Malicious)

"Vond is earthly, Mortis is unearthly" said Mortis in #2, and he's absolutely right with this. Vond is more based on earthly sounds, and I think that Mortis did his job very well. To make it short: "Selvmord" is great music to relax to when the atmosphere (candlelight, etc.) is right!

SWORDMASTER - Adv. for MCD

This MCD is completely different than the studio-rehearsal which I reviewed last issue. The duo has now put the old thrash spirit into their nordic black metal music, and I must say that it sounds pretty cool. Rough new-black metal meets old Kreator or something like that, and it's worth listening to. Especially the fast parts are full of power, just check out "Conspiracy" and you'll know what I mean. If Swordmaster aren't too lazy, we can expect a great full-length album.

AFTERMATH "Eyes of Tomorrow" (Zoid Recordings)

After several years of existence this old power metal outfit manages to present their debut album. It's old (late 80s) and complex U.S. power metal with a more or less weak vocalist. But the music itself sounds very welldone, and fans of that old style will enjoy it, and especially the band's fexibility and most of the (acoustic) guitarparts are cool, but I'm afraid that this music will not attract most of you anymore... and I must admit that this isn't my favoured music, too.

DARK CRADOUTLICU "The Gallery" (Osmose)

These skilled Finnish musicians kept the faith to their old style. It's again melodical but outrageous Speed Metal played on a high technical level... it's really amazing to listen to every single instrument. But sometimes it's all too hectical for my taste, and I prefer the slower parts which sound fantastic. If you always liked the old Dark Tranquility stuff, then you will fall in love with "The Gallery", too.

GODSEND "In the electric mist" (Holy)

It's not a bad return of Godsend, but their old-fashioned doomrock generally sounds too non-metallic, it's even very hard to find any metal-like sounds in some of the songs. As most of the readers like music the heavy way I'm quite sure that you won't like this CD too much. As already said, it's not bad, but I'm afraid that this is music for people who are more into calm 70s-rock. Only the singer sounds quite modern, and I think that this especially sucks!

DESASTER "A Touch of Medieval Darkness" (Advancetape, to be released on Merciless)

During Desaster's 7 years of existence a lot of different sounding songs were created, which you finally can experience on this debut CD/LP. Beside their new songs /demosongs, which can be described as original guitarorientated black metal with great melodies, the band recorded two old songs from their time before their first demo was released ('93). And these two old songs ("Devil's Sword", "Porter of Hellgate") are totally in the old 80s thrash vein (like Destruction) and sound fuckin' cool Just the vocals are done in the ordinary screamy vein and could be better. But to sum it all up: Every song has its own face, and that's something you seldomely find on albums nowadays, so especially foreign people should check out this album just to see that metallic quality from Germany is still existing.

INSANITY "Phobia" (Heavy Metal Rock)

Have you ever heard of Insanity? Well, I haven't, and it seems that there're still a lot of bands still undetected on our globe. Insanity are another suprise to me, their straight ahead thrash (crossed with some death elements) pounds very easily into my head. Only the vocals were hard to take in the beginning, but they're ok if you get used to it. It's of course nothing special, but as long as the music is enjoyable, then it's ok, isn't it?

BIFROST "Pagan Reality" (Nazgul's Eyrie Productions)

It is true that Bifrost's style can be considered as original, but "Pagan Reality", the band's debut CD, isn't musically too convincing. Their kind of pagan metal, which seems to be inspired by Sabbat (UK) and (when it comes to some rhythms) a little bit by Manowar, sounds cool, but the fast thrashy parts and the vocals don't blow me away at all. But good ideas are existing, so we should better wait for their upcoming CD "Wildfire" and hope that this one will be better.

KRUC

Hardcorethrash is the game Krug play, 'cause nobody told them the right way. It's music you readers won't like too much.

CLOTTED SYMMETRIC SEXUAL ORGAN "Nagrō Läuxes VIII" (Morbid)

Groovy /puky /gory deathgrindrock (??!?) which drives me fuckin insane. Only consumable after more than 10 Beers !!!

MASS PSYCHOSIS "Face"

If I have to listen to this CD three times, then I would find myself at a neurologist's surgery. Those American fellows have no problem with playing their instruments very well, but their musical style (a sort of death / thrash, etc.) is simply too confused and nerve wrecking. On one side I'm sure that this is no CD for the headbanging masses, but on the other side I guess that fans of technical stuff will like "Face".

ABSURD EXISTENCE "Angelwings"

And some good German metal finally: "Angelwings" is a professional release of harmonic death metal with well-arranged and intelligent guitars. I would call it as old Crematory (Ger) without keyboards, just with the difference that Absurd Existence are not that brutal. A very potitive thing is that the label sells this CD for not more than DM 20, so you get 55 minutes for a cheap price.



(Pussy God)

Maniac Butcher's motto ("No keyboards, no female vocals, only the dark storm !") is still the same, but they have changed their style very radically in comparison to their "The Incapable Carrion"-demo (review see elsewhere). This new tape (also available on MCD-format) "Barabarians" presents aggressive and powerful Black Metal with high (strong) vocals. It all sounds quite good and powerful, but I don't like it when bands change their style that much. However, this 6-track tape, which has a bomastic sound, will satisfy every black metaller, so why shouldn't you give those four trendy Czech butchers a listen? ABIGOR "Orkblut - The Retaliation" (Napalm)

The music on this 25-minutes strong MCD is in the same vein as on the debutCD "Verwüstung", just with the difference that more medieval elements (like flutes, melody lines, etc.) can be heard now. Generally it's fast Black metal with melodical guitars. Good!

DAWNFALL "Dominance of Darkness" (Nazgul's Eyric Productions)

This on 500 copies limited CD is very hard to take because of its messy guitarsound... It's original but very primitive and raw stuff, and I'm sure that only few "Die-hard" black metallers will get their mental satisfaction when banging their head to this album. Extreme !!!

SVARTSYN

"Promotape for MLP"

Svartsyn is the new name for Incitatus. who were featured in TALES...#2 if you remember, but it was just a change of the name. Musically it is still in the same direction, one of the four songs is taken from the old Incitatus demo, and presents cold but still melodical doom metal (with bells) in the vein of slow Trouble /(old) Cathedral. Just the voice (if it is not spoken) sounds black metal-like. It all sounds great and satisfying, and as there aren't too many good doom bands around I can say that Svartsyn belong to the strongest ones. ARCTURUS "Aspera hiems symfonia" (Ancient Lore Creations)

This is the first time I listen to this highcelebrated band, but they've already released a 7'inch and a MCD (on NOCTURNAL ART PROD., Samoth's label) which got sold for a price that was unashamely over the top. And I think that people were right! Arcturus have their own sound and really know to play music that attracts most people. To describe it: You hear that this band hails from Norway, just imagine Black Metal crossed with Rock and symphonic sounds. Most of the riffs sound really great and so do the drums, who were played by Mayhem's/Immortal's Hellhammer, but in a total different way in comparison to Hellhammer's main bands, it's more "rocky" if this is the right term. This CD only release brings again some cold winds from the North, but luckily with certain originality.

IMMOLATION "Here in After" (Metal Blade)

Although I was never too mad about Immolation's debut LP "Dawn of Possession", I must admit that this new its interesting overwhelming sides. It's still in the typical Immolation-way, but they are just better than in the past plus it's gone more original. Pure (techincal) Death Metal which hammers into your skull !!! So at the end it's good to see that this band has survived throughout the years. Another thing I have to mention is the fantastic coverartwork, it's a continuation of their first album's cover.... that's something I



"Promo'95"

The Italian scene seems to get better and better with the years... This new band convinces with their technical but still enjoyable dark death metal. DOCCOLUS "Promo'94"

LUNAR AURORA " A Wandering..."

Havorum is a side project by an Elysian Fields member. This guy also seems to want his piece of the big blac! metal cake, and he tries to conquer the scene with his 8-song (!) demotape. But it's not too great I have to say, the vocals are ridiculous (is this the vocalist of Aufgabe ?) and the music is just average. Also I can't get rid of the feeling that he used computerdrums on this tape as they are sometimes a touch too fast, almost Brazilian-like, ha ha. The music itself is a mixture of Greek and Northern Black Metal which is mostly played in a melodical but still aggressive vein. For those who are interested should

RAGNAROK "Beloved of the Raven God"

Finally a well-produced demo that is really impressive. Impressive, because Ragnarok know to rule their bloody instruments (fast riffing with godly soli, fine arrangements). It's pagan metal in its purest form, heavily inspired by folk music as you can experience old ages with your ears when listening to the songs, even if most of the stuff is not slow but midtempo. It's great original music, but the vocals are a bit over the top. They sound like a black metal voice being played at 45 RPM. GRIM "Färd"

Horrormovie sounds with black metal vocals. Only simple synthsounds are used for this music, and this especially creates a certain macabre atmosphere. But "Fard" turned out to be too simple, it's music which isn't hard to be composed and therefore it easily creeps into your ears and easily gets boring. Dedicated to "real thrash" they finally attack without any intro or warning... and it's really very "thrashy" what Terrorsquad present. First up, this tape has a great sound (coloured cover and lyrics as well), and you simply hear that those five thrashers are excellent musicians, not only the fastchanging and complicated riffs and well-thought guitarsoli show this to me, but also the drums and the basslines are very wellplayed. But that's probably the problem that I have with this tape... the music is too hectical and overloaded with technical raffinesses. Former BATTERY / C.O.T.I.M. chief Nyar Linke finally tries to express his creativity in musical forms, and here I have the first results! To be honest I expected a bit more from a man who used to review other stuff in the Götterdämmerung isn't bad, but you need more than just a couple of good ideas to make a tape sound satisfying. Sometimes his fast-changing music (in style and tempo) makes it all a bit chaotic, and unfortunately he also didn't manage to get a powerful sound on this demo, ... the bass is too loud, the guitars too weak. SPEAR OF LONGINUS

Superfluous as flies on cowshit, that's the best description for a band like Spear of Longinus. This band is just a disgrace for the metal scene with their "Nazi Occult Metal" (do you feel cool now after you invented such an idiotic term ?), using Göbbels' speeches and ridiculous lyrics within their songs. Why don't they play nazi- skinhead music instead of black metal ? Bands like this really make me sad... Of course no address here, you'll find it in most trendzines anyway.

NECRATHEMON "Immaterial Rhythmes"

Greece seems to be the land of "mystical metal".... and Necrathemon do also fit into that stylistic corner with their synths and harmonies loaded music. But this four-piece line-up still has to write more memorable and original songs before they're thinking of releasing something more professional. The basic ideas are good, but the special "kick" is missing in their four songs, and the vocals, which are deep and monotonous during the whole tape, make the music a bit boring. "In the Darkwoods Sovreignity"

On the first sight (professional printed cover, etc.) I thought that this band might sound promising, but sadly I found out that Grimoire are just one more band not above average. It's unholy music from the holy land what they play, black metal infected by northern sounds. Good things to mention are the flute-like keyboards which appear here and there, it gives the music a special touch. But guitarriff-wise the band hasn't too much interesting to offer. The vocals are of course screamy... too screamy and therefore without any originality. 

In '93 they recorded a promotape with three new songs, which are more simple, doomy and fast as well but still and brutal. WORLD DOMINATION

(Osmose)

If you like to know what's up at OSMOSE / LISTENABLE and EVIL OMEN Records, then this first compilation CD by these french labels is the right answer. 13 different bands are featured such as Christ, Absu, erion, Sadistik Immortal, Fallen Demoniac, Luciferion, Sadistik Exclution, etc., and this CD was announced to be available for a very special price (Sorry, I can't remember it). So why not checking this out if you aren't familiar with those labels.

What sweet music they make... (Glastnost)

Nosferatu (alias Klaus Kinski) is greeting on this CD's frontcover and gives a rough imagination which kind of music is featured. Yes, it's vampiristic music, but the styles are different...dark wave, gothic, electro, pop, etc... I don't need to name any bands as you don't know most of them anyway. SLAYTANIC WEHRMACHT A tribute to 4/A/ER!

Although I have paid more than DM 20 for this LP, I like to review it for all you maniacs. Slayer definitely deserve a tribute, they've influenced the whole extreme metal scene so much in the 80s and they deserve nothing but respect for not wimping out until now. Bands like Dissection, Cemetary, At The Gates, Enslaved, Merciless, ...play coverversions of old great Slayer songs like "Crionics", "Antichrist", "Post Mortem", etc. etc. Of course nothing can beat the original versions, but it's cool to hear other bands playing songs of kings.

SEBEΩΩAB "Mery Shitmas" (Primitive Art)

Arrrghh, Swedish boozers Gehennah return with a 7'inch (especially released before Christmas). It seems as if they plan to be a pure Venom copy, their new songs (although there are still some punkriffs included) are more Venom-like than the stuff they did for their "Hardrocker" CD. some parts even seem to be stolen (remember the end of Venom's "Dead of the nite"). Also their bassist tries to look like Cronos with all his read leather and spikes, only the muscles are missing. This single which is packed in a cool full-coloured front and backcover, and is pressed on brown vinyl (Happy "Shit"mas), contains two songs which sound pretty cool. It is limited on 500 copies only. so hurry up if you like to experience "Satana Claus" and the titletrack. A band like Gehenna is (in my opinion) important to bring some new (old-fashioned) ideas into our scene. Cheers!

ATHOTHEP "Baob - Catha" (V Noise)

I always am very curious to listen to new bands from Switzerland as there were a lot of good bands hailing from this country in the past (remember Hellhammer, Messiah, Coroner, Samael, etc). But Athothep have to imprive their cool but not yet well-worked out kind of atmospheric black /death metal in order to be named together with those above mentioned bands. For a first step I can say that this 7'inch (limited to 500 copies) is acceptable, but there's still a lot to do to grow to a might Swiss force.

PENTACLE "Exalted Journey" (Midian Creation)

Old-fashioned Death Metal from Holland! This band has totally dedicated themselves to the old sound, and they show us this with their two-track 7'inch. No keyboards and stuff is included here, Pentacle just convince with pure metal the deathly way. But they should stop sounding like Celtic Frost, because they can't bring over this cool old sound as it is only destined to be played by some chosen ones (like Slaughter, Delirium or Inner Sanctum). Check it out if you like the easy but effective way. "Don't forget the ancient feeling - it still rules !!!" ...how true !

Desaster / Ungod

(Merciless)

A fine split single! Ungod are black thrashing metal and seem to have found their very own sound... just the sound could have been better! But musically it' really cool! Desaster's side is better produced and represents melodical but straight ahead black metal, and I think that this band seems to have found their own style, too. I also have to mention that this single has two cool coverartworks (4coloured). This release is especially interesting for those among you who got disappointed by German Black Metal in the past !

UNGOD / CABAL (Merciless)

Again a spli single by MERCILESS Records. But although the musical quality of both bands is good, I'm not too satisfied with the sound. But coming to the music: Cabal play old-fashioned Death /Thrash Metal which sounds brutal but also a bit monotonous... Ungod's song is in the same direction as on their other split single, pure Black Thrashing Metal which sounds cool. On one side this is not a single everyone simply must have, but on the other side it. isn't a bad release.

FULGOR "Eyequinox"

What the fuck hides behind this untypical cover ??? Yes, untypical music! This band sounds as if they don't know what to play. It's a mixture of (black) metal electronic sounds à la Kraftwerk it's not easy to describe, but it sounds very original. But it's not something for everyone's ears I must admit. Anyway, it was a cool experience to get confrontated with this kind of well-produced music. This 7'inch comes in red vinyl!

MANJAC BHTCHER/ BARK STORM (pussy God)

Two black/death metal hordes on one unholy single. It's dark and aggressive stuff, these bands spit on sweet harmonies. An interesting piece of black vinyl I must say !!! Available for \$5 at the PUSSY GOD Records address!

Final CD/LD Warnings

Master's Hammer "Slagry" (Kron - H)

Franta, what have you done ?!? I merely could say something after 1 heard "Slagry", the band's third opus. The reason is simple: This album has absolutely nothing to do with "metal". except for the last song which shows Master's Hammer from their old side (great !!!). It's orchestral /circus/ gypsy/ I don't know what music, which sounds very original and good, but also totally strange. I cannot understand why the band has released this LP under the Master's Hammer logo, but I pray that Franta hasn't lost his interest metal, and that his next album will be carry the typical Master's Hammer sound again. It would be a shame if not !!!!!!

Bewitched

"Diabolical Desecration" (Osmose)

Former members of Throne of Ahaz and Katatonia united to bring back the feeling of the 80s Speed / Heavy Metal sound. And yes, they have some strong 80s influences (except for the vocals) like Running Wild, Venom, Mercyful Fate, etc., but you can hear at the production that this LP was recorded in the 90s. It's a good album, but sometimes Bewitched have stolen their riffs too obviously from some of their old heroes.



'Metal – what a fucking beautiful (vord. Such a word describes power, honor, and glory. Such a word describes howesty, integrity, and resolve. Such a word describes SCENTER!

These are the introducing sentences for **SCHPOER**'s biography, so you see that this is not just another faceless harde.

This trio has released a professional 4-track demo called "Up Thy Ass" and it represents old-styled mid-tempo metal in the bein of slow (old) SODOM and their mates from USURPER, but not as dark I must say. For a first demo it sounds bery promising, and clearly shows tuhich path Scepter have chosen to walk. I used my chance to attack John Karnes, who is the band's concerning this and that. But first I wanted to know what's up in the band's camp...

"Things are going well. Word of Scepter is gradually getting around the scene. We are busy promoting "UP THY ASS", so nothing really new. Perhaps a show late in the year but nothing definate."

You label your music as "pure metal", but it's not the same as the traditional kind of metal which bands like IRON MAIDEN, JUDAS PRIEST, MANOWAR, etc. play, so why this term for SCEPTER's music?

Scepter plays MFTAL, pure and simple. We're influenced by METAL bands from the 70s, early and mid 80s. Some examples are Kiss, Bōc, Iron Maiden, Twisted Sister, Venom, Celtic Frost... you get the idea? We feel that labeling ourselves as just "death", "thrash", "black", etc. would be too defining and confining. By combining the aforementioned influences with our own ideas we create METAL without limits. Maybe we are doing something unique? I don't know and I don't care. We play what is in our hearts and we call it METAL!"

Tell us about the time when you were in USURPER. Why did you leave them?

I played with the Usurper guys in a totally different band which they dissolved in late 1993. Thus, I was never part of Usurper, so I never left them.

Well, I think I've misunderstood you in your last letter, sorry man ! But I think I'm not the first guy who found some similarities to USURPER in SCEPTER's music, am I ? Did you use some old ideas for "Up Thy Ass" you had while you were playing with the USURPER guys?

'All the material for "Up Thy Ass" was written by Todd and me after the Usurper guys and I parted ways. Any similarities between Scepter's music and Usurper's can be attributed to the fact that I played with them on and off in the past for some five years. You don't play with other musicians for that long unless your stylistic tastes in music are similar. If our riffs sound alike at times it is purely coincidental and ultimately unavoidable. Great minds think alike, right!'

Ha, if you see in this way you're right. What will happen next at SCEPTER? I guess you are longing for a full-length album...

'A full-length LP will happen when we are ready. I think a lot of bands jump into a record deal before they have really had a chance to develop their sound. We are in no hurry for any major moves. Our time will come.'



In your music I also found some SODOM-like arrangements, do you agree? What do you think about the German metal back in the 80s?

'My first German METAL experiences were bands like Scorpions and Accept. Eventually I got into bands like Sodom, Destruction and Kreator. What I liked best about those bands was the solid, heavy downpicking 4/4 rhythms. Those bands wrote killer, catchy songs. So as for having Sodom-like arrangements, what can I say! We were influenced by the best!"

What is the "purest" metal band in your opinion (beside of course SCEPTER) ?

I have my personal favourites, but overall, I think the purest METAL bands came from the mid-80s thrash / death / black scene. The bands of the mid-80s pushed through the boundaries of conventional METAL styles set by bands from the 70s and early 80s into totally unexplored realms of speed, heaviness, overall the song structuring and instrumental technique. Those bands laid down the foundation for most METAL bands today. The extreme bands from the mid 80s were so special because they threw out all the rules and played from pure instinct.

"Up Thy Ass" is really professionally done, so how much money did you invest for the whole thing (including promotion) until now? Of course you needn't answer this question if this is too personal...

The whole "Up Thy Ass" assault was paid for in full when we laid down our souls to the gods rock and roll.'

Nice argument, really. Before our ways part once again I'd like to know how your situation was while being confrontated with my questions...

'Just revelling in the screams of agony coming from my dungeon where the poseurs I have captured are having their bodies broken by my trusty <u>STRAPPADO!</u> How inspiring...'

The band is currently working on their new demo which should be entitled "Metal Supremacy"... watch out for this one as well.







HORPHALACK

Most Greek bands have an atmospheric sound and so has Nar Mataron. Their bad produced promo has just one real song included (plus intro / outro), but the atmosphere is very cool and magical. It's very simple stuff, based on just one riff with a lot of choir-like keyboardtones and the fast (late) Rotting Christ drumrhythm, but it sounds good. As two members of this band also play in Vorphalack, a band which sounds typical fast Greek black metal with high vocals as you can hear it on their "Black sorrow for a dead brother" demo, I had (once again) the chance to put two bands into one article when I contacted Lord Alazoth (vocals, and bass/keyboard at Nar Mataron). When musicians are playing in two bands the question always comes up what differs both bands from another 'Actually in Nar Mataron we experience our style. We have mixed folk ancient Greek music real brutal parts with a lot of atmospheric feelings. We were very satsified with our demo (except for the sound, but we liked the in that moment, that's why we didn't mix the songs), and I tried the brutal parts for Vorphalack's new demo, with the help of Count Samas and Emperor Palmist. The reactions were very good, the demo is selling well for both bands. And for Vorphalack we earned a CD contract at UNISOUND, and a 7'EP contract for Nar Mataron. We'll keep the extreme brutal parts and the folk influences in Nar Mataron and we'll continue to play pure ancient tartaric evil black metal. In Vorphalack we'll keep the atmospheric parts along with some progressive music. The only thing that is equal in both bands are my vocals. When it comes to MELANCHOLY Promotion I noticed that "orders from Greece are not accepted" for the Nar Mataron demo.... Why this? Are the fans from foreign countries "worthier" than Greek metallers ! Leonidas, chief of MFLANCHOLY explains: 'In the beginning we didn't want to sell our things to Greeks, 'cause here in Greece people are closed minds and they judge every new Greek group as bad. Also a lot of "new" kids (12 - 16 years-old) try to be evil by labeling themselves as underground maniaes. We only correspond with good true Greek bands and people. MFLANCHOLY changed this now and we're selling the demos in Greece except for Nar Mataron, because it was part of the deal. By the way Lord Alatoth has stopped corresponding with Greek metalheads long time ago. He only has few friends he talks to. Well, this is a pretty silly attitude I think... Anyway, Lord Alatoth tells us about the future of both bands: 'In beginning of '96 Vorphalack's debutCD "Lullabies of a Vampire" will be released. It'll contain 8 tracks of melancholic black metal. Next, there will be a contract with a new label. The Nar Mataron 7 inch will include two songs plus intro/outro, then a new demo will be out.' And Leonidas' plans for MELANCHOLY: '7"EP of Demogorgon will be out at the end of '95. It'll contain two songs, later the Nar Mataron 7"FP and probably a Vorphalack 7"FP will follow and some other 7"EPs or LPs of new groups as well.' Only the stars know whether this label is a gift for the scene's future or not. By the way... why don't they release a split LP or a compilation LP instead of all those countless demos / 7 inches ??? Oh yes, I forgot.... the profit is bigger ... If you like to write them, here's the address:

Erevos I've already reviewed in # 2, but after I listened to their cool non-metallic medieval music again for a couple of their cool Bolletines I wondered what happened since that cool promotimes I would be the plans of doing a full-length release are release and reality! Prince Korthnage explains: 'Yes, in the turning and of 96 I'll enter the "STORM" studio to record 6 heginning of the title "Winterfeast" as a debut CD. I have three paeams from the promotape 94 and three new paeams with titles like "Swords in flames", "The Black Ring of the Great Sorcerer" and "Hymn to the Ancient Dark Spirits". It's good to know that something is happening concerning the album... but Erevos isn't the only band in which Prince Korthnage is involved (by the way, he's the only member in Erevos anyway), he used to be busy in Agatus, a black metal band, too. But it's gone pretty silent with that band as I've noticed... The "Prince" comments: 'I dont know what's happening now to Agatus, because Eskarth removed to Australia. A promo was released with the title "Black Moon", but after this, nothing known has been done. Just silence... To me this sounds as if they faded away, so let them rest in peace, even if they were a cool band. Making good music usually takes a lot of time, so in which of Korthnage's two bands has he spent more time and work? Of course I spend all of my time now to Erevos and I'm making the same for Svefathorn (!!! -ed.) when I have my inspiration. When I was in both bands, Agatus and Erevos, I had the same feelings and inspirations for them.' But this definitely belongs to the past if I read between the lines. So just concentrate on his main project now, and if you are a friend of cool medieval harmonic flute-tones, then watch out for Erevos' first strike on CD (LP ?). Not only our Scandianvian friends are able to create some cool non-metal music! If you like to convince yourself of the musical quality you still can order the promotape'94 for \$4 at: Prince Korthnage, AG. Marinis 4, 123 51 Egaleo, Athens, Greece.

Another new great band from the eternal North abyss....Neeztach have released a cool 3-track demo called "Pinseltronen" which sounds like a mixture out of Gehenna and horrormovic-sounds. It's so convincing that I had to ask "Gidim Xuil", the only "official guy behind this band, a couple of things...

Pinseltronen' is a great demo that seemed to arrive from the nothingness, but how was the existence of NEEZTACH before that tape got released?

'Neeztach has always existed deep within my dark mind, it was not only until recent I had material and money in order to do the demo. There have been some session-members, but they all turned out to be wimps.'

Within those countless new Scandinavian bands you seem to have a touch of own identity...What made you create moodier and more mystical music than others do? Just in order to be "different"?

Well, as I told you, NEEZTACH has been around for quite a while and I have had plenty of time to think about how I wanted the songs to be. You can say that I wanted my songs to be a bit 'different', and I have accomplished that in sort of a way. The new songs will be a bit more faster, satanical and hateful.'

As the whole scene seems to concentrate on norwegian bands, I can imagine that soon you got some offers from labels, etc, didn't you?

'I haven't received any offers from labels yet, but this is explainable, because my demo hasn't been out for so long. I'm still waiting for some labels' reply, we'll see what time will bring. I surely hope that I'll get a deal with a label, so I can release my work on viny!!'

There are quite a lot bands coming from your area, so how's the colaboration? Can you imagine anyone to join NEEZTACH as a second member?

'The only band I'm in contact with is Gehenna. There are a few other black metal bands, but they're all posers. I have found a drummer by the way, but his identity will remain secret, he goes by the name 'Akhkharu' (aha! del.). I've also a session guitarist, but I think that he'll also wants to remain secret. I can tell you that they're no posers!'



Well, let others decide who's poser or not...Coming to the next question I wanted to know if you are into horror movie-soundtracks or anything like that, I thought about this when I listened to the song 'Brennende' which sounds very dangerous and adrk due to the effective synth effect...

'Yes, I am into horror movies, and they have all inspired me a lot. Other influences are my satnic belief and thoughts (...as usual, I didn't expect any other answer! ed.). Musical influences are mostly the good old gods and some newer stuff.' Many swedish or norwegian bands tend not to expand their souls (or should I say horizons?) beyond the scandinavian frontiers...is it the same with you? Explain your opinion!

'Yes, it's the same with me...'

Oh well, thanks for the exlaination of your opinion! Such long informative answers make this interview really a killer (...)!

From your place (Stavanger) comes a mag called GENOCIDE which caused a lot of trouble because of some nationalistic/ racial propaganda and temptation to violence, etc...Did you notice all that trouble and did some people also come after you as you're a band playing the kind of music which GENOCIDE features in their mag?

'Yes, the police found me / us interesting and are always breathing down our necks! I do not spend much time with the GENOCIDE guys, Beastus Rex is currently in iail.'

"Arrogance is strength" is a slogan you often have to face in the (northern black) metal scene, but don't you think it's kind of silly? I often experienced that there are a lot of wimps hiding behind the arrogant masquerades...

'Sometimes I can be very arrogant, this can be explained in very simple words! I tend to be arrogant when I am in a situation I do not like and when there are people whom I do not like to be present.'

A strange answer to my question...but it's your thing. What does NEEZTACH mean to you? Is it just a hobby or is your aim to live through the sales in near future?

'Neeztach is definetely not my hobby, and I can't live through the sales, at least not yet, you don't make much money on a demo (that's of course clear ! - ed.). But we'll see in future!'

Before I leave you: How will the new songs sound compared to the demostuff?

'We are working on new material and as I said earlier, the songs are a bit faster and they aren't finished yet, so I can't tell you more... A big hail to Dirge Rep and the rest of Gehenna. Greetings to Erkekjetter and Dimmu Borgir. Hello to Roy 'Mannen' fra Mannestad. And a special thanks to you for the interview and your support!

Gidim Xul, Kongsteinssmauet 4, 4012 Stavamger , Norway If you are a real fan of dark American Death Metal, then you don't have to miss AZATOTH from Sweden. Their first demo "The Dawn" was really nice, but the new one "Through the Halls of Hatred" is a killer! But I have to say that this band has nothing to do with originality.... it's very American Death Metal -like, and comparisons to DEICIDE and CANNIBAL CORPSE, etc. are undenicable. I don't care as long as the music kills, and it certainly does when it comes to the new AZATOTH-stuff. Especially the first two songs are pure death metal crusher, very well played (there are even great soli included) and fuckin' powerful, all arranged with certain intelligence. It was very obvious for me to do an interview with Kalle, the band's vocalist and lyricwriter, especially as this band is still very unknown (at least outside Sweden).

Old Necromaniae Mark Mackey from England tells about his experiences he had with CELTIC FROST...



The first time I ever met Celtic Frost was in 1985 in Switzerland. I got to know their roady, his name wa "Dinosaur", he's mentioned on the band's early demos and the "Morbid Tales" MLP. I had a friend in England who was going out with him... and she asked me "You want to go and meet someone ?", and I said "Yes". And when Dinosaur and spoke to eachother we found out that we both liked Celtic Frost and that he was their roady... and this fact blew me away! Then in 1985 I went on a Eurorail-tour, and when we got to Switzerland we knocked on Dinosaur's door, and he put us up for the night (Talking about him, he used to ride around Zürich on a black motorcycle, dressed in black leather with a black helmet and a fencing mask on with two horns sticking out of his helmet...and he looked like Mad Max). And he said, "how about meeting the band tomorrow ?", and I was pretty excited that time and I said "Ok". The next day he took us for a drive from Zürich to a tiny tiny little town that I really can't remember the name of, but it had about five farmhouses and a couple of fields in. And one of the big farmhouses was owned by Tom, and we walked into the Celtic Frost rehearsalroom which was a kindergarten that had a four food thick door, and saw the band rehearsing. We, me and my mate Gary, sat down, didn't say anything, and the band was playing "Circle of the Tyrants", "Into the Crypts of Rays", and they carried on rehearsing. It was the time they rehearsed for "To Mega Therion", and when they finnished the songs, Tom came over, introduced himself and the members of the bands to us. "Morbid Tales" was out and "Emperor's Return" was just released at that time. The line-up then was Tom on guitar, Reed on drums and Dominik Steiner on bassguitar. Dominik just played on "To Megatherion", but never again, because the others didn't really like him at all. They said by the end of the recording of the "To Mega Therion" LP that they would walk down the streets and if Dominik was on their side of the street they would walk on the other side of the street. Dominik used to play in a band in Switzerland called Baby Steel, and they got him as Martin Ain has left the band by that time, for the first time, he decided to go off and do his own thing. So Tom wanted a good bassist, and Dominik was a very good bassist and a really nice guy, but he did not look right at that time, and I don't think his attitude was there for Celtic Frost. He was a bit too glamy at the time for the band which is really ironic considering Frost's "Cold Lake" LP in 88.

The band weren't playing Hellhammer songs at that time anymore when they rehearsed, but they asked me what I wanted to hear, and I said I wanna hear "Messiah", so they played a couple of chords of that song. And when they played "Into the Crypts of Rays", I played as going with every word for it, and they couldn't believe an English guy knew actually sang along with every word for it, and they couldn't believe an English guy knew all the lyrics to "Into the Crypts...". They weren't playing any Hellhammer-songs at all, all the lyrics to "Into the Crypts...". They weren't playing any Hellhammer-songs as Celtic Frost was the only time I know of them in concert playing Hellhammer-songs as Celtic Frost was the very first gig in St.Gallen, and they played "Messiah". And they played that song once in America on their first tour with Voivod, Nasty Savage and Destruction. But otherwise they never played Hellhammer-songs as Celtic Frost, it was a complete new otherwise they never played Hellhammer-songs as Celtic Frost, it was a complete new

thing.

Hellhammer splitted up, and when they came together they decided that it wasn't going

to be Hellhammer again., they wanted something new.

Musically Celtic Frost was heavy as fuck, I was really chuffed to see them, I couldn't believe the I was seeing Frost in a live-situation,... not in front of an audience, but

playing with a bank of amplifiers behind them.

The first time I heared about them was the "Apocalyptic Raids" EP that was bought by a friend of mine, she said you have to hear it, this is incredible, so I listened to it and sure senough this was incredible. Then I started seeing posters in Heavy Metal Record Shops enough this was incredible. Then I started seeing posters in Heavy Metal Record Shops enough this was incredible. Then I started seeing posters in Heavy Metal Record Shops in London for a new band called Celtic Frost "who make Venom sound like the BeeGees", etc., and I thought that this sounds pretty good, and I bought it and it blew me

out of the window. So, I couldn't believe being at their rehearsalplace later, I was a happy boy back then.

When we went to see them rehearse, we said "goodby" by the end of the session, and we went back to our way around Europe back to England, Later I spoke to some friends and I said that Celtic Frost are playing in Germany, "do you wanna go and see them !" and they agreed and we went to Bochum at the Zeche, and Celtic Frost were supported by Kreator, but unfortunataly we got there and the gig was cancelled because Tom lost his voice, but the band said to us we won't forget you, because you knew all the songlyrics, and they said they talked about me for weeks afterwards, I was the first English fan that ever met and liked the band, which I felt quite pleased about, because they had so much bad press in England, especially in METAL FORCES, and Tom said he would never play England, and he was true to his word for a long time until 1987, but I think they were quite pleased when they came over.

The contact branched out, I started writing with them, I had Tom's, Martin's and Reed's personal address... and from then I used to go over ocassionally just to see them jam and play.

By mixing with them I got to know that Tom, whatever you read about him, he sounds like a bastard, but he had his reasons, it was his baby, his band, and if something went wrong the pressure was always on him. If a record was wrong he thought he's done something wrong, Celtic Frost was as much the other members' band, but Tom always felt he was the main man.

The first time I met Martin we went in '85, after we just have seen the band rehearse, to Martin's flat and he was watching Dracula, or any other black and white horrormovie, and his record collection is made up with things like the Virgin Prumes and Christian Death and very gothic-styled stuff. That was his way of doing things! He always wanted to leave the band and do horrormovie-soundtracks, that was always his thing. Maybe one day he'll actually do it... Martin also worked pretty full-time at a recordstore in Zürich, and he never give up his dayjob.

The most easy going guy has to be Reed. Being American, he was always drinking Beer which Tom never did. Martin never touched alcohol, but Tom was known to drink bottles of Brandy, he was into spirits, but not into fruit-type of spirits, he wouldn't drink Vodka or Scotch or anything. He was always very straight with everybody, and if he didn't like you, you certainly knew about it.

Special things that I possess? Well, I got all three Hellhammer demos from Dinosaur, and the band gave me their 12" inch "In The Chapel In the Moonlight", Picture Discs, Tourposters, Photos, etc.. Also I have a white Shirt with the "Morbid Tales" design, and the design is upside-down, and there were only about 10 - 15 shirts made, and I still have it, it's in shreds, because it has been worn so much... and when I went to concerts in England people used to say to me "Hey, your T-Shirt is upsidedown", but I used to say "Well, it was given to me by the band" and they said "You BASTARD!"

Mark about the members of the band

I was there when they made the "Circle of the Tyramts" video, that was also at the Bochum /Zeche, and there was only 10 people allowded and that was record company, etc., myself and my two friends were allowed to watch them play which was pretty special, and just being mates of them.

When at stayed at Tom, he had about 100 Frank Senatra records, Frank Senatra is Tom's favoured artist...Tom wanted to do "These Boots are made for walking", but unfortunately about a year before, Megadeth have already done it, so Tom was really pissed off and he said to me "I really wanted to do this" and all he does is listening to





bloody Frank Senatra. So in the end, they did "In the Chapel in the Moonlilght" by Dean Martin, because it sounded so weird and it actually really worked, and that's what Tom listens to, he's really into that sort 50s, I don't know, and he really isn't into Heavy Rock at all.

Martin on the other side is the gothic man, he wears the Christian Death T-Shirts, he's the guy that dresses in black, wears the make-up, he's the real doom merchant. He was the cult man, the guy with the black rooms, the altars, the skulls,...he used to read stuff like Aleister Crowley, Anton LaVey, etc. Tom wasn't really that dark about these things, he was more into medieval things, like the helmet on the backcover of "To Mega Therion" LP. Tom was the angry boy of the band. Reed was into just about anything, into drinking beer, into heavy stuff, but he never really told me his favoured bands. But I know that he met Paul Stanley and Geen Simmons once and he didn't know what to say to them; he likes the American bands. Reed was one of the best drummers I've seen in my life. In England and Europe the band is called " (K) CELTIC FROST and in U.S.A.

In England and Europe the band is called " (K) CELTIC FROST and in U.S.A. the band is called (S) CELTIC FROST, and the reason is because Katon from **Hirax** once said on stage "this one's for (S) CELTIC FROST", and over here in England, (S) CELTIC are a football time.

The experiences at Martin's house were ultra scary! I'm not a small guy, but I had to sleep with the door open. I walked into this room and there was a proper marble altar with a skull in the middle, two candles on the side and on the side of the altar he has four food tall candlesticks made out of spiriling metal with gorgons and everything, and on the wall he has black and white Giger paintings, and the entire thing is painted black. His flat at the time had a codrephonic speakersystem, so he had two speakers in the living room, one speaker in this altar-room, and one speaker in the toilets. And when you wake up in the morning, he would play something like Coil, and he had to destroy angels which is really really scary. I did not sleep very well in that room at all.

Another funny story: One day I went to Tom's house to see them rehearse for two weeks, and one morning I opened the back door, because he had some stray cats he feeds. He also had a dog which he called Wotan who was also in that room... I went to feed the cats and I heard some music upstairs, so I thought Tom's up,... and I went upstairs to see him, didn't realise that I left the door open. As I was checking to Tom, I've forgotten all about it. One hour later we came downstairs, the door was open and the dog was gone. I searched for hours... the dog was eventually found by the police , and Tom had to pay a lot of money to get the dog back and the night after I done that Tom told me to fuck off out of his house. He wasn't a happy man at all then. From Tom's house I was really brokeneyed, and I went back to Martin's house and I slept once again in that fuckin' room with the altar in which he did me in again. And as I walked down on the stairs Reed was sitting there, and his words to me were "Hello, loser of dogs." which I wasn't very happy about. Reed thought it was immensely funny, Martin thought so, but Tom 's going to smash me in the face. The best thing was to get out while I can, so I did, and we didn't speak to eachother for about one year.

The Reunion

The way we met up again was when I went to a record shop in London and some friends of mine were there and they've just been to Hammersmith where Frost were playing that night. One of them told me that Reed was outside asking for me, so I went to Hammersmith, knocked on the door of the backstage enterance and Reed came out, and he said "How are you Mark, it's been a long time, etc., and I've got someone who wants to see you." I got a wake feeling what was going to happen, so I walked on stage on the Hammersmith Odeon, and there was Tom, and he looked to me and I looked to him ... and he started laughing and he gave me a big hug, and he said: "I'm really sorry (which I thought was rather nice) to do this to the biggest Celtic Frost fan in England... I should never have done it and we are friends again." For a year and a half we didn't talk and I was told by Reed later that this was the reason my name didn't go onto "Into the Pandemonium", because of that fuckin' dog, hah hah.

Bochum / Zeche: It was February '86, Kreator supported them (once again), and the German fans were completely bloody mad. When Kreator played it was 0k, but when Celtic Frost did people were stagediving with cowboyspears on, and people were getting cut to ribbons. It really was naughty, but that was the way there were doing it in Germany... in England it was quieter, we certainly don't kick people. Everytime I've been to Germany for a gig there have been fights everywhere. The Celtic Frost gig was superb, and I've got the bootleg of it, and on the second song Reed comes out and actually said "This one's for Mark"...well, that's me (proud) !!!

The fans back then: Everyone was wearing Helloween or Slayer Shirts, had long hair and mustaches, well in Germany everyone has mustaches (ha ha).... and they were mader. The Bochum gig has been the madest gig Ive been to. In England there's like a moshing pit, stagediving, but it doesn't get quite as violent as in Bochum where poeple are purposely going in to hurt people.


Steve, Tom's brother who has been in **Hellhammer** as Savage Damage, was also there. He's total different to Tom, Tom is five foot tall, Steve must be like six foot three, a really nice guy, and he was the main roady at that time. That was another good thing at Germany to meet "Savage Damage".



Ilellhammer were basic, and at that time when "Apocalpytic Raids" came out it was so unusual, they needed a band like this, metal was going fuckin' nowhere then, we had Venom, great, and Metallica who will go mainstream anyway, then you needed something loud: Hellhammer. It used to be called Tarot, Grave Ilil. Ilammerhead and then Hellhammer. The fact that they came from Switzerland maybe pissed a lot of people off, because Switzerland was never known for producing any metal bands (except for wimpy bands like Krokus).

Hellhammer was a different band than Frost, that's probably why Tom has taken his so personally... Hellhammer was just Tom and a couple of other musicians, but when it came to Celtic Frost attitudes changed when "Morbid Tales" appeared, it is so different to Hellhammer, I think it did them really good (Never ! ed.) to stop Hellhammer and get Celtic Frost going. The difference is so obvious!





I think Tom still has something against England, because when they played the "Cold Lake"-tour at Hammersmith...the place which usually holds 3.500 thousand people was filled with 600 -700 people, and that really annoyed Tom, but he didn't realise that the people were into Frost for their heaviness and the image and when he changed the image to look like glam, I didn't think he had thought about it as much as he could have done. And the people who were there were all Celtic Frost-fans who have Celtic Frost tattoos up and down their arms.

It's so weird now, everybody is a **Celtic Frost** fan, but at the time everybody hated them, it was only a very very small band of people who used to go and see them all the time. We still meet eachother, we still know eachother, but all the younger people now who get into **Celtic Frost**, I'm sure that at the time they (or even older people) may just have said "what a lot of rubbish". And now because of other people saying "we're influenced by **Celtic Frost**" all of a sudden there is a big time...maybe now it's the time for Tom to get it together, speak to Reed and Martin and maybe do a farewell-tour, because it will go very well if they do good publicity.

What about the other members ?

I met Steve Priestly, who was in Schizo before he joined the band in 1984, afterwards, but I never met the very early members, and I really didn't know what happened between them. The reason they were leaving the band is that Tom has chucked them out, because they weren't good enough (says Tom).

Facepaint

The band's facepaint in the early days was one of the reasons I turned on to Frost, because being a Kiss fan...facepaint was cool during that time. I've seen Mercyful Fate in 1983 and then Frost played with make-up... and now all these bands that are coming out, I have to say this, are boring. I don't like facepaint if it doesn't add anything to music. But everytime I see a Scandinavian band with make-up it reminds me of Kiss, early Celtic Frost, Mercyful Fate, and I don't know why they do it!

At the time in '86 I heard of things like "Journey into Fear" and "Cross on my shoulders" when it comes to unreleased Celtic Frost material, but the last one never got released finally.

In 1986 Tom wanted the band to become a 4-piece and he played me a lot of demos of guitarist that he got who wanted to join the band. Tom had enough of being a three-piece, because all the pressure was on him with the guitar. The demos were sent in by a lot of American guys who've put on it a Celtic Frost song on the record player and they started playing along to it...and that was it. And I thought "What is this, a bunch of crap!", it was absolute garbage, but Tom was really really keen on one American guy who looked about 4-years-old, and Tom wanted to bring him over, but that didn't work. But you don't really need more than three persons for Celtic Frost, Tom filled out all the guitarparts quite happily!

We had good contact, I phoned Tom and Martin up, but Reed actually used to phone me up. He once came to London and I went out drinking with him, he was over here to do some sessions for a band, he would never tell me for which band. And I got him into a pub and we got so pissed that he wasn't able to do the session that day which I was quite proud about. We were as drunk as scuncs! During the time Tom got madder like "This is my band,...get bigger and bigger", Martin got more interverts, and Reed just drank more Beer.





Total Celtic Frost-clown from Uruguay, but fuckin' great! Inner Sanctum isn't just inspired by those Swiss gods, no, they try to be a pure copy with success. Their cassette LP "Frozen Souls" is finally out (I have reviewed it in #2), and I was really happy to get in touch with Pablo, the band's bassman and vocalist. Even if this interview is pretty poor due to his bad English and all the Beers which he has drunk, it's better than nothing, isn't it? Well, enough written, let's start....

Why is your album so delayed? Will it ever be released on TOXIC?

'We are not the one to blame! All the problems were made by TOXIC Records, they made it so fuckin' problematic. But now we are ok with our "Frozen Souls" I.P.'

As your recordings are quite old now I suppose that there're some new songs already written... Please tell us something about it...

'Yes, there are two new songs, "Embrion", "Locus Plague" and the "Frozen Souls" LP of course !!!"

It is very obvious that you are heavily into CELTIC FROST, and I dare to say that INNER SANCTUM try to copy Tom Warrior's style of songwriting. Do you care about people calling you a CELTIC FROST rip off? What other influences do you admit for INNER SANCTUM?

I don't care, I've never cared and will never care. Of course I have other influences like Morbid Angel, etc. etc., we try to make a sound which we like, I don't know. We like too much styles and I've too much bands I mostly like. I'm not a chosen mind when it comes to styles...'

Who came up with the idea to form a band like INNER SANCTUM and what happened before you went into the studio to record your album? Please tell us about the past...

The idea to record our album came from TOXIC. I was the person who continued since the beginning (91), and before I was also playing bass in a band called Angkor Vat (89). At that time I knew Euronymous (Mayhem). He was an extreme and good person.'

It is always interesting to hear some musical influences from the band's country, but that's not existing in your music. Will there ever be any Uruguayan influences in your music? Don't you think you limit yourself when just concentrating on one sound (here: CELTIC FROST)?

We have some Uruguayan influences like Walpurgis (true black metal), Maldicion, Melkor Morgot, and as you say Celtic Frost.'
Why did you choose TOXIC as your label, why not an European one?

TOXIC records joins us! We have purposes from three different Chilean labels, such as TOXIC, EMI, INFERNO. But we don't know,

some people say that TOXIC sells the catalog to INFERNO. In these times I don't care about anything.'

I never heard of any other Uruguayan band before, so is there any metal scene in your country?

There are other Uruguayan metal bands like Maldicion, Morbid Blood, Diskordid, Walpurgis, Eclampsy, Ossuary, Exorce, Corpses, and a lot more.'

Do you think that middle- and south American bands are underestimated by the world wide metal underground? What's your opinion on Brazilian, Mexican, etc. bands? Are there any you can recommend?

'Sabaoth, Typhon, Brujeria, Criminal, Dorso. From Argentina I can't recommend anything, and that's all...'

As said before you heavily sound like FROST, but I can't hear any HELL HAMMER influences (H.H. and C.F. do

not sound alike !!!). Is this because you don't like HELL HAMMER or is it too difficult to write songs in that simple style?

There were three months in my life where I only listened to "Apocalyptic Raids" from Hellhammer.'

How's the line-up in your band and is it easy to find the right musicians for it?

'Line-up: Aluaro García (drums), Beto (guitar), Pablo (bass). There was only a change on guitar.' What will await us when it comes to INNER SANCTUM's future activities?'

'We will play in Brazil (December'95), we'll record an advance tape for our second LP with the songs in question two.'

'Thanks for the interview. I'm sorry that the first interview didn't reach my hands... "Life is short. Death is eternal. Let it touch you with immortality."

This interview wasn't too informative, but I printed it, because you should keep an eye on those guys if you really like the Celtic Frost stuff which they've created during their "To Mega Therion" and "Into the Pandemonium". Sadly I don't know any address where to get "Frozen Souls" from, so check out lists from South American distributors.



beside this alcoholic delight there's more good stuff to detect at that place, like good metallic art in form of a band called Sorath. I was quite suprised when I listened to their second demo ("Voices", includes four songs), because their death metal style is both dark and melodical, and easy to listen to, especially because of the intelligent guitarriffs and cool drumwork. It's not something "very" original, but what the hell do we care as long as they present us some fine pieces of music. Although "Voices" is a demo above average, there's one thing which irritates me a bit, and that's the fact that the band sometimes puts too many different riffs into a song, and this makes a listening to the demo a bit hard at times. I wondered what the guys from Sorath think about this, so "Arraon Admirerforest Tear" (what a name !) answered: "I don't think that playing more riffs in one song is bad. We are trying to play interesting music where more different meldies are put together, it's a kind of polyphony that I'm trying to play in our songs. Our new songs will be shorter and sometimes evenmore combined !" Uff, then I suppose the band is heading into the progressive corner, but I shouldn't draw any conclusions until I hear the new stuff. But of course I'm very curious about the upcoming songereations, so I asked for more info....' We are going to release a new demo under the name "Matache Chavala". The next demo after that one will include five old songs from "666... to Awakening", our in 1994 released debutdemo. One of these songs will be recorded in a new version and there will also be one new song. Everything will be recorded in a better studio." To my bad luck I don't know the band's debuttape, so this info didn't really satisfy my curiosity. Perhaps some of you know that tape, but I doubt it to be honest as Sorath is still an unknown force in the international scene. Czech bands aren't too famous anyway (beside of course the bigger ones like Master's Hammer), and I really think that this is a shame, because there are a couple of fine bands hailing from this country. Ottar Distress comments on it...' There are a few good underground bands in our country, for example Maniac Butcher, Fleshless, Isacaarum, Unclean, Enochian, Dissolving of Prodigy. Dark Storm. Our country is good for metalbands and for pllaying metal. We haven't had problems with our peformances, but it depends on people and towns we are playing for / in. I think that the underground has a good position in our country.' It seems that the hard times for metal are over in the countries on the east-side of the old iron curtain. Turning again to A.A.Tear', I guess that he has heard about the shitty American Sorath (lead by Nazipig "Baron Abaddon"), at least because they share the same bandname. But who's going to change the name now ! It's always bullshit that bands are around with the same name.... ' Sure, we have heard about the American Sorath, and we are sorry for it. We haven't thought about the change of the bandname yet, because we like this name and I have a personal relation to Sorath as the band. Baron Abaddon probably doesn't know about us, but we are going to write him.' I think the musically best band shouldn't change their name, and that would be the Czech one.


By the way, if you ever see photos of the Czech Sorath, don't get deceived by their (stupid) corpsepaint.... they're far away from sounding typical Black Metal (here: high sounding guitars and voice, etc.).

KAMPFAR

Although Kampfar seems to be a new one-man band from oblivion, the musician (Dolk) has already made some experiences with another band called Mock, which ceased to exist (a split CD with German Tumulus is now available). So Dolk now decided to walk his very own path, and he founded Kampfar in order to create Norse music. He's already released a demotape which contains two excellent produced hymns. Of course I need not mention that it's typical Norwegian styled (viking) metal, which seems to be influenced by Burzum (simplicity) and hymnic Bathory. Dolk's vocals are ordinary (high screams), but to make the music more interesting he added some normal demo, there are still people around who are still hungry for such music, and however I can say that the demo is nice as it comes with a great sound and nice cover (2-coloured). I don't know if the tape is still for sale as it was limited on 250 exemplares only. It costs US \$7 (a price for a half LP !!!). But I'm sure that an album will be released soon as we know that nearly every band (even shitty ones without any talents) gets a deal quite easily nowadays. If this happens at Kampfar, then I hope that Dolk will try to sound a touch more original.

SACRIGE

Although Black Metal starts getting boring as too much stuff gets released in these days, there are still bands around that sound astonishing. One of these bands must be SACRILEGIUM from Poland, their "Sleeptime" demotape (professional sound, music, layout) presents four pure black metal tracks (+intro/outro) which are heavily infuenced by old BATHORY, especially "Empty Side of Soul", the opening track,... and this sounds very cool. But on the other side I detected some parallels to DARKTHRONE's hateful "Under a Funeral Moon" LP, like some of the drumrhythms and riffs, so I wondered what Suclagus (guitar, vocals, keyboard) thinks of my comparison...

'No! Darkthrone creates great and possessed music. But it isn't number one for us. I agree that the sound on our demo "Sleeptime" is similar to Norwegian, but you won't feel it on our debut LP "Wicher".'

Whose idea was it to publish your demo through PAGAN and are you satisfied with their work? What do you think of other Polish labels like for example BARON or WITCHIN' HOUR?

It was Nantur's idea. We are really satsified with collabartion with PAGAN Records. Together with WITCHIN' HOUR Productions they are the only honest label in Poland. BARON Records - Trend!'

Please tell us something about your announced debut-album (songtitles, musical direction)...will it be a lot different than "Sleeptime"?

'Our debutLP is more mature than "Sleeptime", the lyrics have changed, too. The LP will include seven songs and it should be available on PAGAN Records very soon.'

Your answer isn't really satisfyong... Musicwise there are a lot of great Polsih black (and also death) metal bands around, but lately some of them seem to mutate into pure nazi hordes.... Do you support this development or do you belong to the kind of bands which are cursed by those neo-nazi

pigs?

'We are no fascist pigs. We haven't received any menaces from them yet.

Perhaps in future, but we really don't care about this. We fuck these people and these bands.'

Don't you think it's a contradiction being a proud slavonic being on one hand, and praising Hitler on the other hand?


'As you wrote in your previous question, also in Poland there is a fascination for Nazism. People who regard themselves as slavs worship Hitler and Slavonic gods. It's a big denial.... it can't be treated seriously. They are weak!'

Which Polish bands can you recommend to us? Anything we should or even shouldn'twatch out for?

'Great and true hordes worthy recommendation are: North, Marmoth, My Infinite Kingdom, Hefeystos, Behemoth, Grom.'

Well, I know that this little interview wasn't too informative (I asked some more questions, but I dropped them as Suclagus' answers were a touch too short), but what can I do about it? "Sleeptime" is really an impressive Black Metal demotape with a lot of hatred and cool cold atmospheres (keyboards have been used, of course!), and it sold more than 1000 times (Now it gets re-released on MCD format through WILD RAGS Records). I haven't heard "Wicher" yet, but I wish that it will sound as intensive as the demo.





Again I've bought / traded some new publications just to see what's up in the fanzine 'scene. Sadly I wasn't able to review them all on this METAL PRESS page, but I hope that my choice is interesting.

DAWNRAZOR # 1

(subtitle: "The Jewel's Gleam")

On DAWNRAZOR's flyer this seemed to be a very interesting new zine, but unfortunately it's just another ordinary new publication in the 'zine underground. It's printed and filled with several interviews like Arcturus, Dissection, Amon, Hypernoid, etc., several articles (Ved Buens Ende, ...) and reviews. The interviews are ok, but it's all (including the reviews) too outdated plus there a big waste of free space in this mag as pictures drawings /etc. are sometimes far too big, so that these 48 (NOT 50 as they said on the flyer) A4 pages would have easily fitted on 40 pages or even less. "Get this piece of profound art for \$7 (Scandinavia), \$8 (Europe), \$10 (overseas), cash only" says their flyer.... and I think you would be a real fool (or a son of rich parents) if you pay such ridiculous prices for an ordinary mag like DAWNRAZOR. My advice to the editors: You need more than just "Made in Norway" to really convince the metal majority!

Staying in Norway another new mag rises from the unknown! EINHERIJUM #1 has 60 printed pages which include Scandinavian stuff like In the Woods, Persihed, Mortiis, Theatre of Tragedy, Isvind, etc. and few non-Scandinavian bands like Esoteric, Black Funeral, etc., an Irish scene report, reviews, etc... A nice mag, but I have to criticize thr Helheim Society interview which (in my opinion) is just dealing with nazi propaganda, even an old NSDAP "Rundschreiben" has been printed in this interview.... Apart from this the editor's comments are sometimes strange (but also funny I have to admit) and the photo quality is bad. Well, if I take the whole result I can say that it's a good mag, but it more a mag for Norwegian people, because there are often sentences written in Norwegian language which is more than uninteresting for foreign readers. \$7 is the price you have to pay to get EINHERIJUM...

AUTKAST # 1

Only 32 xeroxed pages (A4) are included in AUTKAST's debutissue, but wait! The interviews (Dissection, Faust, Gorgoroth, Dissection, Anthropomancy, Bruce Dickinson, etc.) and reviews are not stupid and clichee but critical ones instead. So this seems to be a zine (done by Dark Heresy's vocalist) which works on a honest basis. As the price is just \$2, this zine is recommendable...

the beginning this regulary published new underground magazine seemed to be a cool new black /death metal guide for the German speaking metalheads, but now, after a couple of issues are out, I'm not too fond of ABLAZE at all! I bought #6 just to see what's up at Germany's leading underground mag (salewise), and I really got pissed by the methods ABLAZE is working with now. For example there is a 4 page strong Mayhem interview included, and almost 50% of it consists of old statements by Euryomous. Nothing wrong with this, but ABLAZE have simply stolen all those statements from an old interview which you can find in Finnish ISTEN # 6, and ABLAZE simply do so as if it was done by themselves. So you see how honest and "serious" this mag works, and I think they're now more busy in praising themselves (just take a look at the readers reaction-pages in ABLAZE issue Nr.7... with sentences "you made yourself immortal with this Mayhem interview", etc. !!!) than in presenting interesting and untrendy bands which aren't featured in every second fanzine anyway. The other bands included in # 6 are Satyricon, Katatonia, Cradle of Filth, etc.... and in #7 bands like Immortal, Gorgoroth, Luciferion, Helheim, etc.

You don't know too many bands from countries like Malaysia, right ??? Therefore it's time to introduce Langsuir to you, a band which understands to play powerful and straight ahead old-fasioned death metal that contains some dark feelings. Their 3-track "Occultus Mysticism" studiodemo has already been published in 1993, but because of a huge demand from the fans it has finally be re-released by EAST GOTHIC Productions. Luckily a tape was send to me by that company (otherwise I believe I wouldn't have heard about the band until now), and I really enjoyed the tape as it sounds very honest and untrendy, but still very attractive and powerful. That was stuff from 1993, but what happened since that time ? Azlan (vocals) gives us answers...



' After the release, we received overwhelming responses from the metal freaks. They think it's something "old" in musical directions. We get a lot of letters which we think it's cool then, but now letters are so boring except for certain ones. We did few local gigs which were always sold out and a gig in Singapore with the mighty As Sahar and Demigor, etc. Then we were involved in a controversy with local black metal bands / scene. We printed the "Occultus Mystiscism" demo on another 100 copies and finally it was reprinted again for the final 500 copies through EAST GOTHIC PROD. . This time it comes with professional printed cover and cassette.

At this moment, I'm listening to Darkthrone's "Soulside Journey" which was labelled as a trend release by many people. Last few nights, I've completed a new song entitled "Malam" which means "Night". And I've got a rough structure for another song which is still untitled.'

I guess you've written some new songs since "Occultus Mystiscism", have they brought any musical changes?

"Malam" is the latest composition. There are few more songs that were completed in two years time (mid '93 mid'95). I'll have written: 1. Bastardized Rejaman Sihir, 2. The Seven-Headed Dragon of Pelang, 3. Sumpahan Tujuh Keturunan, 4. Breezing Monsoon Dance, 5. Descent of the Fire, 6. Tangison Embun Pagi, and finally a wimpy version of the '60s "Pontianak" which is "Vampire" in English. I can't say that we are different in musical approaches. We're certainly a metal band. But in a way, we progressed a lot. If we sounded like "Occultus Mystiscism" it would be certainly least. I experimented new techniques and riffs that I've encountered since those two years. All songs differs in its approaches, You may hear it. Anyway, it's still dark, occult and mystical death metal the way it should be.

EAST GOTHIC re-released your demo... why did you choose a label in order to release your tape, why didn't you do it yourself? Will upcomng LANGSUIR stuff also be released through E.G.P. ?

Because we don't have much time to handle them. Personally, I'm busy with my study as a university student. And I work constantly on making songs and lyrics. I did 90% of the composition. Besides E.G.P. offered us a good deal. We received about US \$400 for the 500 sold copies. That's equal to 8 - 10 hours of 16-track studio recordings. We may use all the royalties to record 2 - 3 songs for a new demo (probably). And E.G.P. releases it with more professional work.

can't say that we're certainly going to release anything through E.G.P.! There's talk between Langsuir and E.G.P. for a possible full-length release, but that's just talk. We ae still "free" at the moment. We encourage labels to ask us for a 7 inch or MCD / split-CD release.

A lot of new bands are emerging from Malaysia, some of them totally sounding "scandinavian". What do you think of this development and "change" of the typical exotic sound?

Actually, the "Scandinavian" sound or "norwegian" sounds are very influencing, and malaysian youth is also fragile for these sounds. So, they absorbed them. That's why we have malaysian bands with scandinavian look...they totally look like scandinavians, the songs, the lyrics, the paint, even the way of thinking. This kills their creativing 1 to the way of thinking. creativity! It happens globally, very pathetic I think. We shoul not let the music control ius, we have to contol the usic !!! It will still develop the sounds, but we will have these typical bands in future, we even have them now. I'm now very careful at choosing to what Scandinanvian bands I should listen to, because it is pointless to hear the same thing. I'm working in a band now which have broad metal influences, that's Langsuir. Well, the Malaysian scene is not bad either. Some bads are very good, they deserve a world tour ! Bands such as Sil Khannaz, Necrotic Chaos, Profane Creation, Athothorgh, Bazzah, etc. are good. We also have crap bands, but they won't go anywhere. We have 5 - 6 metal gigs a year and the usual weekly radiofriendly alternative /HC rubbish gig.'

What do you think about the situation that most zines / labels are only supporting (north-)european bands (or bands that sound like them)? Don't you feel a bit "betrayed" by some "scene" people ?

I think this is, because it sells more when releasing "northern" sounding bands. And probably those zines labels are hardcore fans to the sound (!!! -ed). For me, I can't stand the typical thing. I search for different kinds of metal. Trendy or not, I listen to Dismember (old), Aggressor, (old) Suffocation, etc. It's a way to expand our creativity. This northern sound will come to an end. It's natural to see the glory and the end of things. New sounds will grab the people. Well, actually those labels / zines do not only betray us, they also betray themselves.'

What can people expect when coming to a country like yours? What has your ancient culture to offer?

Monsoon rain, hot sun, green landscapes with tropical forests, sweet girls, three boring TV stations and the kids wearing propaganda of their musical idols. People here are very friendly except for few such as me, hah hah...

Our ancient cultures have a lot of rituals physically and spiritually. I adandoned this. But I absorbed the way of spiritualism, the way we see things and approach them. I hailed the ancient values of loving the country. You'll have all this in my compositions for Langsuir.'

LANGSUIR sounds a bit like old ROTTING CHRIST in my opinion, but I better ask you for your musical inspirations. Do you play any coverversions at rehearsals?

Well, everyone has his own perspectives on the "Occultus Mystiscism" demo. But I don't have the slightest idea of comparing the demo with Rotting Christ (I just heard some parallels to the greek's old demostuff and to some of the "Passage to Arcturo" songs, nothing more ed.). Oh well, some think we sounded like Unleashed. For me, the demo is more mid-80s death metal mingled with 90s death metal. We have no exact influence. They change from time to time. Some new songs may be influenced by King Diamond (well,... great ! - ed), some may from old Metallica, some may even from Vli Roth's Scorpions (!!! ed.). Those riffs in a song may popped up suddenly after hearing songs from another favourite metal band or perhaps when I'm playing my cheap guitar. Sometimes it came when I'm about to sleep. But all these inspirations came from my idolisation of the ancestors and the forests. It soothes me to compose a song which hailed the region's values. We played a lot of covers at gigs and rehearsals. We have to stop it now since we have got to concentrate on our iwn songs for a future release. If not, we might have covers of Benediction's cover of Anvil's 'Forged in Fire" (Ha, this actually sounds very funny, covering Benediction's coverversion of Anvil ! -ed.), At the Gates "The Architect" and Darkthrone's "Cromlech". Anyway, in the past four years we played.... 1. The Crucified 2. The Horny and the Horned (both by Impaled Nazarene), 3.

Fourth Knight of Revelation (Rotting Christ), 4. The Immortals (Unleashed), 5. Mexican Radio (Celtic Frost) (... again a coverversion of a coverversion ! - ed.), 6. Shemahanforash (Grand Belial's Key), 7. The Laws of the Scourge (Sarcofago), 8. Weaping in Heaven (Profanatica), and finally from the mighty Absu "Descent to Acheron".

I'm also involved in a side atmospheric metal project in a bad called Voiciferation Eternity. I played guitars and bass in this band and was specialized on the lyrics. We've a gig coming up and we'll cover Burzum's "War" and will mega-hail Sodom's "Remember the Fallen". Voiciferation Eternity will release new stuff soon.

What about a LANGSUIR CD / LP (quite possible with the amount of new songs that you have)?

E.G.P. have offered us a possible CD release. But I can't give you details of the deal, because I really need a paperproposol from them. Everyone can talk. What I can tell you is this: They will cover all the costs including studiohours, we received a certain amount of royalties and they will print about 1000 CDs and 2000 tapes (they are selling better in Malaysia than CDs).

Actually, E.G.P. said that we may enter the studio this Summer, but it's getting Autumn now. I think they have some problems, so we let them solve it first. My guess is that we will eneter the studio in December'95. In the meantime we are ready for any smaller release. I call forth a potential label!

Perhaps we will record a 8 songs CD. You'll have some songs in English and some in Malaysian language. I have two songs in our own language, and I think the future songs will be written in that language, too. Never a death metal / black metal band wrote in Malaysian before except Langsuir. Soon, we will have many following our steps...(well, it became common trend to sing in its own language nowadays -ed.). I plan to record a new demo in '98/99. A full-blown Malay album!

Your last shot

The E.G.P. versions of "Occultus Mystiscism" demo has sold about 300 copies, so we have 200 tapes left. I urge every metal freak to grab a copy of it. Hurry up! Labels should be encouraged to write us with some potential proposals. Zines may question us, but only selected ones will be answered. Once, anger and hatred controlled us. Now we control them !!! Hail LANGSUIR, the seventh

"Occultus Mysticism", their three-song demo, is still for sale for \$5. So if you like to hear good old-school death metal the dark way, then get a copy of it. I for myself just hope that Langsuir haven't changed their style too drastically during their three years of silence.
